

Constitution empowers NDSC with final say on elections

Governing the nation through a democratically elected government remains the most effective and legitimate path to ensure stability, progress, and the will of the people.

SENIOR General Min Aung Hlaing underscored that as the government has taken responsibility of the State under the 2008 Constitution, it is essential to proceed towards a multi-party democratic system that the people aspire to.

The State Administration Council held its coordination meeting at the Office of the SAC Chairman in Nay Pyi aw yesterday morning, with an address by Chairman of the State Administration Council, Prime Minister Senior General Min Aung Hlaing.

Speaking at the meeting, the Senior General highlighted that it would be best if elections could be held on a nationwide scale, adding the Constitution outlines significant provisions regarding the convening of the Hluttaw (Parliament) under Sections 85, 128, and 155.

He underlined that a review of the laws shows that elections can be held successfully with substantial participation. Administering national affairs through an elected government is ultimately the best course for the country.

Tourism village rises near Nay Pyi Taw

A tourism model village is being developed near Nay Pyi Taw, aiming to help visitors to explore the knowledge of the local area during their vacation, said Myanmar Tourism Federation's vice chair U Naung Naung Han.

It is Nyaungpintha village, located at Magyipin village tract in Tatkon Township, Nay Pyi Taw Council Area, about an hour's drive from the Nay Pyi Taw hotel zone.

"MTF has set up a tourism village near Tatkon for tourists to take a half-day or a day trip. Houses in the village were washed away in the flood. MTF drafted a village plan and reconstructed 23 houses. We have already transferred the houses to the owners. People can visit the village and explore their culture," said U Naung

Naung Han.

At present, the community tourism has been under creation and visitors can enjoy local foods along with recreation activities at the village in future, he said.

"There is a small creek and a crop field by the village. We plan to develop a programme where visitors can

work on villagers' activities by themselves. International tourists have now visited Nay Pyi Taw, and they can feel the village's taste just by taking an hour's drive from the hotel zone," he added.

MTF has aimed to continue developing similar villages if the ongoing project achieves, he said. — Htet Oo Maung/ZS

The area along the cumulonimbus clouds movement, the weather phenomena such as strong winds accompanied with rain, thunder, lightning and hail may occur and therefore it is recommended to be aware in advance of these phenomena.

STATE OF THE SEA: Sea will be moderate in Myanmar waters. Wave height will be about 5-7 feet off and along Myanmar Coasts.

OUTLOOK FOR SUBSEQUENT TWO DAYS: Continuations of condition of thundery activities in the Central Myanmar areas.

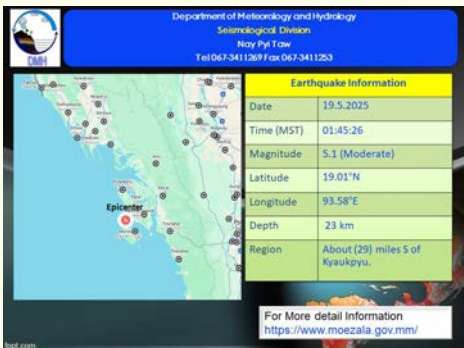

Residents Urged to Prioritize Public Safety Amid Armed Terrorist Threats

ARMED terrorists have been launching attacks by using residential homes and administrative buildings in towns and villages as cover, where they have forcibly settled. They aim to shield themselves from Tatmadaw counterattacks while also persuading temporarily displaced persons to return to their native areas and recruiting new members. That enables terrorists to use civilians as human shields. Tatmadaw is committed to safeguarding the sovereignty of the State and will respond to these threats based on intelligence and prevailing conditions. Therefore, residents in areas where terrorists have taken control must prioritize their safety and protect themselves from being exploited by these groups.

The Constitution also stipulates that elections can be held based on the final decision of the National Defence and Security Council.

The Senior General noted that those from administrative bodies at the state and regional levels, as well as at the district, township, ward, and village levels, have to possess sufficient qualifications. Those who hold administrative responsibilities and civil servants must remain free from party politics, he added.

With regard to the enhancement of the education sector, the Senior General retold that the establishment of Polytechnic Universities that combine computer studies and technology has been successful, and tangible outcomes have been observed.

He emphasized that it is crucial to manage and implement educational reforms with a long-term perspective in mind to produce skilled professionals in the fields of agriculture, livestock, and industry.

The Senior General gave guidance

to the region and state chief ministers and officials to manage the opening of all schools in their relevant regions.

He noted that terrorists have to understand that their destructive acts in the education sector are the same as destroying their future.

He urged officials from relevant sectors and from regions and states to cooperate with each other in enhancing the education and health sectors as a must.

As natural disasters brought loss and damage to the State, the Senior General recounted that Rakhine State faced K534.146 billion worth of loss and damage in cyclonic storm Mocha in 2023, but the government provided K73.797 billion from its budget to the state. In 2024, Typhoon Yagi caused K466.231 billion of loss, so the government spent more than K54.807 billion for rehabilitation operations. The loss caused by the powerful Mandalay earthquake, which struck on 28 March, totalled K3,629.288 billion, and rehabilitation measures are being taken.

