## Pinlaung tea leaves receive orders from Yangon Region

IT is time that tea leaves have been short of supply and Pinlaung-produced tea leaves have received orders the most from Yangon Region.

Over the next months, cleaning work will start in tea farms and tea leaves will fall down in foggy weather so the supply of tea leaves has been short and the price has been high.

"Now, tea leave production is low. But the price is high. The supply is unable to provide adequately to meet the demand. Tea leaves have received continual orders. Most are from Yangon Region. It is expected that tea leaf prices will continue climbing up in coming months and fall in monsoon only," said Ma Mu Mu Tin Yi, a tea farmer from Pinlaung Township.

This year's tea leaf production was good as young tea plumules grew much due to high rainfall.

"The production was larger this year because there were continual rains, which helped young leaves increasingly grow. Even in winter, there is rain sometimes. High rainfall can help the growth of the tea leaf production," she added. In southern Shan State's Ywangan, due to the difficulty of sun-drying tea leaves in July, farmers produced fresh tea leaves more and the fresh tea leaf trade was good. — Thit Taw/ZS

### Door-to-door cooking oil delivery system serves 6,000 households daily in Yangon Region

THE Myanmar Edible Oil Dealers and Entrepreneurs Association has reported receiving up to 100,000 daily orders for cooking oil (palm oil) through their call centre. Approximately 6,000 households benefit from a door-to-door delivery service each day.

"To provide convenience for workers in industrial zones, we have introduced a door-to-door cooking oil delivery system," said U San Lin, Chairman of the association. "The system has proven effective during the trial period, ensuring direct distribution to consumers. For others, we use an oil purchase booklet system to

ensure smooth access, which has also been highly efficient".

The delivery service caters to about 6,000 households daily, reaching up to 150,000 households monthly.

This door-to-door system, launched on 31 July 2024, is supervised by the Yangon Region Government in collaboration with the Yangon Region Consumer Affairs Department and the Myanmar Edible Oil Dealers and Entrepreneurs Association. It aims to support households struggling to access cooking oil shops and provides a convenient and quick delivery solution. — ASH/TMT

With severe restrictions on imports, this current account is always likely to be in surplus. Yet imports continued to flow in like a tidal wave across a large number of porous borders. Without considering these unofficial statistics, we will not be able to judge the economy correctly and we would be misinterpreting the

economic signals on most fronts. With the dearth of credible economic statistics being publicize, it does not help but accentuate the bombardment of negative news coming out via fake news circles encamped within the perimeters of Chiang Mai, Thailand. How would we be able to take the correct remedy, if we do not know of genuine facts and figures?

Yet, we are still dragging each other down, oblivious to the fact that other countries, especially those neighbouring us, are treating us like dirt. We cursed and swore at our leaders online, attacked Myanmar's own brands, businesses and companies if there was the slightest hint of them supporting our own government and Tamadaw and shoved our competitors into the trench vengefully for even the slightest of mistakes. Myopic, as blind as a bat, tunnel vision would come to our minds. Do they not know that our destiny is all tied by the same red passport that we have to hold when we get out of this land?

Nonetheless, the majority seem to have fallen into the trap of those instigators who want the country to fail and the economy wrecked because these campaigners no longer share our destiny. Holding passports of the Western countries (US, UK, Australia, etc.) they called for upheaval and continuing revolution, bestowing distrust among our nationals and promoting the mass murders of one another. #### **Getting the Inflation Wrong**

CBM and MOF stated the last FY inflation officially at 27 per cent. With the US dollar rates going up nearly 300 per cent within the last three years, you know for sure, that the imported inflation is somewhere around that figure. The danger here is that inflation is becoming unanchored; with no third party or credible confirmation on inflation figures, the headline figure becomes flexible without any targeted number by CBM or the MOF. This long period of inflation would lead to both individuals and companies, expecting more price rises in the

Researchers from the Western world have proven that an

unexpected 1 per cent increase in CPI or RPI (Consumer/Retail Price Index) produces a 0.7 per cent rise in inflationary expectations for the future and the fact that the unexpected increase continued to exert influence over future pricing decisions.

