

State Support Aims to Lift Cotton Yields

The government, in its tenure, pledges to develop Agri-based industries based on cotton cultivation to achieve the targeted per-acre cotton yield.

As cotton cultivation and production are beneficial for the country, the relevant ministries, cotton growers, and officials have to strive to achieve the target per-acre yield, said President of the Republic of the Union of Myanmar U Min Aung Hlaing at the seminar titled “From Cotton Cultivation towards Textile Industry” held at the city hall in Magway yesterday morning.

In his opening speech, the President recalled that the nation’s cotton acreage had fallen to about 400,000 acres in the 2019-2020 financial year, down from more than 800,000 acres in 2011-2012. Since assuming State responsibilities, he reiterated that efforts have been made to promote cotton cultivation. As a result, the nationwide average cotton yield increased from 436 viss per acre on more than 390,000 acres cultivated in

the 2021-2022 season to 499.2 viss per acre on more than 540,000 acres in the 2025-2026 planting season. Total nationwide cotton production exceeded 27.43 million viss. Compared with the country’s domestic cotton requirements, this indicates that cotton production has generated a substantial surplus. At current world market prices, the President underlined that cotton is trading at between US\$1,800 and US\$1,900

per tonne. If the nation achieves its target cotton yield of 700 viss per acre, the sale of surplus cotton could generate an estimated US\$500 million in additional export revenue. He guaranteed that the State will also provide the necessary support and assistance. During its tenure, the government will make every effort to ensure the successful development of the cotton cultivation and production sector.

“The President noted that irrigation and supplementary water for cotton cultivation can be supplied through solar powered river pumping projects. He added that, with labour shortages posing a growing challenge in agriculture, seed sowing equipment such as feed seeders is now being utilized. The President stressed the need to develop agro-based industries based on cotton cultivation. He instructed that as

cotton cultivation is a sector that brings benefits to the country, the Ministry of Agriculture, Livestock and Irrigation, the Ministry of Cooperatives and Rural Development, and the Ministry of Industry and MSME Development are required to give due attention to this sector and make concerted efforts, urging cotton farmers and responsible officials to work hard to achieve the targeted per-acre yield.

Solar Power Workshop to Promote Renewable Energy Use in Myanmar

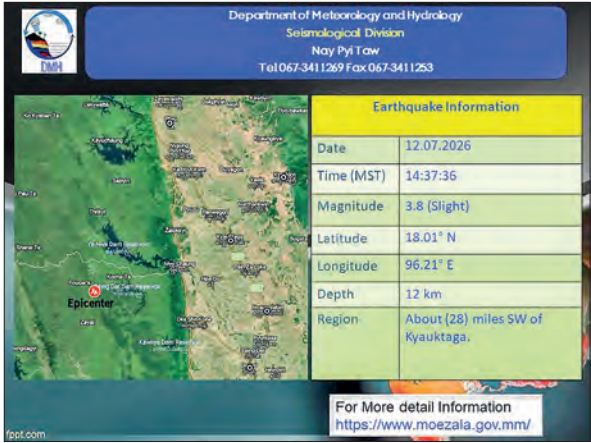

Two minor earthquakes strike Bago and Mandalay regions on 12 July

A minor earthquake measuring 3.8 on the Richter scale struck Myanmar at 2:37:36 pm yesterday, according to a statement released by the Department of Meteorology and Hydrology (DMH). The earthquake was

detected at a depth of 12 kilometres underground, with its epicentre located approximately 50 miles north-northwest of the Bago Seismic Station, about 28 miles southwest of Kyauktaga, 17 miles northwest of Nyaunglebin, and eight miles

southwest of Penwagon. Similarly, a minor earthquake measuring 4.0 magnitude struck at 05:09:23 am yesterday. According to the DMH, the earthquake occurred at a depth of 11 kilometres underground, with its epicentre located approximately 49 miles north-northwest of the Mandalay Seismic Station and about 11 miles north of Singu. The DMH had also previously reported that a 4.1-magnitude earthquake struck Singu Township in Mandalay Region on the morning of 17 June.

According to current seismic data for Myanmar, the country is expected to continue experiencing only routine, localized earthquakes

ranging from magnitude 2.5 to 4.0, with no unusual changes detected, the AI Info Team reported. Furthermore, based on currently available geological data, there is no evidence to suggest that a major earthquake of magnitude 7.0 or higher will occur in the near future.

“However, earthquakes do not strike randomly. They are simply the natural, periodic release of stress accumulated over many years along tectonic plate boundaries. Only by staying vigilant and remaining prepared in advance can we mitigate the risks posed by earthquakes,” an official from the AI Info Team cautioned. — Htun Htun/TH

BAY INFERENCE: The monsoon is strong over the Andaman Sea and the Bay of Bengal. The weather is cloudy over the Andaman Sea, the North Bay and the Eastcentral Bay of Bengal and a few clouds to partly cloudy elsewhere over the Bay of Bengal.

FORECAST VALID UNTIL NOON OF 13 July 2026: Rain or thundershowers will be scattered in Mandalay, Magway and lower Sagaing regions and Kayah State, fairly widespread in Chin State and widespread in the remaining regions and states with likelihood regionally heavy falls in Yangon, Ayeyawady and Taninthayi regions and Kayin, Mon and Rakhine states and isolated heavy falls in Bago and upper Sagaing regions and Shan State. The degree of certainty is 100 per cent.