He stressed that it is necessary to

take effective preventive measures in advance to minimize damage caused by natural disasters. Furthermore, since the losses and destruction resulting from armed conflicts are also immense, efforts must be made to achieve peace.

He noted that, according to the calculation, State incomes declined more than US\$8 billion due to weakness in meeting the target cultivation of crops. If productivity from the agriculture sector met the target, the country would secure some US\$14 billion more income.

Moreover, the Senior General gave a guideline that it is necessary to seek solutions for hiking prices of commodities and to address unbalanced situations between the supply and demand. Hence, efforts must be made to increase production.

The Senior General recognized the utmost efforts of personnel from the Ministry of Electric Power for the supply of electricity to the people, although terrorists destroy, disturb and threaten power plants and towers, not to generate and supply electricity.

He also acknowledged that service personnel from the Ministry of Transport and Communications could repair damaged roads and bridges in a few hours, although terrorists had exploded these facilities. Likewise, those from the Ministry of Construction also repair damaged roads and bridges as quickly as possible.

The Senior General stressed that the government must strive to become a reliable, trustworthy government for the people to set a good history.

The Nay Pyi Taw Council chairman and the chief ministers of regions and states discussed development undertakings in relevant areas, and work processes in the administration, economic and social sectors.

Also, present at the meeting were SAC Vice-Chairman Deputy Prime Minister Vice-Senior General Soe Win, Council Secretary General Aung Lin Dwe, Joint Secretary General Ye Win Oo, council members, Union-level dignitaries, Union ministers and deputy ministers. — MNA/TTA

6 Myanmar students win third place at OIBO 2025

STUDENTS from the BEHS Dagon 1 competed in the Open International Biology Olympic (OIBO) in Sirius, Russia, on the Sirius Federal Territory and won third prizes individually during the competitions.

They arrived back in Yangon yesterday evening, and were welcomed back by Yangon Region Social Affairs Minister U Htay Aung, Headmistress Dr Sandar Mya Nyein and teachers, parents and officials holding the State flag, vinyl posters and flowers in their hands.

The Open International Biology Olympiad (OIBO) 2025 is an international biology

competition aimed at encouraging students and young people to explore and solve current issues in biology and biotechnology. It is organized in collaboration with industrial partners to promote international cooperation and the exchange of experiences. Each participating country competes as a single national team. The students won third prizes in Zoology, Botany and Practical events held from 10 to 17 May.

The event took place for seven days in Sochi of Russia, and six Myanmar students from the BEHS Dagon 1 participated in the events. — MNA/KTZH

At the start of the ceremony, attendees observed a one-minute silence in remembrance of those who lost their lives in the Mandalay earthquake.

Following this, Deputy Minister Dr Aye Tun delivered a farewell address, noting that, during the national emergency caused by the Mandalay earthquake, 28 medical teams from

medical supplies, temporary tents, and building materials, for which the Ministry expressed profound gratitude. The Deputy Minister also emphasised that the Ministry of Health is

continuing rehabilitation efforts in line with the guidance of the government.

Quake kills 3,728 as rescue efforts continue

ON 28 March, Myanmar was struck by a devastating earthquake, severely striking six regions and states. As of 19 May, the death toll has risen to 3,728, with 5,104 injured and 79 still missing.

Search and rescue operations, conducted by the Myanmar Fire Brigade alongside domestic and international rescue teams, have been carried out promptly in affected areas. To date, 653 survivors have been rescued from collapsed buildings, and the bodies of 805 deceased have been recovered.

Local donors have con-

tinued to support the affected communities with financial assistance and essential supplies, while international countries, organizations, and philanthropists are also contributing. On 16 May, the Indian Embassy delivered 20 cartons of Paracetamol weighing 0.285 tonne to Yangon International Airport, followed by 19 cartons of ointments and household medicines weighing 0.279 tonne on 19 May.

The donated medicines and medical supplies will be handed over to the Ministry of Health for use in healthcare services. — MNA/MKKS

Speedboat training launched for flood rescue teams

THE Myanmar Social Relief Organization of the Mandalay Region Committee will organize and open a speedboat driving course at its office at the end of May.

It is aimed to help search and rescue operations in floods and to produce efficient and highly skilled rescuers.

Those who wish to attend must have completed the basic rescue training, be able to swim, and be willing to perform

meritorious deeds for rescue in water. Priority will be given to those who have worked with the regional committee during the rescue period. Participants must be between 20 and 40 years old and must meet the requirements.

It will be from 8 am to 5 pm from 25 to 30 May, lecturing with practical exercise on swimming assessment, rescue speed boats, engines, inflatable boat, inflatable +

fibre speed boat, fibre speed boat, aluminium speed boat driving and precautions, 18 hp / 30 hp / 40 hp / 50 hp / 60 hp engine usage and precautions, accidents and solutions, and long-term maintenance methods.

All teaching aids will be provided by the organization, but the participants will have to pay half of the fuel costs for the speed boats, it said. — MT/ZN

28 overseas employment agencies face blacklisting, licence revocation over unpaid taxes by 31 May

THE Ministry of Labour has announced that 28 overseas employment agencies would have their licences revoked and blacklisted if they do not pay taxes by 31 May.

The Ministry of Labour informed the relevant agencies on 7 June 2024 that they must file tax reports to the relevant township revenue offices by August 2024 after sending workers abroad for the financial year 2023-2024.