Once this expectation has set in, it would become even more dire warning for the CBM/MOF perhaps, but getting the truth out, setting the targets and garnering support, especially from the business community would be an excellent start. Else, the future looks grim.

These confidence-building exercises alone would be a much-needed uplift to the economy, without costing anything to the State.

#### When would be the right time

The current Thai Prime

Minister is 38. Singapore's Prime Minister is 48. Last year, when Cambodia's Ambassador to Myanmar left the country, he was 34. The new Ambassador is 39 years old. I believe you be hardpressed to find any ambassadors or ministers of Myanmar below the ripe old age of 60. The majority of them have been on this earth for more than six decades. Being older may equate to being wiser with better judgement, but it also means that they would be unwilling to make changes, slow in decision making, 'cheugy' in technology and reluctant to upset the status quo. Worst of all, they are likely to be 'yes' men and avoid publicity, challenges and controversies.

Even in a recent election in a statutory board (council), the people wanting to occupy the top posts are 73 and 71 years old Both of them are competing with another 50-year-old, whom they deemed to be young to take on the responsibility. Opportunity for youth only exists in books and words in Myanmar perhaps.

Would it not be better if the youth were given a chance to face challenges while being guided by the experience? Would it not be preferable for the country to generate youthful and contemporary ideas from the qualified youth (around 50 years old)?

## Illegal items worth over K1 bln seized across nation on 19, 20, 21 Dec

SUPERVISED by the Illegal Trade Eradication Steering Committee, action is being taken under the law against illicit trading across the nation.

On 19 December, combined teams managed by the Customs Department conducted inspections at the Asia World Port Terminal container checkpoint and seized one type of industrial material (worth K553 million) in 12 containers without legal documentation, and six types of unofficial industrial material (worth K2.1 million) at Yangon International Airport (Import). Action was taken according to Customs procedures.

Additionally, on 20 December, combined teams managed by the Sagaing Region Illegal Trade Eradication Task Force

seized one unregistered motorcycle (worth K400,000) in Monywa, and the action was taken under the Import and Export Law.

On 21 December, the Bago Region Illegal Trade Eradication Task Force also confiscated 2.624 tonnes of teak (estimated value K2.3 million) in Toungoo District, and action was taken under the Forest Law.

Moreover, combined squads managed by the Shan State Illegal Trade Eradication Task Force inspected the Kengphawng combined checkpoint and confiscated four types of food products (estimated value K171 million) without official documentation, as well as one Hino Profia truck (estimated value K80 million).

Ten types of food products (estimated value K30 million) without legal documents, along with one Nissan Diesel truck and one Mitsubishi Canter truck (estimated value K120 million), were also seized in Kengtung Township. The actions were taken according to the Customs Law.

Similarly, combined teams managed by the Kayin State Illegal Trade Eradication Task Force seized one type of industrial material (estimated value K25.2 million) and one Hino truck (estimated value K35 million). The action was taken under the Customs Law.

A total of 15 cases of illegal items (estimated value K1.019 billion) were seized between 19 and 21 December. — MNA/TRKM

# 36 deaths and 136 injured in YBS accidents from January to 15 December this year

ACCORDING to statistics released by Yangon Region Public Transport Committee (YRTC), 136 people were injured and 36 people dead in YBS accidents as from January to 15 December this year.

Under monthly statistics of YBS accidents in 2024, seven were injured with four deaths in January, two were injured with four deaths in February, 22 were injured with four deaths in March, two were injured with two deaths in April, five were injured with four deaths in May, three were injured with three deaths in June, 32 were injured with seven deaths in July, 15 were injured with two deaths in

August, eight were injured with two deaths in September, 26 were injured with one death in October, one was injured with one death in November and 13 were injured with two deaths in

A total of 12 pedestrians and 10 bicyclists were among facilities from the road accidents.

There are 51,486 recorded cases by the traffic rules enforcement task force and there are total 5,318 cases transferred from Yangon Bus Operator (YBO) from January to November 2024.