THE CONDITION OF CUMULONIMBUS CLOUD: The cumulonimbus clouds are developing in Magway, Lower Sagaing, Ayeyawady and Taninthayi regions and Chin and Shan states. The area along the cumulonimbus clouds movement, the weather phenomena such as strong winds accompanied with rain, thunder, lightning and hails may occur and therefore it is recommended to be aware in advance of these phenomena.

STATE OF THE SEA: Occasional squalls with rough seas will be experienced off and along the Myanmar Coasts. The surface wind speed in squalls may reach 35 miles per hour. The wave height will be about 9-12 feet off and along the Myanmar Coasts.

OUTLOOK FOR SUBSEQUENT TWO DAYS: The strong monsoon.

ACCORDING to the 6:30 am MST observation today, the water level of the Thaungyin River at Myawady is observed as more than three feet below its danger level. It may reach its danger level during the next one day.

It is especially alert to the people who settle near the river banks and low-lying areas in Myawady Township, to take precaution measure and to stay away from the flood-prone areas in time if the water level will rise. — DMH

PyinOoLwin Plants 3,000 Saplings in Drive to Green the City

PyinOoLwin Greening Project was launched this year to become greener with abundant trees and forests, healthier, more pleasant to live in, sustainably developed and clean.

The national-level monsoon tree-growing ceremony 2026 took place in Block 2 of the Maymyo firewood reserve in PyinOoLwin Township yesterday morning, attended by President of the Republic of the Union of Myanmar U Min Aung Hlaing, who planted a Jacaranda sapling.

Speaking on the occasion, the President announced that the PyinOoLwin Greening Project, launched this year, aims to preserve the city for future generations as

a model of sustainable urban development, greener with abundant trees and forests, healthier and more livable, clean, well maintained, and environmentally resilient. He noted that forest plantations are being established in the northern, southern, and eastern parts of PyinOoLwin, with 400,000 saplings to be planted across 15 plots covering 2,000 acres of project land.

The President urged the relevant departments to establish urban forest plantations and community forest areas to expand

the city's green zones. He revealed that the Mandalay Region Forest Department plans to distribute more than one million saplings to the people and government departments to plant them along both sides of roads and railways.

At the ceremony, the President planted a Jacaranda sapling at the designated venue.

The dignitaries who accompanied the President, the Mandalay Region chief minister, the region-level authorities, senior Tatmadaw officers, departmental personnel,

After the seminar, the President asked the attendees about the ways to develop cotton cultivation and production.

The seminar was attended by the President's entourage, the chief ministers of Sagaing, Magway, and Mandalay regions, as well as representatives of the cotton farmer groups, seed producers, seed oil millers, cotton wool and yarn producers, loom operators, and ginners.

The President and party visited the Regional Research Centre (Magway) of the Department of Agriculture. He also inspected the display of quality seeds such as paddy, groundnut, green

gram, cotton, sesame and sunflower, the organic fertilizer and natural pesticide solution produced by the centre, and the research tests conducted at the Nano Technology for Seed Treatment Chamber with the use of cold plasma and UV machines and crop dryers.

In his guidance, the President stressed the need not only to produce high yield, quality certified crop varieties, but also to pursue research and production that ensure crops meet international market standards, covering exportable traits such as colour, aroma, taste, and size.

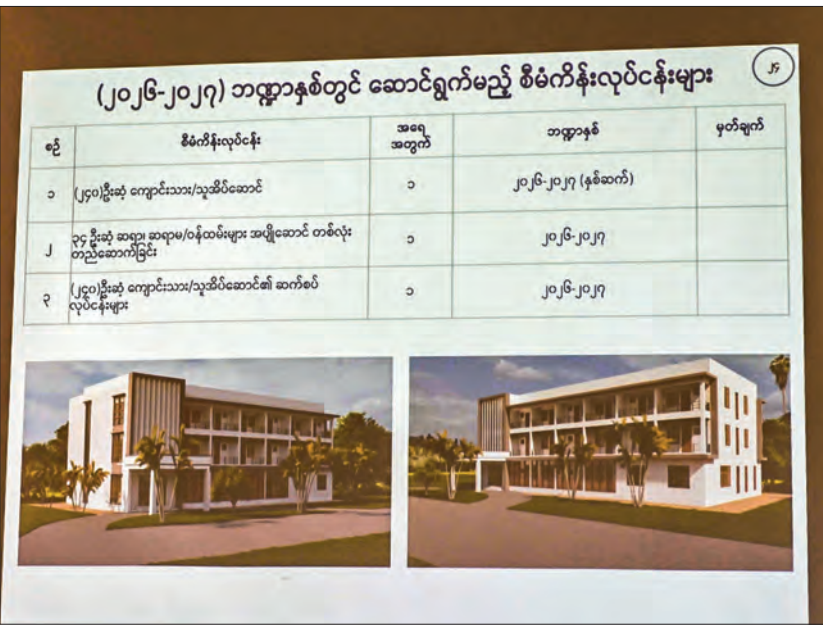

Independent complaint system set up for judicial misconduct cases

THE Union Supreme Court has established independent complaint mechanisms for reporting judicial misconduct and corruption involving judges, according to Supreme Court Judge U Thein Ko Ko. Judges serving at township and district courts are required to follow civil service laws, regulations and codes of conduct, as well as judicial ethics issued in 2017. The Supreme Court of the Union investigates complaints

Illegal scam building demolished in Shwe Kokko

A nine-storey illegal building used for online scams and gambling activities in the Shwe Kokko area of Myawady Township, Kayin State, has been systematically demolished, bringing the total number of demolished illegal buildings to 72. Authorities have been conducting joint operations to demolish illegal buildings and destroy equipment used for online

scams and gambling activities in the Shwe Kokko and KK Park areas. Of the 77 targeted buildings in Shwe Kokko, 57 have been demolished using machinery, while 20 have been destroyed through controlled demolition. According to reports, 72 illegal buildings have been demolished, and the remaining five will be demolished in due course. — MNA/KZL

Specialist medical teams extend healthcare services in Mawlamyine

UNDER the programme organized by the Ministry of Health, a specialist medical team comprising professor/senior specialists from Yangon Specialist Hospital (500-bed) and the Yangon Children's Hospital provided free medical treatment at Mawlamyine General Hospital in Mawlamyine, Mon State from 10 to 12 July, along with specialists from Mawlamyine General Hospital.

