Senior General Min Aung Hlaing expressed gratitude to China for its stance of support regarding Myanmar’s issues on the international landscape.

A ceremony to mark the 75th Anniversary (Golden Jubilee) of the Establishment of Myanmar-China diplomatic relations took place at Mingala Thiri Hotel in Nay Pyi Taw yesterday morning, attended by Chairman of the State Administration Council Prime Minister Senior General Min Aung Hlaing.

At the ceremony, the Senior General said an opening address. He said: In the history of modern bilateral relations, Myanmar was one of the first countries to recognize the People’s Republic of China when it was founded in 1949. Subsequently, the two countries established diplomatic relations on 8 June 1950, marking the beginning of what is now considered a diamond jubilee era.

Myanmar firmly upholds One-China policy

One-China policy strengthens bilateral relations between Myanmar and China, contributing to regional peace and stability.

Since the establishment of Myanmar-China diplomatic relations in 1950, successive visits and exchanges of goodwill delegations between the leaders of both countries have steadily strengthened and deepened the relationship over time.

Based on the historical ties between Myanmar and China, the successful signing of the Five Principles of Peaceful Coexistence in 1954 has become a model in the history of modern international relations. Since the Bandung Conference

in 1955 up to the present day, it is encouraging and commendable to see that many developing countries worldwide have practised these Five Principles of Peaceful Coexistence.

LOCALS said that beach destinations such as Chaungtha and Ngwehsaung are still receiving a moderate number of visitors during the early rainy season.

Although there are not as many tourists as during the open season, a reasonable number is still coming to relax, said a travel service provider.

“The beaches are not as crowded as the summer, but tourists are still visiting. The rain is not too heavy, so it is still moderate. Some people just want to relax and enjoy seafood, so they avoid busy time and prefer this season. It is not that there is no tourist at all, they are still coming during

the early monsoon period,” said a Ngwehsaung resident.

With tourists still visiting Chaungtha, some beach hotels are offering room rates as a pre-monsoon promotion. Dur-

ing the rainy season, domestic travellers usually visit destinations such as Chaungtha and Ngwehsaung beaches, Hpa-an, PyinOoLwin, Kalaw and Bagan-NyaungU. — MT/ZN

Myanmar Daily Weather Report

BAY INFERENCE: Monsoon is strong to Vigorous over the Andaman Sea and Southeast Bay and weak to moderate elsewhere over the Bay of Bengal.

FORECAST VALID UNTIL MORNING OF 9 June 2025: Rain or thundershowers will be scattered in Nay Pyi Taw, Magway Region and Kachin, Kayah, Rakhine and northern Shan states, fairly widespread in Mandalay and Sagaing regions and widespread in the remaining regions and states with likelihood of isolated heavy falls in Yangon, lower Sagaing, Ayeyawady and Taninthayi regions and Kayin and Mon states. Degree of certainty is 100 per cent.

THE CONDITION OF CUMULONIMBUS CLOUD: The cumulonimbus clouds are developing in Nay Pyi Taw, Yangon, Mandalay, Bago, Magway, Sagaing, Ayeyawady and Taninthayi regions and Kayah, Kayin, Chin, Rakhine and Shan states. The area along the cumulonimbus clouds movement, the weather phenomena such as strong winds accompanied with rain, thunder, lightning and hail may occur and therefore it is recommended to be aware in advance these phenomena.

STATE OF THE SEA: Occasional squalls with rough seas will be experienced in Deltaic, Gulf of Mottama, off and along Mon-Taninthayi Coasts. Surface wind speed in squalls may reach 30 -35 miles per hour. Sea will be moderate elsewhere in Myanmar waters. Wave height will be about 9-11 feet in Deltaic, Gulf of Mottama, off and along Mon-Taninthayi Coasts and six to eight feet off and along Rakhine Coast.

OUTLOOK FOR SUBSEQUENT TWO DAYS: Increase of rain in Taninthayi Region and Kayin, Mon and (southern and eastern) Shan states.

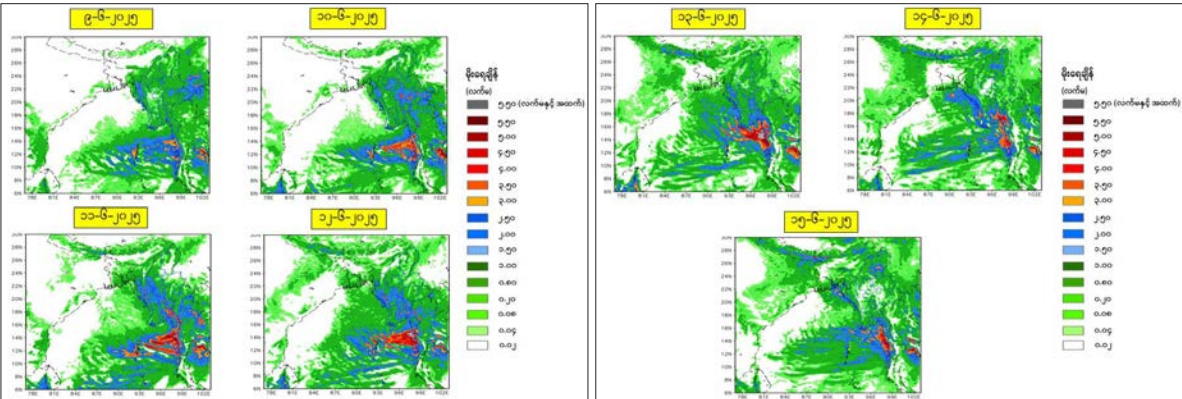

Residents Urged to Prioritize Public Safety Amid Armed Terrorist Threats

ARMED terrorists have been launching attacks by using residential homes and administrative buildings in towns and villages as cover, where they have forcibly settled. They aim to shield themselves from Tatmadaw counterattacks while also persuading temporarily displaced persons to return to their native areas and recruiting new members. That enables terrorists to use civilians as human shields. Tatmadaw is committed to safeguarding the sovereignty of the State and will respond to these threats based on intelligence and prevailing conditions. Therefore, residents in areas where terrorists have taken control must prioritize their safety and protect themselves from being exploited by these groups.