According to yearly statistics of YBS accidents, there are 55 cases in 2021 with 66 injuries and 23 deaths, 88 cases in 2022 with 93 injuries and 38 deaths, 78 cases in 2023 with 117 injuries and 35 deaths and 70 cases with 136 injuries and 36 deaths as from January to 15 December 2024. — MT/ZS

# Germany's dual training turns to AI, digitalization amid worker shortage

Germany's dual vocational training lasts two to three and a half years, depending on profession.

THE German vocational education, known for its dual training system, has been deemed a key driver of the country's economic development.

The system, which combines theory taught in public schools with job training at private companies, has also adapted to the development of the digital age, focusing on artificial intelligence (AI) and other innovations.

The dual vocational training typically runs between two and three and a half years, depending on the chosen profession, according to Germany's Standing Conference of the Ministers of Education and Cultural Affairs (KMK).

The program is generally accessible to everyone. However, KMK suggested that most trainees start their training with a secondary school diploma or even a university entrance qualification.

Under the dual system, trainees split their time between vo-

cational schools and companies.

Germany's Ministry of Education and Research reports that there are currently around 330 recognized occupations that require formal training. The training process, examinations and certifications are standardized nationwide across all industries, which ensures that apprentices receive consistent training regardless of the region or company. According to data from German Economic Institute (IW), the median monthly salary for professionals with vocational training in 2023 stands at some 3.500 euro (US\$3,700), with some occupations earning even over the average monthly salary of 4,300 euro (about 4,500 dollars) for full-time workers.

Vocational careers in Germany, ranging from skilled trades and sales to agriculture, enjoy societal respect. Also, many apprentices can pursue university degrees. — Xinhua

## Indonesians embrace return of plundered treasure from the Dutch

IN the mid- $19^{\text{th}}$  century, Dutch colonial officials climbing an Indonesian volcano spotted an ancient statue meant to serve as protection against misfortune, looted it, and took it to the Netherlands.

Today, the volcanic rock likeness of the Hindu god Ganesha, bearing four arms and the head of an elephant, stands tall inside Indonesia's National Museum in the capital Jakarta.

The country is repatriating hundreds of similarly pillaged treasures, reclaiming parts of its history lost to looting under its former colonial ruler from the late 17<sup>th</sup> century to independence in 1945.

"We fully support it because it is part of preserving our culture," said 23-year-old banker Devi Aristya Nurhidayanti, standing in front of the Ganesha statue. — AFP

#### Stone tablet engraved with Ten Commandments sells for \$5 million

A stone tablet carrying engravings of the Ten Commandments sold for \$5 million at auction on Wednesday, Sotheby's announced.

The high figure was notched despite questions around the tablet's authenticity: no one has claimed it is the original, of Biblical fame, but some experts expressed doubts around its purported provenance, dating between the years 300 and 800 CE.

Another ding against the 115-pound (52-kilogramme) slab, said to be discovered in 1913 in what is now Israel, is that it only contains nine of the 10 commandments considered holy by both Jews and Christians. Excitement around it prevailed, however, as bids eventually raced up to \$4.2 million, with the final sale coming in at \$5 million including fees. — AFP

### Sony ups stake in Japanese publisher Kadokawa in entertainment push

JAPANESE tech conglomerate Sony Group Corp. will increase its stake in major game and anime publisher Kadokawa Corp to strengthen the strategic partnership and expand their entertainment businesses globally, the two companies said Thursday.

The companies said Sony

will acquire 50 billion yen (\$318 million) worth of new shares to be issued by Kadokawa in January to raise its stake to around 10 per cent from the current 2 per cent and become the largest shareholder in the publisher. Sony previously acquired shares in the company in February 2021.

They will strengthen collaboration in their entertainment operations and discuss initiatives to adapt Kadokawa's content into live-action films and TV dramas globally, co-produce anime works and expand the publisher's global distribution.