During this outreach, a total of 2,265 patients received treatment, including individuals from 11 townships in Mon State. The medical conditions treated ranged from cardiac diseases, gastrointestinal issues, and neurological ailments to orthopaedic and dermatological problems, among others.

Additionally, medical check-ups included procedures such as Echocardiography, Oesophago-Gastro-Duodenoscopy (OGD) Scope, CT scans, X-ray examinations, laboratory tests, ultrasound scans, and electrocardiograms (ECG). A total of 111 patients requiring further treatment were referred to relevant hospitals. In addition, professors/specialists from Yangon, Mandalay, and Nay Pyi Taw will conduct field treatment programmes in general hospitals in regions and states, and specialists general hospitals from region and state will conduct field treatment programmes in districts/townships. The Ministry of Health will also conduct such programmes in other townships. — MNA/KZL

Nawngkhio's rural water supply work completed

OFFICIALS of the Department of Rural Development inspected the completed rural water supply project in Bantbwekyin Village, Nawngkhio Township, on 11 July. The project aimed to ensure an adequate supply of drinking water to rural residents and to ensure year-round access to safe drinking water. Officials of Shan State (North) and District Department of Rural Development and engineering staff looked into the laying of a spring water pipe-

line measuring one mile and four furlongs, a 5,000-gallon brick water tank and an embankment measuring 25 feet in length, three feet in width and five feet in height in the village. In meeting with members of the village

water supply committee and villagers, officials discussed the need to ensure the long-term sustainability of the water supply facilities and to use the water distribution system properly. The project was implemented under the Quick Win Programme with K64.5 million provided under the fund. The project has now been completed 100 per cent, enabling rural residents in the village to enjoy access to clean drinking water throughout the year. — Cho Than Nyunt (Rural)

46 Myanmar national detainees repatriated from Ruili

ACCORDING to the Consulate-General of the Republic of the Union of Myanmar in Kunming, 46 Myanmar nationals, who had been detained in Ruili, China, for illegal residency and employment, were repatriated to Myanmar on 8 July. These Myanmar nationals were reportedly arrested for living and working illegally at the Xinjiang Garment factory in Ruili, Dehong Prefecture, Yunnan Province. To ensure their safe return, the Myanmar Con-

sulate-General in Kunming maintained close coordination with the Foreign Affairs Office of the Dehong Prefecture People's Government and the Foreign Affairs Office of the Ruili People's Government, working alongside the relevant authorities in Ruili. Following these coordination efforts, the individuals were systematically handed over to the relevant Myanmar authorities on 8 July via the Nantaw, the border crossing point between Ruili and Muse. — TWA/ZN

Labour Attaché Office secures insurance for deceased Myanmar migrant worker

FOR a Myanmar migrant worker who passed away in a car accident in Thailand, Myanmar Labour Attaché Office helped in claiming insurance worth 1.5 million baht from a private insurance company. All eight candidates from Cocokyun Township passed the national examination, including seven students from Cocokyun Basic Education High School and one external candidate. The successful group included children of Navy families and an Air Force enlisted serviceman, while one student earned a distinction.

Township Education Officer Daw Khin Aye Nang described the achievement as a significant improvement. Last year, only 12 of 19 candidates passed, but this year's students achieved a perfect result. She said the success reflected the dedication of the school's teacherhead

and 11 teachers, along with support from education authorities, the Navy, the Air Force and township officials, who provided extra classes, meals and learning materials. She added that the school still needs more science teachers but is preparing intensively for the 21 students expected to sit next year's examination.

Among the successful candidates was Ma Thone Wati Oo, 20, a member of a Navy family who passed on her second attempt. She said failing the previous year motivated her to work harder, studying every lesson thoroughly while receiving constant encouragement from her teachers. She recalled being unable to sleep the

night before the results were announced and described learning that she had passed as one of the happiest moments of her life. She hopes to study at the Defence Services Institute of Nursing and Paramedical Sciences and become a military nurse.

Another successful student, Ma Su Sanda Hlaing, 18, passed on her first attempt. She expressed gratitude to her teachers, parents and local authorities, noting that students on the remote island often face delays in receiving books and other educational supplies because transportation depends on ships and aircraft. She plans to continue her education and pursue

a nursing career.

Maung Thura Aung, 18, said he maintained a disciplined study routine, reviewing lessons every evening and waking at 5 am to revise before school. Although he did not receive a distinction, he said passing the examination was a proud achievement and thanked his teachers and education officials for their support. He hopes to attend university and become a civil servant.

Maung Myat Zaw Lin, also 18, said he celebrated his success by running through the rain with excitement when the results were announced. He credited his achievement to faithfully following his teachers' guidance throughout the academic year and hopes to serve the country after graduating from university.