Myanmar firmly upholds the One-China policy in its international relations. Furthermore, Myanmar fully supported the People’s Republic of China in becoming a member of the United Nations in 1971. Going forward, Myanmar reaffirmed its commitment to continue adhering to the One-China policy in order to strengthen bilateral relations between the two countries and contribute to regional peace and stability.

At present, Myanmar wishes to express its welcome and support for the global principles advocated by President Xi Jinping of the People’s Republic of China — namely, the Global Development Initiative, the Global Civilization Initiative, the Global Security Initiative, and the Global Artificial Intelligence Governance Initiative — as they are seen as contributing to a more peaceful, stable, and sustainably developed future world.

The relations between the two countries were elevated to a “Comprehensive Strategic Partnership” in 2011 through mutual exchanges between the peoples and close cooperation across various sectors.

One of the most remarkable developments in the history of bilateral relations between the two countries is the historic visit of President Mr Xi Jinping to Myanmar in 2020. Yangon Region Chief Minister inspects Gyobyu Dam, development undertakings in Taikkyi Township

YANGON Region Chief Minister U Soe Thein inspected the condition of the Gyobyu Dam and local development progress in Taikkyi Township on the morning of 7 June.

He inspected the strength of the Gyobyu Dam, water storage level and distribution conditions. They also checked the condition of the Thanat Creek damming reservoir near the livestock breeding zone in Taikkyi Township, assessing its storage level, water release through spillways and structural strength. During the visit, the

Chief Minister issued instructions for necessary measures.

Afterwards, he visited U Kae's livestock farm, where 50 local cattle, 262 goats, and 40 dairy cows were being raised. He also visited the National Wood livestock farm, where 250 head of cattle are raised. Union Industry Minister inspects domestic cement factories, No 2 Steel Mill (Pangpet)

UNION Minister for Industry Dr Charlie Than visited the Shan Yoma Cement Factory yesterday morning to inspect its cement production and testing processes, after which he instructed factory officials to ensure full operational capacity, stockpile necessary spare parts and inputs, and plan electricity production in line with the plant's schedule.

In the afternoon, the Union minister met with officials at the Apache Cement Factory meeting hall in Pyinyaung, Thazi Township, and instructed them to ensure the factory produces electricity according to its plan while contributing surplus power to the national grid, which greatly benefits the country. He also toured the facility to inspect equipment damaged by the earthquake and assess the factory's electricity generation

process.

On 7 June, the Union minister, accompanied by Shan State Minister for Economic Affairs U

Khun Thein Maung, held separate meetings with officials from the mill construction project at No 2 Steel Mill (Pangpet) in

Taunggyi Township, Shan State, as well as with officials and staff from the Shan State Department of Industrial Supervision and In-

spection.

During the meeting, the Union minister said that the Mandalay earthquake had caused extensive damage to homes, factories, workshops, roads, bridges, and religious buildings, and that reconstruction work must be carried out at an accelerated pace. He emphasized the importance of obtaining pig iron materials that meet the required standards for producing quality iron and steel domestically, directed efforts to commence pig iron production promptly to supply quality materials for public construction needs, and provided subsidies to employees.

In the afternoon, the Union minister inspected the equipment at the Air Separation Plant, which was under repair by foreign experts and local technicians. — MNA/TH

Rescue, relief, and rehabilitation efforts continue unrelentingly in quake-affected areas

RESCUE and rehabilitation operations are being implemented in the areas facing extensive loss and damage caused by the Mandalay earthquake.

Yesterday, Lt-Gen Thet Pon from the Office of the Commander-in-Chief (Army) inspected the rapid removal of earthquake-damaged religious buildings at the Sakkadhita Nunnery in Thawtapan Ward, Sagaing, using heavy machinery; the demolition of the earthquake-damaged three-story building at No 1 Basic Education High School in Poetan Ward; the construction of a new building to house a water purifier and the completion of cleaning and beautification work at the school; the removal of collapsed and damaged religious buildings at the Yadanabeikman Htupayon Shwe Monastery in Minlan Ward using heavy machinery; the clearing of religious buildings at the Rajamanicula Pagoda in

City Ward, which was destroyed by the earthquake; and the reconstruction of the pagoda, while coordinating with authorities as needed.

Lt-Gen Myo Thant Naing from the Office of the Commander-in-Chief (Army) inspected the completion of a modular container house serving as a temporary office at the railway yard in

Kyaukse, reviewed the status of office operations, and instructed officials to maintain a clean and attractive station environment, remove garbage along the railway tracks, and organize garbage bins systematically.

He inspected earthquake damage at No 7 Textile Factory (Myittha) in Lankhwa Village, Myittha Township, reviewed the

status of yarn and cotton fabric production, assessed the completion of the temporary school building at Basic Education High School (Kume), and instructed officials to maintain a clean and attractive school environment to support effective student learning.