The decision comes as Sony, the maker of the popular PlayStation game console, has sought to ramp up its animation offerings in recent years. The company, which began as an electronics maker, has transformed into an entertainment giant with growth driven by its music, games and movie businesses. Kadokawa's animation portfolio includes popular anime series such as "Bungo Stray Dogs" and "Oshi No Ko," while its gaming subsidiary From-Software Inc. has developed popular titles such as the action role-playing game "Elden Ring." — Kyodo

# Shanghai Port sees annual container throughput exceed 50 million TEUs

SHANGHAI Port became the first in the world to see the annual container throughput exceed 50 million 20-foot equivalent units (TEUs) on Sunday.

The port has ranked first globally for 14 consecutive years in terms of annual container throughput.

According to Yang Yanbin, deputy general manager of the production and business department of the Shanghai International Port (Group) Co., Ltd, the growth of container throughput indicates that China's complete industrial system and manufacturing capability continue to empower global trade.

Seen as a window of China's opening up and collaboration with the world as well as an engine boosting trade and exchanges, Shanghai Port saw its annual container throughput top 1 million in 1994.

Yang noted that the growth in container throughput at Shang-

Shanghai Port's high-quality services attract global ships, with ship-to-ship transfers reaching 60 per cent in 2024, enhancing its global hub status.



hai Port was driven not only by the rise in export-heavy containers but also by an increase in international transfer containers and ship-to-ship transfer volumes.

"The port's robust functionality and high-quality services attract large cargo ships from around the world," he said, adding that the proportion of shipto-ship transfers at the port is expected to reach a record 60 per cent in 2024, which highlights the continued enhancement of Shanghai Port's role as a global hub. At present, the Shanghai Port boasts nearly 350 international ship routes reaching more than 700 ports in over 200 countries and regions around the world. — Xinhua

"Our Navy and Commerce have been treated in a very unfair and injudicious way. The fees being charged by Panama are ridiculous," he said in a post on his Truth Social platform.

#### Sri Lanka exits sovereign default: official

SRI Lanka's Secretary to the Treasury Mahinda Siriwardana said on Saturday that the country officially exited sovereign default.

Siriwardana said in a post on X that there is no room for repeating past policy mistakes driven by rigid ideologies, dogmatic beliefs, or misleading narratives, which often result in unsustainable and unrealistic policies. With economic stability now achieved, Siriwardana stressed the need to focus on measures that promote inclusive and sustainable growth. He said these efforts are crucial for creating jobs and generating income to help rebuild the lives of all Sri Lankans.

Siriwardana's statement followed Fitch Ratings' decision to upgrade Sri Lanka's rating to "CCC+," highlighting the achievement as the result of a long and challenging journey involving painful reforms and a highly complex debt restructuring process. — Xinhua

## Uzbekistan's foreign trade turnover totals 59.4 bln dollars in January-November

UZBEKISTAN'S foreign trade turnover reached US\$ 59.4 billion in January-November, up 3.6 per cent year-on-year, according to the country's statistics agency.

Exports reached 24.2 billion dollars, while imports stood at 35.1 billion dollars in the period, increasing 4.4 and 3 per cent respectively.

The largest part of Uzbekistan's foreign trade was recorded with China, which accounted for 19 per cent of the total. Russia ranked second with 18 per cent, followed by Kazakhstan with 6.5 per cent. – Xinhua

## Sri Lanka to prioritize electrical, mechanical industries

Priority will be given to electrical, electronic, and mechanical projects, as they can be launched quickly and provide immediate economic benefits.

SRI Lanka's Industrial Development Board (IDB) plans to prioritize the electrical, electronic, and mechanical sectors when allocating land for new industries in the future, local media reported on Sunday quoting IDB Chairman Ravi Nissanka.

Nissanka stated that the IDB has been gathering business proposals through a recently launched initiative. The board intends to develop an action plan to allocate land to the most promising proposals, he said.

Priority will be given to projects in the electrical, electronic and mechanical sectors, as these industries can be launched quickly and are expected to provide immediate economic benefits to the country, he said. — Xinhua

STELLANTIS confirmed Saturday it was reversing a decision to lay off 1,100 workers at its Jeep plant in the US state of Ohio, following the ouster of embattled chief executive Carlos Tavares.