Another student, Maung Win Si Thu Nyein, 20, passed on his second attempt. He admitted feeling anxious before the results were released but said he believed his hard work would be rewarded. He encouraged younger students to view the matriculation examination as an important gateway to their future and urged them never to give up.

The township's success also included Air Force enlisted serviceman Maung Phone Htet Paing, 20, who was granted permission to take the examination while serving in the military. He thanked his commander for supporting his education and said passing the exam has opened the door to further technical training and, eventually, the opportunity

to earn a university degree and become a military officer.

Lt-Col Phyto Zin Oo of the Cocokyun Airbase said the Tatmadaw encourages personnel to pursue education because developing skilled and educated human resources benefits both the Tatmadaw and the country. He noted that the successful serviceman had already been recognized for his achievement and would receive further technical training.

Students and education officials alike said the 100 per cent pass rate demonstrates that determination, strong teaching and community support can overcome the challenges of studying in one of Myanmar's most isolated island communities. — Thitsa (MNA)/ST

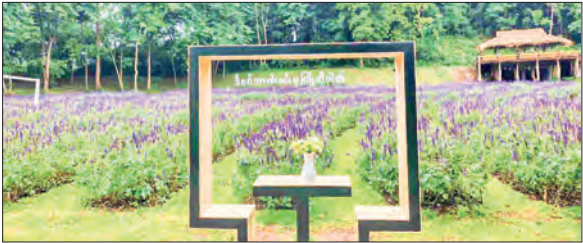
PyinOoLwin Prepares for Tourism Boom after Airport Opening

2026 matriculation marksheets available via online booking

COOPERATIVES have long played an important role in improving the economic and social well-being of people around the world. They are organizations formed by individuals who voluntarily work together to achieve common economic, social, and cultural goals. In Myanmar, cooperatives have become an important mechanism for supporting rural development, promoting entrepreneurship, and improving the living standards of ordinary citizens. As a member of the international cooperative movement, Myanmar recognizes the significance of cooperatives in national development. At a time when the world economy faces numerous challenges, including inflation, geopolitical conflicts, climate-related disasters, and economic uncertainty, the cooperative system offers a practical and sustainable approach to achieving inclusive growth and prosperity.

The Central Cooperative Society of Myanmar became a member of the International Cooperative Alliance (ICA) on 7 September 1993. Since 1995, Myanmar has celebrated the International Day of Cooperatives every year. The cooperative movement promotes the principles of self-help, self-responsibility, democracy, equality, equity, and solidarity. These principles encourage people to work together for mutual benefit rather than pursuing individual interests alone. The annual celebration of the International Day of Cooperatives highlights the importance of cooperation in solving economic and social problems and in building stronger communities.

Throughout the world, economic inequality remains a serious concern. Although technological progress and globalization have created

enormous wealth, many people continue to live in poverty. In many countries, a small percentage of the population controls a large share of national wealth, while millions struggle to meet their daily needs. supporting local industries, and stimulating economic activity. Producer cooperatives can strengthen the bargaining power of small manufacturers and entrepreneurs by enabling them to market their products collectively. The importance of cooperatives extends beyond Myanmar. Across the world, cooperative organizations serve hundreds of millions of people and operate in sectors such as agriculture, finance, healthcare, housing, retail, and energy. Pyay Rice Salad (Pyay Htaminthoke)

WHEN visiting Pyay, one of the most popular local specialities is the famous Pyay Rice Salad. Loved not only by locals but also by people across Myanmar, Pyay Rice Salad shops can be found nationwide. It's as easy to prepare as it is delicious, which is why many households often make it at home.

So, for those tired of plain rice every day and wondering what to eat, here's a simple recipe for Pyay Rice Salad.

Ingredients

1. Cooked white rice
2. Vermicelli (chickpea flour noodles)
3. Boiled potatoes (thinly sliced)
4. Roasted chickpea powder
5. Chilli powder
6. Dried prawn powder
7. Chicken powder
8. Fish sauce
9. Garlic oil (fried with turmeric)
10. Cabbage (thinly sliced)
11. Garlic
12. Green chillies
13. Salad leaves
14. Myanmar tofu (yellow chickpea tofu)

Preparation

- Rice & Potatoes: Cook rice as usual and let it cool. Boil potatoes until soft, peel, and slice thinly.
- Tofu: Slice the chickpea tofu thinly.
- Vermicelli: Soak vermicelli in water for 1 hour, drain, then boil for about 3 minutes and drain again.

- Garlic Oil: Fry garlic with turmeric powder in oil until golden, then cool and mix the fried garlic back into the oil.
- Soup Base: Boil water with dried prawn powder, salt, and chicken powder. Once boiling, add pounded chilli, garlic, and sliced cabbage, adjusting taste as needed.

Mixing the Salad

- Place rice in a mixing bowl, add sliced potatoes, and a little tamarind juice (or lime juice if



- preferred).
 - Add vermicelli, tofu, garlic oil, fish sauce, salt, MSG (Monosodium Glutamate) or Ajinomoto if preferred, chickpea powder, and dried prawn powder.
 - Mix gently so the rice grains don't break.
 - Finally, garnish with coriander, fried shallots, sliced cabbage, and tofu to taste.
- Pyay Rice Salad pairs wonderfully with fried chicken, fried eggs, beef stir-fry, or mutton dishes.