He inspected and coordinated the provision of cement,

steel bars, and plywood sheets at special factory prices for reconstructing pagodas, religious buildings, and residential structures damaged by the earthquake in Myittha Township, as well as assessed earthquake damage at the Gwegyi Monastery in Kume and the progress of reconstruction efforts. — MNA/TH

Illegal goods, unregistered vehicles worth K567M seized across nation

UNDER the supervision of the Illegal Trade Eradication Steering Committee, combined inspection teams seized unregistered vehicles and illegal goods worth over K567.89 million during checks from 6 to 8 June across multiple regions.

On 6 June, officials at the Myitnge checkpoint in Mandalay Region intercepted an Ankaï bus en route from Yangon to Mandalay. The bus valued at K50 million was found carrying industrial goods and food products without official documents, with an estimated value of K27.25 million.

On the same day, two Foton tractor heads with trailers travelling from Muse to Mandalay were stopped near Sin Khaung Taung on the Hanmyintmo-Ywangan

Road. They were transporting industrial goods valued at K80.63 million without documentation. The vehicles were worth K162 million, bringing the total seizure value at that checkpoint to K319.87 million.

On 7 June, a Mitsubishi Fuso

truck carrying consumer goods without valid documents was stopped near Shwe Thanlwin checkpoint in Phayagyi, Bago Region. The goods were estimated at K12.2 million, and the truck itself at K40 million, totaling K52.2 million.

Further inspections led by the Customs Department at the permanent checkpoint in Mayanchaung intercepted two trucks travelling from Myawady to Yangon. They carried industrial and consumer goods valued at K28.1 million without proper

documentation. The seized vehicles included a Mitsubishi Fuso truck and a Nissan Diesel tractor head with a trailer, worth K150 million, bringing the combined total to K178.1 million.

On 7 and 8 June, authorities in Sagaing Region seized 36 barrels of illegal diesel at the Yadanabon Bridge checkpoint. The fuel was valued at K17.72 million, and action was taken under petroleum laws.

Also on 7 June, Myanmar Police Force impounded 23 unregistered cars and 143 unregistered motorcycles, with legal action underway.

From 6 to 8 June, 19 cases were recorded nationwide, with total estimated seizure value at K567.89 million. — MNA/KZL

Stimulant tablets seized in four townships

MEMBERS of Drug Enforcement Division under the Myanmar Police Force seized stimulant tablets in Singaing, Kyaukse, Tachilek and Tangyan townships.

Acting on a tip-off, a combined team apprehended four suspects — Thida, Aye Myat Mon, Khin Su Kyi (aka) Moe Moe and Shwe Zin Mar on the road to Ywathaywa Village in Singaing Township on the afternoon of 6 June. The authorities confiscated 55,500 stimulant tablets from them, estimated to be worth K83.25 million in the area (valued at K1,500 per tablet).

In a related investigation, police arrested Daw Myaing, along the road leading to the industrial zone in Kyaukse Township’s Binsu Ward, with 5,635 stimulant tablets. These tablets were valued at K8.45 million at the local rate of K1,500 per tablet. Further interrogation led to the arrest of Ma Melone, who had allegedly supplied the drugs. She was apprehended on the road to Phyaüksaikpin Village in Kyaukse Township. Action

was taken against all individuals under the Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances Law.

Similarly, on the afternoon of 6 June, authorities in Tachilek Township detained a suspect named Sai Aung Kham on the road between Shwedagon Pagoda and Nat-sin Road in Makaokham Ward. He was found in possession of 10,000 stimulant tablets valued at K7 million (at K700 per tablet). A follow-up search at his residence on Kyaung Street in Samseng (B) Ward

uncovered 4,000 more tablets valued at K2.8 million (at K700 per tablet). Legal proceedings were initiated against Sai Aung Kham under the relevant law.

Meanwhile, members of Drug Enforcement Division raided the home of Ma Nang Kham in Ward 9, Tangyan. They discovered 4,900 stimulant tablets hidden inside her bedroom. These were valued locally at K4.9 million (at K1,000 per tablet). She was also charged under the Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances Law. — MNA/KZL

Thanlyin
property market
booms due to
urban buyers
and rural
migrants

THE real estate market in Thanlyin Town-
ship, Yangon Region, is booming, accord-
ing to locals and migrants.

It can be attributed to urban buyers
and rural migrants, and there is more
interest in land and houses in the market,
with more actual buyers than investors.

“Since the opening of new Thanlyin
bridge, transportation has become easier,
so some people from proper Yangon have
come down to buy plots of land here. Some
people who prefer to live in a compound
with privacy bought houses. The easier
transportation has made Thanlyin more
popular and more deals have been made.
Some people have moved because they
can’t afford the prices in the city,” said a
Thanlyin resident.

Due to rising demand of most mi-
grants, the real estate rental market has
developed significantly more than before,
and rental prices have also increased.

“In the rural areas, people usually
live in detached houses, and when they
move here, some don’t like apartments for
elderly persons have to go up and down a
lot. So they rent small houses with a com-
pound in Thanlyin for freer movement. The

Consumer Protection Commission to open more
information and complaint acceptance centres

THE Myanmar Consumer Protection Commission has es-
tablished 51 information and complaint acceptance centres
across the country, with plans to open more centres in order

With regard to raising consumer awareness, the com-
mission could educate 6.4 million population of consumers
accounting for 12.48 per cent of the total population of the

the consumer awareness section in various sectors.

Currently, consumer complaints were most frequent in
the sectors of online financial services, telecommunications
services, and automobile sales. Furthermore, consumer
losses and damages caused by the mistakes and failures
of service providers in these sectors were addressed and
resolved. In addition, the commission will effectively resolve
remaining complaints in other sectors.