Furthermore, among the agencies required to pay taxes, those that had not yet paid were notified on 9 May 2025 that they needed to pay their taxes by 31 May.

The Ministry of Labour has

instructed the 28 agencies that have not yet paid their taxes to do so at the relevant township revenue offices by 31 May and to submit their reports on time. Failure to comply will result in the revocation of their overseas employment agency licences and their inclusion on the blacklist.

These 28 agencies are Aung San Moe Co Ltd, Diamond Bagan General Services Co Ltd, Fore Signal Int’l Services Co Ltd, Forerunner Myanmar Co Ltd, Global Champion Co Ltd, Htoo Aung Hlyan Co Ltd, JJA Support Co Ltd, JMK Service Co Ltd, Job Success Co Ltd, MAX Success Co Ltd, Moe More Family General

Services Co Ltd, Mingalar Asia Co Ltd, Mya Yeik Hlyan Co Ltd, Gwe Kyal Wint Co Ltd and Royal Four Seas Services Co Ltd, according to the Ministry of Labour.

In addition, SMZ Co Ltd, Seven Day Ayar Lwin Co Ltd, Shwe Lwin Lwin Co Ltd, Shwe Poe Myanmar Group Co Ltd, Shwe Thiri Chan Thar Services Co Ltd, Shwe Zin Inter Co Ltd, Southern Treasure Co Ltd, Super Tip Co Ltd, Swan Aung Myin General Services Co Ltd, Thaw Tar Myint Moh Services Co Ltd, Vega & Mira Co Ltd, Ya Wai Myaing Family Co Ltd, and Yadanar Su Latt Co Ltd are also involved. — ASH/MKKS

Myanmar exports 230+ tonnes of honey in Apr

MYANMAR exported 236.9 tonnes of honey valued at US\$0.355 million in April of the current financial year 2025-2026, according to the Apiculture Division under the Livestock Breeding and Veterinary Department.

The seaborne honey export exceeded 860.68 tonnes, while the border posts registered 47.8 tonnes of honey exports from April to November 2024. Myanmar's honey is mostly sent to Japan, with 96.21 tonnes worth \$144,315, followed by Thailand with 140.7 tonnes worth \$211,050. Myanmar exports honey to China, Japan, South Korea, and Thailand. Myanmar delivered over 2,200 metric tonnes of honey to foreign trade partners in the last FY 2023-2024 (April-March), the Apiculture Division's data indicated.

Sagaing and Mandalay regions are the leading producers of Myanmar's honey. Myanmar's beekeeping businesses are also found in Yangon, Bago and Magway regions, Kachin, Kayah, Kayin and Shan states. Myanmar produces sesame honey, jujube honey, Niger honey, sunflower honey, lychee honey and flower honey.

Myanmar's honey production is estimated at over 4,000 metric tonnes annually. Sixty per cent went to foreign markets while the remaining was designated for domestic consumption. Honey is utilized as a traditional medicine in the country.

There are some state-owned beekeeping stations with 6,200 beehives in 31 townships and over 950 private beekeeping businesses operating with nearly 200,000 beehives. Moreover, two million acres of

crops contribute to bee pollination annually. The beekeeping businesses near the crop fields contribute to the successful yield of the crop as well as quality bee production. — NN/KK

China leads Myanmar rice imports in Apr

CHINA is the largest importer of Myanmar rice, with over 61,500 tonnes of rice and broken rice in April, according to the Myanmar Rice Federation (MRF).

Belgium is the second largest importer of Myanmar rice with over 20,000 tonnes, followed by 13,300 tonnes to the UK, over 12,000 to Bulgaria, over 8,500 to Spain, over 5,790 to the Philippines, over 3,300 to Poland, and 2,600 to Indonesia.

Myanmar exported over

140,000 tonnes of rice to the international market by sea in April.

Myanmar bagged over US\$1.129 billion from 2.48 million tonnes of rice and broken rice exports in the financial year 2024-2025 (1 April 2024-31 March 2025). The federation aims to achieve 2.5 million tonnes of rice exports in the FY 2024-2025, falling short of the target slightly.

Ministry of Commerce is working together with the Un-

ion of Myanmar Federation of Chambers of Commerce and Industry, Myanmar Rice Federation, Myanmar Pulses, Beans, Maize and Sesame Seeds Merchants Association, Myanmar Garment Manufacturers Association, Myanmar Industries Association, Myanmar Rubber Planters and Producers Association, Myanmar Fisheries Products Processors and Exporters Association to meet monthly export targets and facilitate exports. — NN/KK

Yangon palm oil reference price edges down

THE wholesale reference rate of palm oil set for the Yangon market was poised for a decrease to K6,525 per viss for a week ending 25 May from K6,620 per viss in the previous week (18 May), according to the Supervisory Committee on Edible Oil Import and Distribution.

The Supervisory Committee on Edible Oil Import and Distribution under the Ministry of Commerce has been closely observing the FOB prices in Malaysia and Indonesia, adding transport costs, tariffs and banking services to decide the wholesale market reference rate for edible oil weekly.