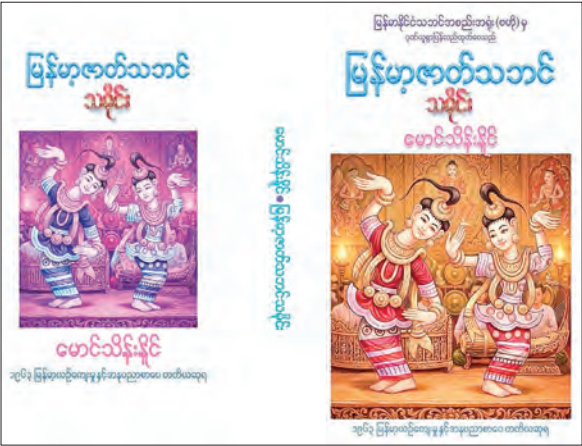

Japan registers
its tea under
protection system

JAPAN'S farm ministry said Friday it has newly registered three products, including "Japanese tea", under its geographical indication protection system aimed at safeguarding brands of agricultural and fishery products as imitations spread overseas.

Once registered, products can be sold with a GI mark, and the government will crack down on false labeling and other violations.

The new designation for Japanese tea applies broadly to all green tea cultivated and processed domestically. It is unusual for a GI, which typically

protects brand names tied to specific regions, not to specify a particular production region.

The only other case is "Japanese sake", which is registered under the geographical indication protection system for alcohol that is overseen by the National Tax Agency.

Amid growing international popularity of green tea, the aim of the initiative is to highlight the differences between Japanese tea and overseas imitations to enhance its value, according to the Ministry of Agriculture, Forestry and Fisheries.— Kyodo

India's food services market to
reach \$150 billion by FY31

INDIA'S food services market is expected to grow from around \$90 billion in FY26 to \$150 billion by FY31, with online food delivery continuing to gain a larger share of the market, according to a report by Redseer Consulting.

The report said the online segment's share in the food services market is projected to increase from 11 per cent in FY26 to 18 per cent by FY31, reflecting changing consumer preferences and growing adoption of food delivery platforms.

According to the report, India's food services market has al-

ready expanded significantly over the past five years. The market size increased from US\$ 56 billion in FY21 to around US\$ 90 billion in FY26, while the online share rose from four per cent to 11 per cent during the

same period.

It stated, "India's food services market is growing steadily, with online acting as a key accelerator, while profitability needs a playbook as new opportunities arise".

The report also

added that the market continues to benefit from rising consumer spending on convenience, increasing preference for eating outside the home and the rapid growth of organized food service brands.

The report noted that consumers, particularly younger people in metro and Tier-1 cities, are increasingly choosing outside meals not only for convenience but also for social gatherings and celebrations. At the same time, higher spending on leisure and convenience is driving greater consumption of non-home-cooked food. — ANI

US Credit usage drops amid
economic stress

US credit card spending has dropped by the biggest margin in two years, highlighting Americans' financial strain from ongoing inflation, record interest rates and a "K-shaped" economy.

Total outstanding consumer debt dropped by roughly US\$182 million in May, Federal Reserve's recently released Consumer Credit Report showed. This marks the first decrease in consumer borrowing since late 2024. The overall drop was driven by a US\$5.3 billion slide in revolving credit, largely credit card debt, which also marked the biggest decline since 2024.

"I'm not going to use my credit card much anymore," Floyd Marion, 50, an electrician outside Washington DC, told Xinhua, citing losses in his investment portfolio. He's now relying on cash and plans to pay off his credit card by January. — Xinhua

Container ship
hit, catches
fire off Oman:
UKMTO

A container ship sustained damage and caught fire following an incident off the coast of Oman, the United Kingdom Maritime Trade Operations (UKMTO) said late Saturday.

The UKMTO said it received a report of the incident about 16.7 kilometres east of the Gulf country at 2240 GMT Saturday.

“Military authorities have reported that a container ship has sustained damage to the rear of the vessel, which has caused a fire onboard,” the advisory said, adding that authorities were investigating the incident.

The UKMTO did not disclose the name of the vessel.

Separately, the US Central Command said that the GFS Galaxy, a Cyprus-flagged container ship, was attacked by Iran’s Islamic Revolution Guard Corps when transiting the Strait of Hormuz, leaving a crew member missing. — ANI

India shifts to aggressive power capacity expansion

INDIA’S power utilities are entering a “different current” of aggressive capacity buildout, said Equirus, in a research report and initiated coverage on the sector, calling for a multi-year capex cycle led by renewables, storage and thermal additions.

The brokerage expects balance sheet leverage across private players to rise sharply through FY30 before easing as new assets stabilise.

“Going forward, the capex cycle spanning re-

newables, Nabha, Raigad PSP and the MP thermal project is expected to materially increase leverage,” Equirus noted on Torrent Power.

It forecasts net debt to rise from Rs 129 billion in FY26 to Rs 637 billion by FY30, while gross block expands to Rs 954 billion. Consequently, net debt/EBITDA is expected to peak at 4.9x in FY30.

Return ratios are likely to stay subdued during execution before recovering. — ANI

China summer grain harvest tops 150 million tonnes for first time

CHINA has seen another bumper summer grain harvest in 2026, with total output topping 150 million tonnes for the first time, official data showed Friday.

The country’s summer grain output totaled 150.75 million tonnes this

year, up 0.7 per cent or 1 million tonnes year on year, according to a survey by the National Bureau of Statistics.