Union Territory and regional and state consumer affairs

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Serve the interests of employees through optimism

DURING the 113th International Labour Conference held in Geneva, Switzerland, Myanmar was deeply disappointed to learn that, during the tripartite meeting of the government, employers, and employees held on 5 June, a decision concerning Myanmar was made unilaterally without the involvement of the concerned country.

The decision in question appears to have been made with the intention of exerting pressure on the Myanmar government by countries and opposition groups that view it unfavourably, using the ILO platform with the adoption of the decision invoking Article 33. The decision is a one-sided demand aimed at compelling Myanmar to comply with the recommendations of the ILO Commission of Inquiry on Myanmar, which was formed on the grounds that the country was not adhering to Conventions 87 and 29 on Forced Labour.

The ILO making such a decision without the inclusion of

A glimpse of the land of Pearl

When the vast farmlands that once captivated the eye began to fade away, the shimmering reflection of silver light appeared, signalling the arrival at the seaside. This gave a clear sense that we had entered the coastal region. “Ha Long” was once a region known for its coal mines. Along the way, we passed through large areas where hundreds of coal transport trucks used to park. But when international tourists began to arrive at Ha Long Bay, the coal mines gradually shut down, and the entire area appeared to have transitioned to tourism. Now, as a coastal city, Ha Long is also thriving economically through its port operations and fishing industry, becoming a well-known and prosperous city.

Ha Long is famous not only for its coal mines, ports, and fishing industry but also for its pearl farming. Pearl farms built in the middle of the sea, artificial islands, and museums that display the step-by-step process of pearl cultivation and production attract many tourists.

It has only been two hours since leaving Hanoi. Although the drizzle has stopped, puddles from the rain remain. Upon entering the Ha Long area, the car made

gering question of “*When will all this become a reality?*” lies only a sense of quiet contemplation.

Behind the lush green rice fields, Vietnam’s rice cultivation and production are facing mounting challenges. Vietnam’s rice trade is also showing notable developments. In Myanmar, it’s not easy to come across vast stretches of farmland laid out in large, rectangular plots like those meas-

from every corner – these are likely iconic scenes that define Hanoi’s Old Quarter Chinatown.

Leaving behind Chinatown, as we ascended onto the highway, the sight of the grand and beautiful new city of Hanoi, with its towering buildings, immediately captivated my attention. Putting aside the multilayered roads and colourful cars of Hanoi, as our ve-

Sung Sot Cave is the largest and most spectacular stalactite cave among the many limestone caves in Ha Long Bay. It is renowned by tourists worldwide and is also listed as a UNESCO World Heritage stalactite cave.

Sung Sot Cave is located on Bo Hon Island in the middle of Ha Long Bay, about a 50-minute journey from Ha Long Beach. To reach the entrance of the main cave, visitors must climb over 100

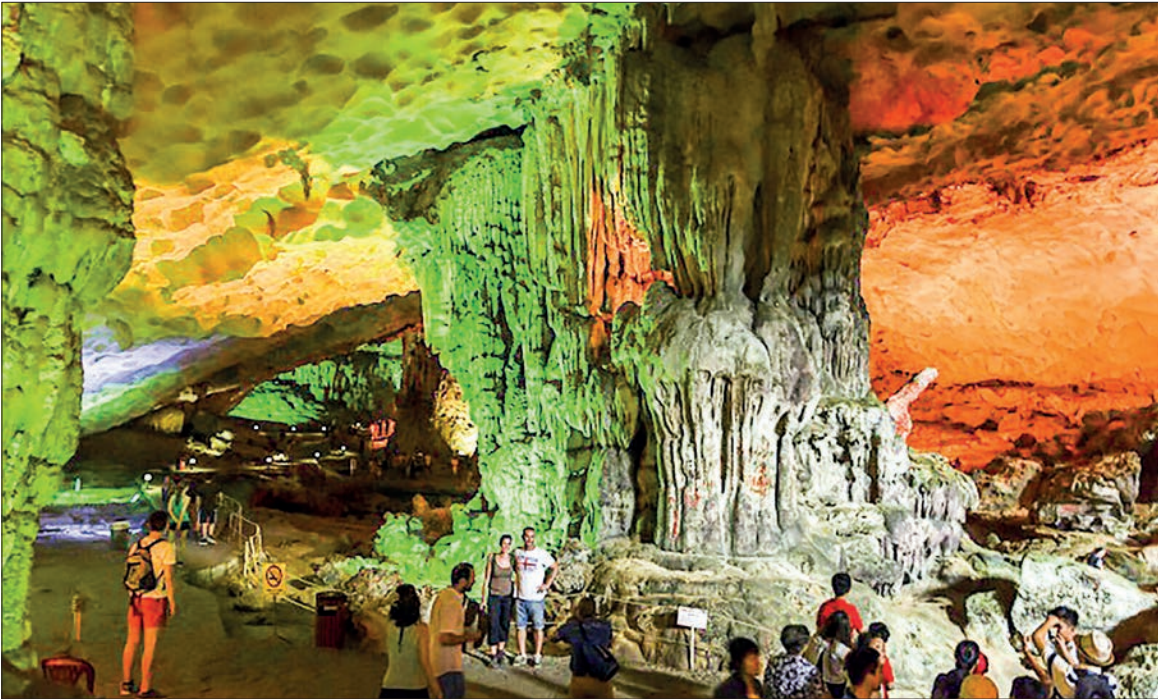
steep steps. From the large cave entrance, you have to go down again to enter the inner part of the cave. Covering a total area of over 12,000 square metres, inside Sung Sot Cave, we can see sparkling stalactites, stalagmites, and natural stone formations that resemble flowers and chandeliers.