Despite the reference price, the market price is way too high. To control overcharging, the Consumer Affairs Department under the Ministry of Commerce informed consumers of lodging complaints for overcharging through the call centre hotline in late August. The department urges consumers not to buy palm oil at high prices.

The Committee notified that any person who is involved in price gouging and oil storage to attempt market manipulation will face legal action under the Essential Goods and Services Law. The department is working together with the Myanmar Oil Dealers' Association and the cooking oil importing companies to offer affordable rates of imported palm oil for consumers.

The complaints for overcharging can be lodged over hotline 1535 of the call centre of the Consumers Affairs Department, or sent to the Facebook page of the department and the region and state departments concerned.

The domestic palm oil consumption is estimated at one million tonnes per year. The local palm oil production is just about 400,000 tonnes. About 700,000 tonnes of palm oil are yearly imported through Malaysia and Indonesia to meet domestic demands. — NN/KK

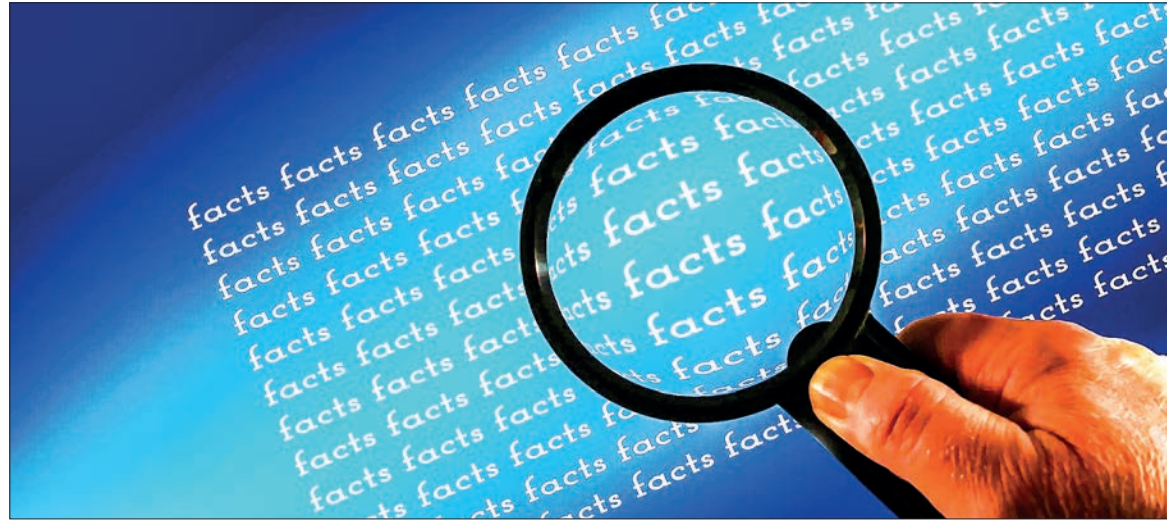

THE government promotes the agriculture and livestock sectors, and the harvesting processes of summer paddy in Yangon Region are completed. Meanwhile, the Ngamoeyeik dam supplied water to 35,952 acres of summer paddy and drinking water in the region.

In 2024-2025, the dam provided water to a total of 35,952 acres of summer paddy — 22,133 acres from Ngamoeyeik canals, 7,250 acres from sluice gates and 6,614 acres from electric-powered water pumping projects. Moreover, the dam also supplies water, 130 million gallons in summer and 90 million gallons in monsoon, to Nyaungnapin and Aungdagun water treatment plants in Yangon.

In Yangon Region, the water was supplied to summer paddy fields through the tributaries, left and right main canals of Ngamoeyeik from 15 December 2024 to 7 May 2025. The officials also cooperated with the Water User Group to prevent water waste. They also set up the shutters at the spill-

way of Ngamoeyeik and placed the sandbags at the spillways of Mahuya and Paunglin spillways to store water.

“The Ngamoeyeik Dam daily supplies water for the summer paddy and also drinking water in Yangon. The harvesting of summer paddy is nearly

complete. The dam distributed water to 35,952 acres of summer paddy on 7 May as a final move. It supplies water to two Nyaungnapin water treatment plants daily in Yangon. Ngamoeyeik Dam is a reliable dam for agriculture and drinking water. We are also glad that we can supply enough water to the agricultural sector and drinking water to the city,” said U Tun Lwin, staff officer of the dam.

The Ngamoeyeik Dam is located about two miles from Phaunggyi Village in Hlegu Township, Yangon Region, and it is 15,500 feet long, 75 feet in height and has a capacity of 180,000-acre feet of water. It supplies water to 33,852 acres of irrigated areas.

The Ministry of Agriculture, Livestock and Irrigation distributes water from Ngamoeyeik dam (Mahuya Dam and Paunglin Dam), Lagoonbyin Dam and Kalihtaw Dam in Hlegu Township and Tabu Hla Dam in Taikkyi Township. — Nyein Thu (MNA)/KTZH

4-day illegal trade
crackdown seizes goods
worth K696M

UNDER the supervision of the Illegal Trade Eradication Steering Committee, efforts to combat the illicit trade are continued effectively by the law.