China’s summer grain sown area remained basically stable by standing at 26.53 million hectares, slightly down 0.2

per cent from last year. Of them, over 23 million hectares of wheat were sown, down 0.3 per cent year on year. The output per hectare reached 5,681.6 kilogrammes, an increase of 0.8 per cent from last year, according to the bureau. — Xinhua

Narita airport operator to start land expropriation process

THE operator of Japan’s Narita airport and related entities agreed Friday to begin procedures for compulsory land acquisition to advance its stalled plan to build a new runway and extend an existing one.

Narita International Airport Corp plans to expand the airport, a major international gateway in Chiba Prefecture, east of Tokyo, amid booming inbound tourism, but has struggled to acquire the necessary land.

The decision was made by a committee comprising representatives of the airport operator, the Ministry of Land, Infrastructure, Transport and Tourism, the Chiba prefectural government and sur-

rounding municipalities.

“We have been reflecting upon the one-sidedness in the history of airport construction. We will do our best to gain approval from the landowners with their situation in mind,” said Naoki Fujii, president of the airport operator.

The operator said it has yet to acquire agreements for 4.8 per cent, or about 53 hectares, of the land needed for the project, as some landowners remain dissatisfied.

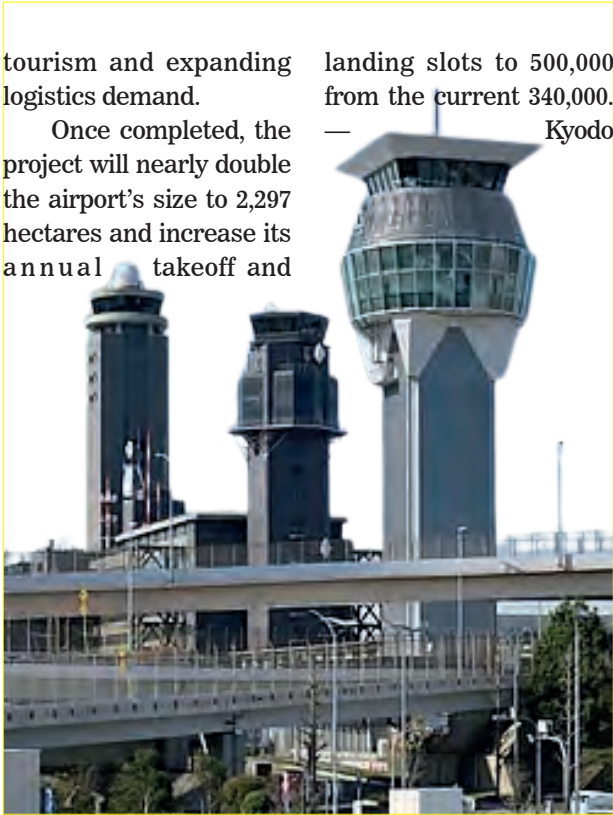
Construction of the 3,500-metre Runway C and an extension of the 2,500-metre Runway B by 1,000 metres has been under way at Narita airport since 2025 to accommodate growing inbound

tourism and expanding logistics demand.

Once completed, the project will nearly double the airport’s size to 2,297 hectares and increase its annual takeoff and

landing slots to 500,000 from the current 340,000.

Boeing unveils new 737 MAX production line

BOEING marked another step in a marathon comeback Friday when it celebrated expanded production of the 737 MAX, now an aircraft in heavy demand after earlier disasters tarnished the company’s reputation.

At a rousing ribbon-cutting ceremony attended by hundreds of Boeing employees, commercial airlines chief Stephanie Pope and Washington state elected officials characterized the new \$1 billion “North Line” MAX production line investment in Everett, Washington as the appropriate next step for an industrial site that has been building Boeing’s most storied aircraft for decades.

“This investment is a

vote of confidence in our workforce, in American manufacturing, and the future of aerospace in the city of Everett,” said Everett Mayor Cassie Franklin. “This factory has repeatedly shown the world what is possible.”

Boeing has big plans for the North Line, envisioning a production cadence comparable to that in Renton, 35 miles to the south, which until this week was the exclusive home of MAX assembly.

But in keeping with Boeing’s caution after two deadly MAX crashes, executives plan a gradual ramp-up in Everett for a jet that once defined the company’s problems but is now at the centre of its comeback. — AFP

Russia has no plans to attack NATO, is open to equal dialogue

Russia avoids NATO attack, seeking dialogue based on shared security.

NATO justifies the alliance’s preparations for a major conflict with the false claim that Russia allegedly poses a threat, Vladislav Maslennikov, director of the Russian Foreign Ministry’s Department of European Issues, told Sputnik.

The North Atlantic bloc “is a priori geared toward confrontation, pursuing its interests through force, and is not prepared to cooperate in the name of strengthening security and stability,” Vladislav Maslennikov noted.

In reality, Russia does not intend to attack NATO members and is open to dialogue provided the principle of the indivisibility of security is respected, he emphasized. In recent years, Russia has witnessed NATO’s unprecedented activity and buildup of troops near its western borders. Russian President Vladimir Putin previously stated that NATO, by hiking up its military budgets, is provoking global militarization and an arms race. He also pointed out that this

China tackles severe floods as Bavi hits

CHINESE authorities have stepped up flood control and disaster relief efforts as Typhoon Bavi continued to affect large parts of the country on

Sunday.

Typhoon Bavi, the ninth typhoon of the year, made successive landfalls along the coast of east China’s Zhejiang Province late Saturday before moving inland. It is expected to move northwest while gradually weakening.

From Sunday to Tuesday, heavy to torrential rain is expected to lash a swath of China, including Anhui, Jiangxi and Zhejiang provinces, as well as parts of Liaoning and Jilin provinces.