Along the cave path, there are large halls, narrow steps for climbing, and narrow walkways where one can only pass a single file, requiring passage through gaps between rocks. Some places are wide and spacious with good airflow. Inside the limestone cave, due to sea erosion, the rock formations have taken on various shapes, resembling decorative stone sculptures. The limestone caves in Kayin State and Mon State of Myanmar are somewhat similar. In particular, Nandamu Cave from PyinOoLwin, and Bat Cave and Jasmine Cave in Kyaikmaraw town, Mon State, are quite alike. However, the Sung Sot Cave is larger and much longer.

At one location, arrangements were made to take commemorative photos, and since there was also a team available to take the photos, the tour was praised for being well-organized. Inside the great limestone cave, beautiful stone chandeliers, stone floral arrangements, and stone flower pots were illuminated and displayed with colourful spotlights. Because it was so beautiful, it was very satisfying for those who wanted to capture it in photographs.

The Sung Sot Cave in Ha Long Bay is also famous for its interesting and legendary stories, similar to other caves. In traditional Vietnamese folklore, Thanh Giong is a very famous hero who is said to have kept his battle horse and sword inside Sung Sot Cave to fight off evil spirits. Visitors can see stone carvings that closely resemble Thanh Giong’s horse and sword. Inside the cave, small cups that can be identified as the footprints of Thanh Giong’s horse further confirm the fascinating legends of the hero Thanh Giong...

Teachers and students rescued from PDF terrorists

TERRORIST groups identified as NUG, CRPH, and PDF are using various methods to harass teachers and educators, including forcing them to participate in the DCS movement and arresting, killing, or threatening educational staff who do not comply with their demands, with the aim of disrupting the development of educated youth in the country.

On 24 May, Daw Phyo Wai Wai Myint, a teacher from Letpankyin Village in Sedoktara Township, along with two other teachers, four students from the Education Colleges, two parents of the students, and one civilian — a total of nine people — arrived at the Pwinttauk Village boat dock to travel to Magway Township with their escorts. PDF terrorists, holding small arms, arrived at the dock, threatened the teacher to join the DCS movement, warned the students not to attend school, and abducted them to Makyee Village.

Following the incident, security forces conducted necessary operations to rescue the hostages. Yesterday, they successfully rescued five individuals: Daw Phyo Wai Wai Myint, a senior assistant teacher from BEHS

branch, Yethaung, Daw Cho Thazin Oo, an assistant primary teacher from Post-Primary School, Taunghandauk, Ma Khin Moe Wai, a third-year Education College student (Magway); Ma Nway Nway Hlaing, a third-year Education College student (Magway), and Ma Khin Su Su Hlaing, a second-year Education College student (Pakokku). These individuals were abducted by terrorists from two locations in Panei Village, approximately 24 kilometres north of Sedoktara. The search continues for the remaining four hostages — a student from an education college, two parents of the students, and one civilian — with efforts underway to rescue them as soon as possible. Security forces are also providing necessary medical care to those who have been rescued.

The public is deeply disgusted by the forcible detention, coercion into joining the DCS movement, and inhumane acts of shooting and killing non-military personnel, including educational staff and students. People are urged to confidentially and promptly report any information about the inhumane actions of PDF terrorists to the security forces. — MNA

THE United States Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) agents raided several locations in Los Angeles on Friday, sparking mass protests downtown.

As immigration crackdowns continue across Southern California and the nation, the raids have resulted in at least 44 individuals being detained, igniting widespread protests, confrontations and chaos in the second-largest US city.

As videos posted online showed, about a hundred protesters were in a standoff with immigration agents on Friday noon, when several workers were taken into custody in handcuffs at a clothing store in the Fashion District.

The Service Employees International Union California issued a statement saying the union’s president, David Huerta, was “injured and detained” during the raid.

Immigration raids in Los Angeles trigger mass protests

Videos shared online captured approximately 100 protesters engaged in a standoff with immigration agents during the raids.



Huerta was arrested for “interfering with federal officers” as he “deliberately obstructed their access by blocking their vehicle,” said United States Attorney for the Central District of California Bill Essayli in an X post.

Essayli also said federal agents were serving a search warrant in the Fashion District for alleged fictitious employee documents. He said there’s reason to believe an employer was using fictitious documents for some of its workers.

In the evening, about 500 people gathered in downtown Los Angeles to protest the raids. Large crowds walked through the area holding signs and chanting “ICE out of LA”. — Xinhua

CHINA'S Minister of Commerce Wang Wentao and European Commissioner for Trade and Economic Security Maros Sefcovic held talks in Paris on 3 June on the EU's anti-subsidy case involving Chinese electric vehicles (EVs), China's anti-dumping investigation into brandy originating from the EU, and export control policies, a Ministry of Commerce spokesperson said Saturday.

The two sides conducted focused, candid and in-depth discussions on urgent and important issues including the

above during their talks, and instructed their work teams to step up efforts to make economic and trade preparations for the important agenda between China and the EU this year, the spokesperson said.

They conducted a professional, in-depth discussion on the EV case, making a significant step in the right direction toward proper resolution of the case, the ministry said.

Price commitment negotiations on the EV case between China and the EU have entered their final stage, but

further efforts from both sides are still needed. The EU also proposed the exploration of new technical paths, which China will assess for feasibility from both legal and technical perspectives, according to the ministry.