On 16, 17 and 18 May, the combined teams impounded 3.89 tonnes of illegal teak (worth K1.95 million) in Lewe district, industrial materials (worth K55.48 million) without official documents from 18 containers at the Asia World Port, foodstuffs (valued at K4.32 million) without official documents from the luggage of a passenger from Malaysia to Myanmar at the Yangon International Airport, and a Yutong bus (worth approximately K70 million) carrying consumer goods (valued at K5.53 million) without official documents at the Mayanchaung permanent checkpoint. The action was conducted under the Forest Law and Customs procedures.

Additionally, on 18 and 19 May, the combined on-duty teams seized a Nissan Caravan (estimated value of K30 million) carrying foodstuffs (valued at K3.04 million) without official documents in Phayagyi, 0.484

tonne of illegal hardwood and 7.418 tonnes of illegal timbers (valued at K1.17 million) in Bago and Nyaunglebin districts, and two unregistered vehicles (worth approximately K6.5 million) in Thayawady and Minhla Townships. The action was taken under the Forest Law, the Export-Import Law, and Customs procedures.

On 19 May, the combined teams captured 5.761 tonnes of illegal teak (valued at K10.13 million) in Monywa Township, consumer goods (worth K499.5 million) without official documents at the Yadanabon bridge checkpoint in Sagaing Township, and industrial materials and foodstuffs (worth K8.45 million) without official documents in Pauktaw Township of Rakhine State. The action was taken under the Export-Import Law and the Forest Law.

The Illegal Trade Eradication Steering Committee reported 19 arrests on four consecutive days from 16 to 19 May, confiscating illegal goods worth approximately K696 million. — MNA/MKKS

THE Myanmar government, in collaboration with international organizations and neighbouring countries, is rigorously investigating and eradicating telecom fraud and related criminal activities. In cases involving foreign nationals, the government systematically repatriates them to their respective countries.

Yesterday, 26 Ugandan nationals were deported to their home country via the Myanmar-Thailand Friendship Bridge II, following legal procedures and considering humanitarian and bilateral relations. To ensure a smooth and systematic deportation process, U Myint Phone, Deputy Director of the

Immigration and Population Department of Kayin State, and other officials instructed relevant departments to maintain accurate records and data.

The handover ceremony was attended by Deputy Director U Myint Phone, officials from the Ugandan Embassy to Malaysia, including Ambassador Ms Betty O Bigombe, and representatives from the Thai Immigration Department of Tak Province. Myanmar officials formally handed over the deportation documents to the representatives of the respective countries.

Between 30 January and 19 May 2025, Myanmar authorities

detained a total of 9,086 foreign nationals who had illegally entered the country. Of these, 8,438 individuals were deported to their respective countries through Thailand, following legal procedures. The remaining 648 foreign nationals are ready for repatriation and are being well looked after.

The Myanmar government remains committed to thoroughly investigating online scams and online gambling activities in collaboration with neighbouring countries and international organizations. Further actions will continue to be taken against those involved. — MNA/MKKS

Three Myanmar women hurt fleeing
police in Malaysia

THREE Myanmar women were injured when they jumped the wall after seeing a police car stop at the front of the factory where they were working in Selangor State, Malaysia.

They arrived in Malaysia just three months ago, and they thought the police were conducting a raid at the factory as part of the crackdown operation on undocumented foreigners; that is why they tried to escape and got injured in the head and leg.

Of the three, one broke her leg, another one underwent eight stitches for a cut on the

head, and the third one got a leg dislocation.

"The factory helped them to visit the hospital, but nothing else. They don't have money and have difficulty even with

food," said the 'Lovely Heart' philanthropic Myanmar youth blood donor group in Malaysia.

The group visited them and gave financial support worth 1,300 ringgits. — MT/ZS

China's industrial sector posts steady growth amid continued economic recovery

CHINA'S industrial production continued to see stable growth in April as the country's economic performance held steady against external headwinds.

China's value-added industrial output expanded 6.1 per cent year on year in April, the National Bureau of Statistics (NBS) said on Monday.

The manufacturing sector saw its value-added output climb 6.6 per cent year on year last month, with that of equipment manufacturing and high-tech manufacturing up by 9.8 per cent and 10 per cent, respectively, according to the official data.

In the first four months of

this year, the country's industrial output gained 6.4 per cent compared to a year ago, the data showed.

The industrial output is used to measure the activity of large enterprises each with an annual main business turnover of at least 20 million yuan (about US\$2.78 million).

With effective policy support, the industrial sector has maintained relatively rapid expansion this year, making solid progress in high-end, intelligent and green transformation, NBS spokesperson Fu Linghui told a press conference on Monday.

Monday's data showed the

production of 3D printing equipment, industrial robots and new energy vehicles surged 60.7 per cent, 51.5 per cent and 38.9 per cent year on year in April, respectively. In the first quarter of this year, the country's industrial profits amounted to nearly 1.51 trillion yuan, up by 0.8 per cent from the same period in 2024.

Despite the positive trend, Fu cautioned that some enterprises still face difficulties in operations and called for more efforts to expand domestic demand and implement supportive policies to foster innovation-driven development. — Xinhua

Japan projects shortage of 3.26 mln workers in AI, robotics by 2040

JAPAN will face a shortfall of 3.26 million workers in fields related to artificial intelligence (AI) and robotics by 2040, the country's Ministry of Economy, Trade and Industry (METI) projected Monday.