"No employees will be placed on indefinite layoff on 5 January 2025, due to the previously announced shift reduction. Employees are expected to return to work as scheduled after the new year," a Stellantis spokesperson told AFP.

## Japan to order Google to stop violating antitrust law

JAPAN'S competition watchdog plans to order US IT giant Google to halt violations of the country's antitrust law, sources familiar with the matter said Sunday. The watchdog suspects that Google has unfairly pressured smartphone manufacturers to pre-install its search app, the sources added.

The Japan Fair Trade Commission determined that Google, which holds a dominant share of the online search market, has unfairly hindered competition, according to the sources.

The watchdog has already notified the company of possible disciplinary measures and will decide on them after hearing its response, they said. Google allegedly requires smartphone manufacturers using its Android operating system to pre-install Google apps, including the Chrome browser, as a condition for offering the Google Play Store, the sources said. — Kyodo

#### US egg prices soar to yearly high amid bird flu, holiday demand

EGG prices across the United States have surged to their highest levels of the year, driven by widespread bird flu outbreaks and increased demand during the holiday season. National wholesale prices for large eggs reached US\$4.07 per dozen on Friday, marking a dramatic increase from 1.1 dollars early this year, according to data from the US Department of Agriculture (USDA).

The price surge, driv-

en by the impact of highly pathogenic avian influenza on commercial egg layer flocks, has been particularly severe in coastal markets, with California and New York experiencing the most significant increases. The industry has seen devastating losses in laying hens, with 36.8 million table egg layers lost across 12 states in 2024 alone due to bird flu and facility fires, according to the USDA. — Xinhua

# Putin on World War 3: Dangers growing but no need to scare anyone

Russian President Vladimir Putin downplayed the idea of a world war, cautioning against creating unnecessary fear.

RUSSIAN President Vladimir Putin on Sunday, when asked if current events amounted to a world war 3, advised against sowing scare but admitted that dangers were growing and Russia's opponents were escalating the situation.

"You know, there is no need to scare anyone. There are many dangers, they are growing. We can see what our current opponent is doing — they are escalating the situation. If that's what they want, fine," Putin told Russian journalist Pavel Zarubin.

"We will always respond to any challenge. Always. When our current opponents and possible partners hear, understand and realize this, then I believe the understanding will emerge that it is necessary to seek compromises," the president said. Russia will build ties with other counties only on the basis of the interests of the Russian state, the president also emphasized.

"If we establish relations with someone, we will do so only on the basis of the interests of the Russian state," he told the journalist. Answering the question regarding the possibility for improving relations between Russia and the United States, Putin said that "everything can be done, if there is a desire."

At the same time, Putin

#### 'Finally, we made it!': Ho Chi Minh City celebrates first metro

THOUSANDS of selfie-taking Ho Chi Minh City residents crammed into train carriages Sunday as the traffic-clogged business hub celebrated the opening of its first-ever metro line after years of delays.

Huge queues spilled out of every station along the \$1.7 billion line that runs almost 20 kilometres (12 miles) from the city centre — with women in traditional "ao dai" dress, soldiers in uniform and couples clutching young children waiting excitedly to board.

"I know it (the project) is late, but I still feel so very honoured and proud to be among the first on this metro," said office worker Nguyen Nhu Huyen after snatching a selfie in her jam-packed train car.

"Our city is now on par with the other big cities of the world," she said.

It took 17 years for Vietnam's commercial capital to reach this point. The project, funded largely by Japanese gov-

ernment loans, was first approved in 2007 and slated to cost just \$668 million.

When construction began in 2012, authorities promised the line would be up and running in just five years.

But as delays mounted, cars and motorbikes multiplied in the city of nine million people, making the metropolis hugely congested, increasingly polluted and time-consuming to navigate.—AFP

#### Millions flock to India's Goa for exposition of St Xavier's relics

AN exposition of the sacred relics of St Francis Xavier, the famed 16<sup>th</sup>-century Jesuit missionary, has been held in the southwestern Indian city of Old Goa, in a once-in-a-decade event attracting millions of Catholics and tourists from across Hindu-majority India and other countries.