Both sides instructed their work teams to redouble efforts to find mutually acceptable solutions in a manner that complies with their respective legal provisions and WTO rules, and to resolve trade differences in the proper manner, the ministry said. — Xinhua

German firms eye India for future tech collaborations in manufacturing sector

AS India is on the brink of becoming the fourth-largest economy in the current fiscal, an increasing number of German companies have ramped up their hunt for Indian partners with the intention of providing future technologies in the manufacturing sector.

The German companies are looking for local partners

to help Indian businesses in advancing production in areas such as green energy, semiconductor, and pharmaceutical sectors, among others.

"India is an important market; it's a growing market and has a huge amount of talent, and we are looking for talent because we are developing new technologies. We

are the experts in the production field, and we are developing from the first sketch until the start of production.

What we are doing here is we have invited our potential customers to this place (India)," said Rainer Wittich, CEO of EDAG Production Solutions GmbH & Co KG. — ANI

US aerospace industry anxious as tariffs loom

US airlines and aerospace manufacturers insist they have no use for tariff protections, warning that the proposed Trump administration levies could eat into the healthy trade surplus the sector has enjoyed for more than 70 years.

At the request of President Donald Trump, Commerce Secretary Howard Lutnick's department launched an investigation on 1 May to determine whether to impose tariffs of between 10 and 20 per cent on civil aircraft and parts, including engines.

The US industry those tariffs were crafted to protect swiftly let the administration know it

was not interested.

"Imposing broad tariff or non-tariff trade barriers on the imports of civil aviation technology would risk reversing decades of industrial progress and harm the domestic supply chain," the Aerospace Industries Association (AIA) said in a letter addressed to Lutnick and obtained by AFP.

The interested parties were given until 3 June to communicate their positions.

The very next day, Lutnick announced that Washington aimed to "set the standard for aircraft part tariffs" by the end of this month. — AFP

Japan brokerages donating shareholder perks to help kids in poverty

JAPANESE securities firms are donating the food and beverage gifts they receive as shareholder perks through their trading activities to nonprofit organizations to support children living in poverty amid inflation. The Japan Securities Dealers Association started the programme in 2020, and around 2,300 donations had been made by March this year. Under the programme, a list of shareholder perks is presented to registered organizations channeling the goods to recipients each week and the organizations then convey their requests to the securities firms. As of April, 61 companies and 48 organizations had registered with the programme. — Kyodo

Jobs at largest US port down by half amid tariff tensions: media

JOBS at the Port of Los Angeles, the largest and busiest port in the United States, are down by half as US President Donald Trump's tariffs cripple trade with Asia-Pacific, local media reported on Saturday.

Over the last 25 work shifts, only 733 jobs were available for 1,575 longshoremen looking for work, Los Angeles Times reported, citing Gene Seroka, executive director of the Port of Los Angeles, adding that the port processed 25 per cent less cargo than forecast for May. — Xinhua

Japan telecom giant NTT Docomo to end own emoji after 26 yrs

JAPANESE telecom giant NTT Docomo Inc. will retire its set of original emoji whose release 26 years ago helped shape the visual language of today's digital communications.

The carrier's Android smartphones and feature phones marketed from June will not come with the Docomo emoji set. Announcing the decision in

late May, the firm said they had "fulfilled their role" while noting that Google's emoji had become more common globally.

The new mobile phones will adopt Noto Color Emoji by Google or Samsung emoji instead, it said.

The Docomo emoji were introduced in 1999 with the company's i-mode

service, an Internet-capable mobile phone system that the company also plans to terminate, in 2026.

Emoji became massively popular in Japan as an element of texting, especially among teenagers in the 2000s, with some creating emoji-only messages, before taking root globally.

In 2016, NTT Docomo's set of 176 emoji was

included in the collection of the Museum of Modern Art in New York, with the

museum stating, "Filling in for body language, they reassert the human within

Apple under pressure to shine after AI stumble

PRESSURE is on Apple to show it hasn't lost its magic despite broken promises to ramp up iPhones with generative artificial intelligence (GenAI) as rivals race ahead with the technology.

Apple will showcase plans for its coveted devices and the software powering them at its annual Worldwide Developers Conference (WWDC) kicking off Monday in Silicon Valley.

The event comes a year after the tech titan said a suite of AI features it dubbed "Apple Intelligence" was heading for iPhones, including an improvement of its much criticized Siri voice assistant.

"Apple advertised a lot of features as if they were going to be available, and it just didn't

happen," noted Emarketer senior analyst Gadjo Sevilla.

Instead, Apple delayed the rollout of the Siri upgrade, with hopes that it will be available in time for the next iPhone release, expected in the fall.

"I don't think there is going to be that much of a celebratory tone at WWDC," the analyst told AFP. "It could be more of a way for Apple to recover some credibility by showing where they're headed."

Industry insiders will be watching to see whether Apple addresses the AI stumble or focuses on less splashy announcements, including a rumored overhaul of its operating systems for its line of devices. — AFP

Swiss order UBS to boost capital to cover overseas holdings

SWITZERLAND'S government Friday announced new rules obliging banking giant UBS to strengthen its capital base in overseas subsidiaries to avoid a collapse that could destabilise the global economy.

The decision "draws lessons from (the) Credit Suisse crisis", which saw that bank bought out by UBS in 2023 after the failure of three US banks, the federal government said in a statement.

It set new rules including "stricter capital requirements for system-

ically important banks with foreign subsidiaries (and) additional requirements on the recovery and resolution of systemically important banks".