In its workforce projections, the ministry estimates that Japan will need 4.98 million workers specialized in AI and robotics by 2040. However, at the current pace of human resource development, only 1.72 million will be available.

Additionally, the manufacturing sector is expected to be short by 2.81 million workers for production processes as demand is projected to reach 8.65 million workers, while the supply is expected to be just 5.84 million.

In contrast, labour surpluses are forecast in several other fields. The office administration sector is projected to have an excess of 2.14 million workers, the sales sector 510,000, and the service sector

around 100,000.

The ministry also analyzed workforce needs by education level. By 2040, Japan is expected to face a shortage of 600,000 university graduates with science and engineering backgrounds.

On the other hand, there will be a surplus of 280,000 liberal arts university graduates and 70,000 with liberal arts post-graduate degrees. — Xinhua

China-US tariff cut good for bilateral trade growth, global recovery: spokesperson

THE significant reduction of tariffs between China and the United States is beneficial for trade growth between the two countries and global economic recovery, an official with the National Bureau of Statistics (NBS) said at a press conference on Monday.

The current international environment remains complex and severe, with a rise in unilateralism and protectionism, which poses serious challenges to the international economic and trade order and constrains global economic growth, NBS spokesperson Fu Linghui said.

However, the trend of international cooperation for win-win outcomes will not change, Fu noted, adding that China's commitment to expanding its opening up will remain steadfast.

The country's diversification of foreign trade is being steadily advanced, and the policies aimed at promoting foreign trade development are yielding continuous results, which will continue to support the steady growth of foreign trade, Fu added. — Xinhua

Thailand's economic growth softens to 3.1% in Q1

THAILAND'S economy expanded 3.1 per cent in the first quarter of 2025 from a year earlier, driven by public investment and exports despite slowing private and government consumption, official data showed on Monday.

The country's gross domestic product (GDP) in the January-March period softened from an upwardly revised 3.3 per cent growth in the previous three months, which was the strongest increase since the third quarter of 2022, according to the Office of the National Economic and Social Development Council (NESDC).

On a quarterly basis, the GDP grew a seasonally adjusted 0.7 per cent in the first quarter of this year, quickening from a 0.4 per cent rise in the final quarter of 2024, registering the fifth consecutive period of expansion, the NESDC said in a statement.

The Southeast Asian nation's economy is expected to grow in a range of 1.3 per cent to 2.3 per cent this year, down from 2.3 per cent to 3.3 per cent forecast earlier, said NESDC secretary-general Danucha Pichayanon.

Looking ahead, the expansion is bolstered by rising public

investment, an ongoing increase in private consumption amid low unemployment and inflation rates, along with the recovery of the tourism sector and related services, Danucha told a news conference.

However, economic growth is projected to slow in the second half of the year due to a global economic and trade slowdown and the impact of trade protection measures, as well as additional downside risks from agricultural volatility, he noted. — Xinhua

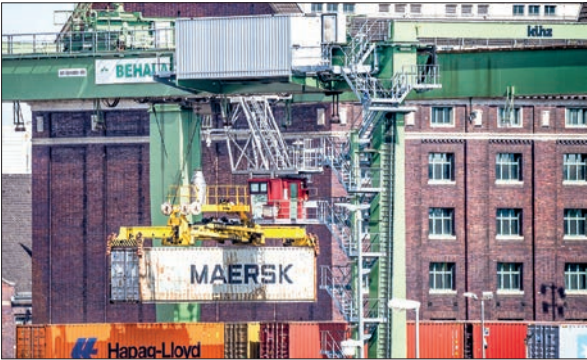
Trump tariffs force EU to cut 2025 eurozone growth forecast

THE EU on Monday sharply cut its eurozone economic growth forecast for 2025 because of global trade tensions sparked by US President Donald Trump's sweeping tariffs.

The European Commission said the 20-country single currency area's economy should grow 0.9 per cent in 2025 — down from a previous forecast of 1.3 per cent — due to "a weakening global trade outlook and higher trade policy uncertainty".

The EU also lowered its prediction for eurozone growth in 2026 to 1.4 per cent, down from 1.6 per cent expected in November last year.

"Underpinned by a robust labour market and rising wages, growth is

expected to continue in 2025, albeit at a moderate pace," EU economy chief Valdis Dombrovskis said.

Trump has hit the European Union and others with 25-per-cent levies on steel, aluminium and auto imports, and the bloc faces sweeping additional tariffs unless it reaches a deal

with Washington.

The US leader announced a 20-per-cent levy on most EU goods in April, along with higher duties on dozens of other nations.

That measure has since been frozen until July to allow negotiations, but Trump has kept a "baseline" 10 per cent tar-

iff on imports from around the world, including the 27-country EU.

The EU also said Germany, the bloc's biggest economy, would not grow at all in 2025, a significantly sharp reduction from the 0.7 per cent predicted last year.

"The risks to the outlook remain tilted to the downside, so the EU must take decisive action to boost our competitiveness," Dombrovskis said.