The Ministry of Water Resources on Sunday upgraded its flood alert to yellow, the third-highest level in China’s four-tier weather warning system, saying that heavy rainfall could trigger flooding in some rivers, mountain torrents and urban waterlogging.

Central authorities have dispatched 70,000 items of disaster relief supplies to Zhejiang, Tianjin and Anhui to support the relocation and resettlement of affected residents, according to the Ministry of Emergency Management (MEM). — Xinhua

Car crisis takes toll on Germany’s young engineers

DESPITE a year of searching, previous stints at big automotive suppliers and sending out about 50 applications, German software engineer Max Peil is still looking for a job.

Trained in computer vision, a critical part of autonomous and intelligent driving systems, Peil could once have expected to sail into a role at one of Germany’s industrial giants.

But years of stagnant

growth in Europe’s biggest economy and increasingly fierce Chinese competition are now taking their toll on young engineers like Peil.

“Usually you just get rejected straight up,” the 30-year-old told AFP in the western city of Frankfurt.

“I’ve had one interview. It was the same with my friends, one has sent over 60 applications.”

Known the world over for cutting-edge technology

and innovative design, Germany’s car industry, powered by exports, has so far managed to avoid the drastic decline seen in countries like Britain, France and Italy.

But Chinese carmakers like BYD and Xpeng have eaten into German carmakers’ sales in the world’s largest auto market, leading to painful adjustments at home.

“Ten years ago we

made about six million vehicles a year and we’ve now stabilized at about four, 4.2 million,” transport economist Thomas Puls of the IW economic institute in Cologne told AFP. Total employment in the German automotive sector fell eight per cent in the five years to 2025, according to Federal Employment Agency (FEA) data, even as it grew a little over one per cent overall. — AFP

Former Qatari leader Sheikh Hamad dies

QATAR’S Father Amir and former amir Sheikh Hamad bin Khalifa Al Thani died on Sunday at the age of 74, the Amiri Diwan announced.

“The Amiri Diwan mourns the passing of the nation’s esteemed leader, the late Father Amir Sheikh Hamad bin Khalifa Al Thani,” the administrative office of the Qatari amir said in a statement.

Sheikh Hamad ruled Qatar from 1995 until 2013, when he transferred power to his son, the current Amir Sheikh Tamim bin Hamad Al Thani. — Xinhua

A quarter of Japan municipalities see population drop

A quarter of Japan’s municipalities saw their population decline by more than 10 per cent between 2020 and 2025, Kyodo News analysis of census data showed Sunday.

Significant depopulation often leads to a deterioration of public services, prompting some experts to highlight the urgent need to adapt to rapid change.

The number of municipalities experiencing such a decline increased from 247 between 2015 and 2020 to 477, with Suzu, Ishikawa Prefecture, recording the sharpest decline of 34 per cent after being hit by a massive earthquake in 2024. — Kyodo

Severe US heat wave worsens wildfires

A broad heat dome expanding across the western and central United States is aggravating a destructive wildfire emergency while posing health risks and causing property damage.

The US National Interagency Coordination Centre (NICC) said in its Saturday report that the country was at National Preparedness Level 4, one level below the maximum, with 78 active large incidents covering about 2,961 square kilometres, including Alaska. A total of 14,409 personnel were assigned to the incidents. — Xinhua

Myanmar U12 trials begin for Japan tournament

Argentina 'giving every last drop' for World Cup repeat, says coach Scaloni

ARGENTINA manager Lionel Scaloni said his side would give everything in pursuit of back-to-back World Cup titles after Saturday's 3-1 extra-time quarterfinal victory over Switzerland. Argentina led through Alexis Mac Allister's early header but Dan Ndoye equalized in the second half. Breel Embolo was later sent off before Julian Alvarez and Lautaro Martinez struck in extra time at Kansas City Stadium. The result means Ar-

gentina will play in its fifth consecutive semifinal at a major tournament dating back to the 2019 Copa America. "Five tournaments and five semifinals," said Scaloni, who took charge of Argentina after the 2018 World Cup. "I hadn't thought about it, but it is something we should be happy about. Without these players, it wouldn't be possible. "It is incredible to reach a semifinal and occupy such a privileged place

We should be satisfied and remain hopeful until the end, giving every last drop of sweat. If we achieve it, great. If we don't, we will have given everything." After finishing top of its group with three wins from three, the reigning champion has been tested in the knockout stage. It needed extra time to overcome Cabo Verde and recovered from two goals down with 11 minutes left to beat Egypt in the round of 16. — Xinhua

Senegal part ways with coach Thiaw after World Cup exit

"Following a meeting of the (FSF) executive committee, it was decided to initiate proceedings to relieve national team coach Pape Thiaw, as well as the entire coaching staff, of their duties," the federation said in a statement. It added that FSF president Abdoulaye Fall will hold a press conference on Monday to explain the "reasons behind this decision" and "to discuss the future". Thiaw, 45 and a former Senegal international, took over as national team boss in 2024. But he paid the price for a disap-

pointing World Cup, in which the Lions of Teranga suffered two defeats in the group stage, against France and Norway, before a 5-0 victory over Iraq secured their place in the knockout rounds. Senegal were then knocked out by Belgium in the round of 32, losing 3-2 after extra time, despite having led 2-0 until the 86th minute. Under Thiaw, Senegal won the Africa Cup of Nations final in January before being stripped of their title as a punishment for walking off the pitch during the chaotic final against Morocco. — AFP