"The package of measures is intended to strengthen the Swiss financial centre and reduce the risks for the state, taxpayers and the economy," it added.

In practice, the measure only concerns UBS, since the country's other three top banks have no significant activities abroad. — AFP

Global smartphone shipment forecast for 2025 revised downward over tariff uncertainty: Report

MARKET intelligence research firm Counterpoint Research has lowered global smartphone shipment forecast for 2025. It has revised down its 2025 global smartphone shipment growth forecast to 1.9 per cent year-on-year from 4.2 per cent, citing uncertainties surrounding US tariffs.

However, most re-

gions will still likely see growth, except North America and China, according to Counterpoint Research's latest Market Outlook Smartphone Shipment Forecast Report.

Price increases from cost pass-throughs remain a key focal point, although the tariff situation remains fluid and unpredictable.

Commenting on the

revised forecast, Associate Director Liz Lee commented, "All eyes are on Apple and Samsung because of their exposure to the US market. Although tariffs have played a role in our forecast revisions, we are also factoring in weakened demand not just in North America but across Europe and parts of Asia."

Lee added, "We still

expect positive 2025 shipment growth for Apple driven by the iPhone 16 series' strong performance in Q1 2025."

Moreover, premiumisation trends remain supportive across emerging markets like India, Southeast Asia and Gulf countries – these are long-term tailwinds for iPhones, according to Lee. — ANI

Japan OKs 20 tril yen plan for disaster resilient infrastructure

A total of 10.6 trillion yen is earmarked for maintaining essential services, including transportation, communication, and energy infrastructure.

THE Japanese government on Friday approved a plan to enhance the disaster resilience of the country’s infrastructure over the next five years, with the project expected to cost more than 20 trillion yen (\$139 billion).
Focusing on measures to address aging infrastructure, the plan specifies 326 measures to be taken by government bodies from fiscal 2026 through 2030, while regional authorities bear part of the costs.
The approval by the Cabinet comes in light of prolonged water outages following a powerful earthquake that devastated the Noto Peninsula on New Year’s Day in 2024, and the formation

of a massive sinkhole in Yashio in Saitama Prefecture, neighboring Tokyo, which is believed to have been caused by sewer pipe corrosion.
The contents of the plan will be reflected in the government’s budget request for fiscal 2026, the first year of its expected enactment.
According to the plan, 10.6 trillion yen will be allocated for the maintenance of vital services, which include aging infrastructure, such as transportation, communication, and energy.
All sewer pipes with corrosion or damage that could lead to accidents will be repaired by fiscal 2030. — Kyodo

Colombian presidential contender has successful surgery after shooting

SHOCK and outrage swept Colombia on Saturday after presidential contender Miguel Uribe was gunned down at close range during a campaign event in Bogotá, leaving him fighting for his life.
A prominent Colombian right-wing presidential candidate who was shot during a campaign event in Bogota has successfully undergone initial surgery, the city’s mayor said Sunday.
Thirty-nine-year-old Senator Miguel Uribe was speaking to supporters in the capital when a gunman shot him twice in the head and once in the knee before being detained.
A security guard managed to detain the suspected attacker, a minor who is believed to be 15 years old.
Uribe was airlifted to hospital in “critical condition” and underwent a “neurosurgical” and “peripheral vascular procedure,” the Santa Fe Clinic in Bogota confirmed. — AFP

Pentagon threatens to send marines into Democrat-led California

US Defense Secretary Pete Hegseth indicated the possibility of sending Marine Corps troops to Los Angeles amid protests against a US government raid to find immigrants who stay in the country illegally.
Earlier, a raid by US Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) to identify undocumented immigrants in downtown Los Angeles escalated into clashes with protesters. White House Press Secretary Karoline Leavitt said that a 2,000-strong National Guard force would be deployed to Los Angeles amid the protests. California is traditionally considered a Democratic stronghold, and Trump has repeatedly criticized it. Last month, he threatened to cut state funding over the participation of a transgender athlete (the LGBT movement is considered extremist and is banned in Russia) in competitions. The administration has previously canceled \$126.4 million in flood prevention projects and criticized California’s handling of wildfires. — SPUTNIK

UFC 316: Joshua Van claims 3rd round TKO win over Bruno Silva

MYANMAR fighter Joshua Van secured a technical knockout victory in his bout at UFC 316, which was held in the United States on the morning of 8 June Myanmar time.

He faced off against Brazilian opponent Bruno Silva and claimed victory at four minutes and one second into the third round via referee stoppage. Throughout the fight, Joshua Van traded strikes with Bruno, but his powerful punches landed more effectively, causing significant damage to his opponent.

Bruno Silva responded early in the first round with a series of leg kicks, but Joshua Van countered well, repeatedly landing clean left-right combinations to Bruno's face. By the third round, the veteran Brazilian appeared to slow down, and Joshua Van capitalized with a barrage of punches, forcing the referee to stop the fight.

This marks Joshua Van's fourth consecutive win and his seventh victory under the UFC banner since signing with the promotion. — Shine Htet Zaw/KZL

Nakatani defeats Nishida in title unification bout

JUNTO Nakatani took a big step toward a potential future showdown with Naoya "Monster" Inoue by scoring a technical knockout of Ryosuke Nishida in their bantamweight title unification bout Sunday.

Nishida was unable to start the seventh round at Tokyo's Ariake Colosseum after dislocating his right shoulder, allowing Nakatani to add Nishida's IBF belt to his WBC belt.

Nishida also had visible swelling above his right eye.

The two previously undefeated boxers engaged in a slugfest from the opening round, with undisputed super bantamweight champion Inoue watching from ringside.