After a previous mandate focused on fighting climate change, the commission's focus has pivoted to competitiveness, seeking to make life for businesses easier in the face of fierce competition from Chinese and American firms. — AFP

Tokyo stocks fall as US downgrade fuels fears over stronger yen

TOKYO stocks dropped Monday, weighed down by the selling of some exporters as the downgrading of US debt by a major credit rating agency raised concerns about the yen's further appreciation against the US dollar.

The 225-issue Nikkei Stock Average ended down 255.09 points, or 0.68 per cent, from Friday at

37,498.63. The broader Topix index finished 2.06 points, or 0.08 per cent, lower at 2,738.39.

On the top-tier Prime Market, decliners were led by marine transportation, oil and coal product, and insurance issues.

The dollar fell to the upper 144 yen range in Tokyo, pressured by selling after Moody's on Fri-

day downgraded its US credit rating by one notch from top triple-A rating.

Stocks declined as some export-oriented machinery and electronics issues were sold on the firmer yen, which decreases exporters' overseas profits when repatriated, with the move by the rating agency fueling fears about the yen's

further gain versus the dollar.

"Rising (US) interest rates stemming from concerns about fiscal health leads to a weaker dollar, thus having a negative impact on Japanese stocks," said Masahiro Yamaguchi, head of investment research at SMBC Trust Bank. — Kyodo

Pope Leo gives inauguration Mass attended by world figures

POPE Leo XIV gave his inauguration Mass as the new head of the Catholic Church in St Peter's Square in Vatican City on Sunday, with world figures, including US-Vice President JD Vance, attending.

"It is the hour of love," the 267th pontiff said during the service, calling to build a Catholic Church that "opens its arms to the world". The first American in the role, Pope Leo XIV was elected on 8 May

to succeed the late Pope Francis.

"Love and unity: these are the two dimensions of the mission entrusted to (the disciple) Peter by Jesus," he stressed in his homily.

The Japanese government has sent former Prime Minister Taro Aso, a Catholic and top advisor to the ruling Liberal Democratic Party, to the event to help "deepen friendly and cooperative ties" with the Vatican.

The pope visited Japan's Nagasaki in 2008, when he was known as Robert Prevost, to attend the beatification of 188 Japanese martyrs by Pope Benedict XVI, according to Catholics in the southwestern city.

Father Futoshi Matsuo of Shiroyama Catholic Church in the city, one of the local Catholics who met him then, said, "He was a person who listened warmly to what others had to say, rather than speak

himself." "I am sure he will continue to set an example by practising peace building through dialogue," Matsuo said. — Kyodo

US launches "endless war" to plunder others' resources: Iranian president

IRANIAN President Masoud Pezeshkian said here Sunday that the United States has begun an "endless war" across the world to plunder other countries' resources and even human workforce, the official news agency IRNA reported.

The West seeks to provoke conflicts in the Middle East to own the regional countries' resources at any price it wants, Pezeshkian said at the opening ceremony of the Tehran Dialogue Forum, a two-day event that has drawn 200 foreign delegations, including senior government officials and representatives of international organizations, to discuss regional and global challenges.

Pezeshkian added that Iran has nothing to hide and will under no circumstances stop its "peaceful nuclear programme".

Iranian Foreign Minister Seyed Abbas Araghchi, talking about the Iran-US indirect talks at the ceremony, said Iran wants "a fair and balanced agreement that would be formed within the framework of the NPT (Non-Proliferation Treaty) and based on full respect for Iran's nuclear rights and guarantee the removal of sanctions in an

objective manner." He added that Iran is ready to open a new chapter in its ties with Europe if the latter has a real determination and adopts an independent approach towards Iran. — Xinhua

"Iran is committed to diplomacy and expects the cruel and unilateral sanctions, which have directly targeted our people, to be truly and tangibly lifted," he said.

S Korea's Democratic Party candidate leads poll for 3 June presidential election

LEE Jae-myung, presidential candidate of South Korea's majority liberal Democratic Party, led a poll for the 3 June presidential election, Flower Research survey showed Monday.

Lee came out on top with a support rate of 52.1 per cent, taking a big lead over Kim Moon-soo, the second-biggest conservative People Power Party's presidential candidate who garnered 29.5 per cent of support.

The human rights lawyer-turned-politician maintained his position as a presidential frontrunner in the 3 June election, triggered by the removal of former President Yoon Suk-yeol from office over his botched martial law imposition last December.

Lee lost the 2022 presidential election to Yoon by the country's narrowest margin of 0.73 percentage points.

The Democratic Party won an approval score of 50.3 per cent, while 32.0 per cent supported the People Power Party, the survey showed.

The result was based on a poll of 2,007 voters conducted between Friday and Saturday. It had plus and minus 2.2 percentage points in margin of error with a 95-per-cent confidence level. — Xinhua

Joe Biden diagnosed with aggressive prostate cancer

FORMER US president Joe Biden has been diagnosed with an "aggressive" form of prostate cancer that has spread to his bones, and is reviewing treatment options, a statement from his office said Sunday.

On Friday the 82-year-old Democrat was diagnosed with the cancer after he experienced increasing urinary symptoms and was seen for a new finding of a prostate nodule, the statement said.

"While this represents a more aggressive form of the disease, the cancer appears to be hormone-sensitive which allows for effective management. The President and his family are reviewing treatment options with his physicians," it continued.