The remains of Xavier, who was born in 1506 in what is now Spain and died in 1552 in China, lie in the former capital of the Portuguese Indies from where he departed for his missionary work in the Malay Archipelago and Japan. Christians account for only 2.3 per cent of India's population, the last official census in 2011 showed. But there are many old Christian communities in the southern state of Goa. Xavier has been respected as the patron saint of Old Goa, which was once called "Rome of the Orient," also by non-Catholic locals. — Kyodo

## Agrarian countries uniting against murder of agriculture in Europe by Ukraine: Orban

ropean farmers," Orban said at a press conference.

According to the politician, now "a very powerful union of agrarian countries is being created, which wants to rationalize Ukraine's approach to the European Union so that we are not killed by everything that arrives here, it requires serious negotiations." — SPUTNIK

### Usyk beats Fury in heavyweight championship rematch

OLEKSANDR Usyk won his heavyweight championship rematch against Tyson Fury by unanimous decision overnight on Saturday to stay unbeaten across two divisions and cement his place among the greats.

The Ukrainian, who forced the pace and repeatedly tagged

his IBF title rather than face challenger Daniel Dubois.

By beating Fury in May, "The Cat" had already joined the likes of Muhammad Ali, Joe Louis and Mike Tyson as undisputed heavyweight, and the first of the four-belt era.

"He's my best friend," he said

Fury with his accurate left hook, was awarded the fight 116-112 by all three judges, handing Fury his second straight loss.

Usyk's win takes him to 23-0 with 14 knockouts and extends one of the all-time best careers that includes Olympic gold and undisputed champion at cruiserweight.

"He's a great fighter, it's a great performance," Usyk, 37, said of Fury, who was unbeaten over 35 fights until he lost their four-belt unification bout in May.

"Unbelievable 24 rounds for my career".

Only the WBA, WBO and WBC belts were on the line this time after Usyk, focused on the 

of Fury. "I respect this guy because I think he's a really tough opponent. Tyson Fury makes me strong".

But the defeat opens up an uncertain future for the 36-yearold Fury, now 34-2-1, who announced his retirement in 2022 only to return to the ring.

"I thought I've won both fights, but then again I've got two losses on my record now, so there's not much I can do about it," said the Briton, who refused to discuss his next steps. Promoter Frank Warren also called the judges' decision "nuts". But Usyk dismissed his complaints.

"Uncle Frank, I think is blind... crazy man," joked the

Further, PM Modi also noted that India now has the cheapest data rates globally, making communication easier for people everywhere. — ANI

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

#### Japanese team launches research to make living on Moon reality

The habitat, designed to house up to 10,000 people, will undergo testing with simulations and scale models.

A Japanese university and construction company have partnered on research to develop a lunar habitat capable of generating artificial gravity, enabling people to live on the Moon under conditions



similar to those on Earth.

Kyoto University and Kajima Corp. aim to construct a ground-based prototype of the "Neo Lunar Glass," a paraboloid structure that generates gravity through rotation, by the 2030s. The technology is expected to address concerns about the adverse effects of prolonged exposure to microgravity on the human body, including bone and muscle loss. "This project demands a significant technological leap, but we aim to achieve it and pave the way for space colonies," said team member Yosuke Yamashiki, a professor of advanced integrated studies in human survivability at Kyoto University. The Lunar Glass structure will be approximately 200 metres in diameter and 400 metres high, capable of housing up to 10,000 people. — Kyodo

Brunei launches new programme on diabetes management

BRUNEI has launched a new programme to provide Type 2 diabetes patients with advice on healthy nutrition, exercise, and blood sugar monitoring, local media reported on Sunday.

According to local daily Borneo Bulletin, the programme, named "BALANCE," allows Brunei's Ministry of Health to assess the impact of digital interventions on improving diabetes management, focusing on lifestyle changes and self-management.

Brunei's ministry also rolled out an initiative to promote walking and other forms of exercise to increase daily steps, either individually or in groups, according to the report. — Xinhua