"I was determined to be aggressive from the first round after talks with my team," said Nakatani, who has been mostly based in the United States since graduating from junior high school in Japan.

"I'm happy to unify the bantamweight titles. It's a confidence booster."

Nakatani improved his professional record to 31-0, 24 of them by knockout. Nishida fell to 10-1 with two KOs.

Inoue and Nakatani have verbally agreed to fight each other next spring in what would be one of the most intriguing all-Japanese matchups in boxing history.

Earlier Sunday, former kickboxing star Tenshin Nasukawa defeated Victor Santillan of the Dominican Republic by unanimous decision in a 10-round bantamweight match.

Nasukawa aims to fight for a world title in his next bout. — Kyodo

Hip injury makes Atletico's Lenglet doubt for Club World Cup

ATLETICO Madrid faces a problem just a week before the start of its Club World Cup campaign, with news that central defender Clement Lenglet has suffered a hip injury.

The French international was scheduled to play for France against Germany in the UEFA Nations League third-place playoff but has been released from the squad due to the injury.

"Clement Lenglet had a medical test on Friday, 6 June for a hip injury," explained a communique from the French Football Federation (FFF), with Lenglet now set to return to Madrid to rejoin his club.

The Frenchman, who is on loan at Atletico from FC Barcelona, is now a doubt for at least the club's opening match in the Club World Cup. — Xinhua

Triple-hosted World Cup: huge ambition at a hefty cost to planet

THE largest and most far-flung World Cup kicks off in 12 months with a record 48 teams spread across Canada, the United States and Mexico and sceptics are asking whether its frenzied growth is worth the environmental cost.

FIFA, the governing body of world football, like the International Olympic Committee, insists it is working to reduce the carbon footprint. But the expansion from 32 competing nations to 48 and the resulting shift to multiple hosts both next year and in 2030, leads critics to question that claim.

"Unlike the case of the Olympic Games, where the carbon footprints have been reducing over the last several editions, this is totally opposite in the case of the

men's World Cup," David Gogishvili, a geographer at the University of Lausanne and a specialist in mega-sports events, told AFP.

While the 2022 World Cup in Qatar was certainly compact, it drew criticism for its oversized, air-conditioned stadiums built at breakneck speed in a small country with a scorching climate.

For 2026, all 16 stadiums — ranging in capacity from the 45,000-capacity Toronto Stadium to the 94,000-capacity cauldron of Dallas Stadium — already existed when the bid was made. — AFP

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Man who let snakes bite him 200 times spurs new antivenom hope

TIM Friede, a self-taught American snake enthusiast, has endured over 200 snakebites and injected himself with venom for nearly two decades in pursuit of immunity to snake venom, a practice known as mithridatism.

Following the September 11 attacks, he began this journey, believing he could contribute to the development of a universal antivenom.

Recent research published in the journal Cell revealed that antibodies from Friede's blood can protect against various snake venoms.

This breakthrough could lead to a universal antivenom, addressing the significant global health issue of snakebites, which claim up to 138,000 lives annually and cause numerous disabilities. — AFP

London design biennale builds cross-cultural platform for Global South

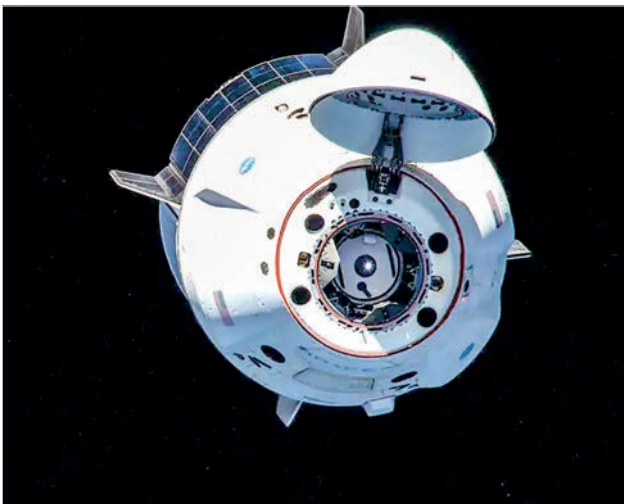
Somerset House, once home to civil servants, is also celebrating its 25th anniversary as an arts institution. The historic site now houses over 2,000 artisans and innovators.

NASA, ISRO to launch private mission to space with Indian pilot on 10 June



NATIONAL Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) on Saturday (local time) said that as part of a collaboration with ISRO, Axiom Mission 4 will be launched on 10 June, the fourth private astronaut mission from Axiom Space, which will be piloted by Indian astronaut Shubhanshu Shukla.

Axiom Mission 4 delivers on a commitment highlighted by US President Donald Trump and Prime Minister Narendra Modi to send the first ISRO astronaut to the station.

The space agencies are participating in five joint science investigations and two in-orbit science, technology, engineering, and mathematics demonstrations. NASA and ISRO have a long-standing relationship built on a shared vision to advance scientific knowledge and expand space collaboration, a statement by NASA said.

NASA, Axiom Space, and SpaceX are targeting 8:22 am (local time), Tuesday, 10 June, for launch of the fourth private astronaut mission to the International Space Station, Axiom Mission 4. The mission will lift off from Launch Complex 39A at NASA's Kennedy Space Centre in Florida. The crew will travel to the orbiting laboratory on a new SpaceX Dragon spacecraft after launching on the company's Falcon 9 rocket. The targeted docking time is approximately 12:30 pm, Wednesday (local time), 11 June, as per NASA. — ANI