Cancer cells are commonly found in the prostates of men of Biden's age, though in most cases they grow slowly. Hormone therapy is a common

treatment that can shrink tumours and slow cancer growth, but is not a cure.

According to the statement, Biden's cancer was found to have "a Gleason score of 9 (Grade Group 5)." Prostate cancer that looks "very abnormal" is assigned the highest rating, Grade 5, according to the American Cancer Society. The Gleason Score often indicates the sum of the grades from the two areas in the prostate that make up most of the cancer, but can also be calculated other ways. — AFP

Napoli close in on Serie A title despite Parma stalemate

NAPOLI will have to wait one more week to seal the Serie A title after being held to a goalless draw at Parma while closest rivals Inter Milan drew 2-2 a dramatic game with Lazio.

Antonio Conte's team stay one point ahead of Inter and were unfortunate not to win after twice striking the woodwork through Andre-Frank Zambo Anguissa and Matteo Politano, while Scott McTominay also had a free-kick tipped onto the crossbar.

The away side thought they would be handed a chance to take the points from the penalty spot in 96 minutes when David Neres was fouled, only for the decision to be reversed for a foul committed by Giovanni Simeone earlier in the move.

A feisty match at the Stadio Ennio Tardini ended with Conte and his Parma counterpart Cristian Chivu both being sent off following a blazing row between the two dugouts in the final moments.

However a home win on the final day against Cagliari, who are safe thanks to a 3-0 win over second-from-bottom Venezia, will give Napoli a fourth league crown. — AFP



Israeli PM says to take control of all Gaza

ISRAELI Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu said on Monday that Israel will take control of Palestine's entire Gaza Strip, while speaking on recently intensified Israeli military operations.

In a video speech posted on the messaging platform Telegram, Netanyahu said "We are going to take control of the entire territory of the enclave — that is what we are going to do."

Speaking a day after announcing the partial resumption of humanitarian aid to Gaza, Netanyahu said Israel will allow only "minimal and basic" assistance for a limited period, not specifying when the aid entry will resume.

Israel has prevented all aid from entering the Palestinian enclave since 2 March, stating the move is aimed at pressuring Hamas to agree to a hostage release deal on terms acceptable to Israel. The total blockade — including food, medicines and fuel — has worsened the severe humanitarian crisis there and prompted a warning of famine by UN experts.

In the video, Netanyahu said the limited resumption of aid was prompted by pressures from Israel's allies, because the allies "cannot accept images of mass starvation" in Gaza.

"Therefore, to achieve victory, we need to somehow solve the problem (of hunger)," Netanyahu said. — Xinhua

Bucharest mayor wins Romanian presidential election with 53.6% of vote

BUCHAREST Mayor Nicusor Dan is leading in the Romanian presidential runoff with 53.6 per cent, while the leader of the opposition Alliance for the Unification of Romanians (AUR) party, George Simion, has 46.4 per cent of the votes, according to the country's central electoral bureau after counting 100 per cent of the votes.

The leader of the opposition nationalist party Alliance for the Union of Romanians (AUR) George Simion admitted defeat in the Romanian presidential election and congratulated his rival, Bucharest Mayor Nicusor Dan.

The first round took place on 4 May, with Simion (41 per cent) and Dan (21 per cent) receiving the most votes.

Romania's 2025 presidential election comes amid a political crisis caused by the annulment of the results of the first round held in 2024, when independent candidate Calin Georgescu won but the vote was overturned

due to alleged interference in the election process via social media. The decision sparked protests in the country and accusations that the Romanian government is suppressing the opposition, including from the US administration. — SPUTNIK

More flights cancelled at Paris' airport due to traffic control failure

FIFTEEN per cent of daily flights were cancelled at the Paris-Orly airport following an air traffic control system breakdown on Monday.

The cancellation was requested by France's Directorate General of Civil Aviation (DGAC). A "radar failure" had caused a cancellation of around 130 flights or 40 per cent of air traffic at the airport on Sunday, affecting thousands of passengers, reported the French newspaper Le Figaro.

"The situation is improving, but still requires air traffic to be regulated," as repairs are underway, said the DGAC.

Located 10 kilometres south of the French capital, the Paris-Orly airport handled over 33 million passengers in 2024, official figures show. — Xinhua

Sri Lankan president pledges to prevent repeat of civil war tragedies

SRI Lankan President Anura Kumara Dissanayake on Monday reaffirmed his unwavering commitment to ensuring that the tragic events of the past are never repeated in Sri Lanka, the President's Media Division (PMD) said in a statement.

Sri Lanka marked the 16th National War Heroes' Day celebrations on

Monday. This coincides with the end of the country's 30-year conflict in 2009.

Dissanayake visited the Mihindu Seth Medura convalescent home in Attidiya on Monday morning, where he met war veterans receiving long-term care and rehabilitation.

Reflecting on the long-term consequences of the 30-year conflict, Dissanayake noted that the 30-year conflict had left a lasting impact on the nation, with many from both the north and south suffering not only the loss of life but also severe physical injuries. He reiterated his firm commitment to ensuring that such a tragedy is never repeated, according to the PMD. — Xinhua

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