Myanmar women's team to compete at Asian Games

MYANMAR women's national football team has been granted the opportunity to compete at the 20th Asian Games, which will be hosted by Japan. The women's football tournament group draw will be held on 23 July. Myanmar was added to the competition after some teams withdrew, with the final list of participating teams announced on 10 July. A total of 12 teams, including Japan, North Korea, South Korea, China, Myanmar, Bangladesh, Taiwan Province of China, Hong Kong SAR, the Philippines, Thailand, Uzbekistan and Vietnam, will compete in the women's football event. The Asian Games will mark the second international tournament for Myanmar's new Japanese head coach Mitsuo Katoh. China rocket breakthrough uses new LNG fuel

CHINA'S Long March-10B rocket, which achieved the successful sea-based net recovery on Friday, has for the first time used high-purity methane fuel made from liquefied natural gas (LNG), marking a critical breakthrough in diversifying propellant sources for China's commercial space industry.

The Long March-10B is a two-stage reusable commercial launch vehicle developed specifically for China's commercial space market, with a core-stage diameter of five metres and featuring 100-per-cent domestically produced critical components.

As the country's first commercial reusable rocket powered by liquid oxygen-methane propellant, the methane fuel used in this launch achieved a purity of 98.7 per cent, with the entire supply chain secured domestically, said the fuel developer, Sinopec, in a report by China Media Group (CMG) on Saturday.

"The methane fuel used in this launch was refined from over 1,000 tonnes of LNG," said Cao

Lizhao, manager of the south China sales center of Sinopec's natural gas branch.

"The high-purity methane fuel can be processed and prepared using civilian LNG," Cao noted.

"Compared with traditional liquid hydrogen fuel, this propellant reduces storage and transport costs by 40 per cent, offering a brand-new and viable fuel solution for low-cost, high-frequency commercial launches," he added.

As China's commercial space industry rapidly expands, traditional propellants such as liquid oxygen-kerosene and liquid oxygen-liquid hydrogen have struggled to meet the demands of frequent, low-cost missions.

Liquid oxygen-methane propellant, with its superior performance, compatibility with reusable technologies, environmental friendliness, and convenient storage and transport, has emerged as the preferred option for next-generation commercial launch vehicles, according to the CMG report. — Xinhua

Oil giants warn energy market to worsen as US-Iran strikes resume

European gas storage (excluding Italy) is at 47 per cent, needing 35 billion cubic metres more.

MAJOR oil companies are sounding the alarm as the resumption of US-Iran hostilities threatens to tighten global energy supplies and push prices higher.

Italian energy giant Eni warned that the situation could deteriorate in the short term amid declining global oil reserves and increased competition for energy resources, CEO Claudio Descalzi said in an interview with Il Sole 24 Ore.

"We all believed that the United States and Iran had found a solution to the conflict," Descalzi said. "In reality, the resumption

of the war is the chronicle of a foretold event."

Key warnings from the industry:

- Global oil inventories have been declining at an average of 3.8 million barrels per day since the Gulf conflict began, accelerating to 4.6 million barrels per day in May
- Competition for energy resources is set

to intensify as Asian buyers return to the market

- European gas storage (excluding Italy) stands at approximately 47 per cent, well below the 80 per cent target, requiring an additional 35 billion cubic metres of gas
- Descalzi noted that European countries will need to secure

roughly 35 billion cubic metres of gas to refill storage facilities ahead of winter.

The comments come as the United States and Iran exchange strikes following the collapse of a 60-day ceasefire, with the Strait of Hormuz — through which roughly 20 per cent of global oil and LNG flows — now closed by Tehran. — SPUTNIK

IRGC announces closure of Hormuz "until further notice"

IRAN'S Islamic Revolutionary Guard Corps (IRGC) on Saturday (local time) announced the closure of the Strait of Hormuz "until further notice", stating that the strategic waterway would remain shut until the United States ends its "interference" in the West Asia region, Press TV reported.

According to an IRGC statement cited by Press TV, the decision was taken "in light of the security situation resulting from the unlawful intervention of foreign powers".

"The Strait of Hormuz has been closed until further notice and will remain closed until the United States ends its in-

tervention in the region. No vessel will be permitted to transit the strait," the statement said, as quoted by Press TV.

The IRGC Navy also warned against any further military action against Iran under the pretext of the waterway's closure, saying such actions would draw a strong response.

"Should the aggressor enemy exploit this development, which it, itself, has caused, as a pretext for committing another act of aggression against us, it will be met with a forceful response, and additional enemy bases in the region will be targeted," the statement added. — ANI

South Korea triggers new emergency heat warning

SOUTH Korea issued its first-ever emergency heatwave alert on Sunday under a new warning system launched this year, advising people to halt outdoor activities and keep cool.

The new warning system was introduced to better deal with a rising number of heatwaves in South Korea, which have become longer and more intense, officials said.

An emergency alert is issued when areas experiencing a heatwave are forecast to hit perceived temperatures of 38C or an actual temperature of 39C for one day.

"The Korea Meteorological Administration issued an Emergency Heat-

wave Warning at 10 am today (GMT 0100) for two cities in southern North Gyeongsang Province — Gyeongsan and Pohang," said chief Lee Mi-seon at a press briefing.

"This marks the first time it has been issued since the system took effect," she added. The affected areas saw temperatures reach the emergency criteria over the weekend. "An emergency heatwave warning does not simply mean the weather is extremely hot," Lee said. "It indicates conditions in which even healthy people face a significantly elevated risk of serious harm, including heat-related illness and death." — AFP
