Humanitarian aid, medical supplies delivered to earthquake survivors

UE to the Mandalay earthquake that struck on 28 March 2025, damage was reported in the Nay Pyi Taw Council Area, Sagaing Region, Mandalay Region, Magway Region, Shan State, and Bago Region.

Domestic and international donors and philanthropists have provided humanitarian assistance, including essential supplies and medicines, and an official announcement regarding these support activities from 28 April to 4 May has been released.

From 5 to 12 May, out of the tarpaulin, foodstuffs, commodities, water purifiers, medicines donated by Vietnam, Malaysia, Brazil and Bolivarian Republic of Venezuela, the medicines and med-

ical supplies were handed over to the Healthcare Work Committee (Ministry of Health), and the remaining supplies were also distributed depending on the number of victims.



BAY INFERENCE: Southwest monsoon has advanced into the southern Myanmar areas, Andaman Sea and Southeast Bay of Bengal. Monsoon is moderate over the Andaman Sea and Southeast Bay. Weather is partly cloudy elsewhere over the Bay of Bengal.

FORECAST VALID UNTIL NOON OF 14 May 2025: Rain or thundershowers will be widespresd in Ayeyawady, Taninthayi Regions and Kachin, Kayin, Mon, Shan States, fairly widespread in Nay Pyi Taw, Yangon, Mandalay, Bago, Upper Sagaing Regions and scattered in the remaining Regions and States with likelihood of isolated heavyfalls in Mandalay, Lower Sagaing, Taninthayi Regions and Mon State. Degree of certainty is 100 per cent.

Therefore, residents in areas where terrorists have taken control must prioritize their safety and protect themselves from being exploited by these groups.

Myanmar continues receiving local, global quake aid

SINCE the powerful earthquake that struck on 28 March, search and rescue teams from the Myanmar Fire Brigade, along with local and international rescue organizations, have been conducting emergency operations in the affected areas without delay.

Both local donors and philanthropic individuals have been

providing financial aid and relief supplies to those affected by the disaster. Similarly, foreign governments, international organizations, and charitable donors have been offering monetary and material assistance.

Between 4 pm on 12 May and 4 pm on 13 May, various forms of international assistance arrived at Yangon International Airport, including medications, tents, and sleeping bags, weighing a total of 0.141 tonne from India.

Updates will continue to be provided regarding the financial and material donations from both local and foreign philanthropists to support the affected communities. — MNA/ MKKS

Day 2 offers fair-priced construction supplies for quake survivors

THE second-day event to sell iron, steel, cement and construction materials to the people affected by the earthquake continued in Taboung Ground near the Uppatasanti Pagoda with a large crowd of visitors yesterday.

The booths of construction materials were crowded with visitors across the nation.

U Arkar Doe from Pobbathiri Township said, "I came here to buy cement. We need to queue to buy the materials. I also thank the organizations as they sell the quality iron, steel, cement and construction materials at cheap prices during this period. I want to buy cement to repair my house, which was destroyed by the earthquake. The cement buyers are required to carry a national identity card, a record photo, a household list (copy),

address and phone number. Officials also explained us very well."

Daw Htay Htay Lwin from Pyinmana said, "I heard about this event for quake survivors from my friend, and I came here to buy cement and other construction materials. The products are quality, and the prices are also fair."

UMFCCI also organized the MSIA-Talk Show, and Sayagyi U Kyi Tha led the show under the topic "The Rise of Criminal Cases with Technological Advancement".

UMFCCI, Myanmar Iron and Steel Association, Myanmar Steel Association, Myanmar Cement Association and Myanmar Construction Entrepreneurs Association jointly organized this event until 18 May. — Min Kyaw Swa/KTZH

Volunteer-led rescue, rehab efforts ongoing in quake zones

TATMADAW members, Myanmar Police Force members, foreign rescue squads and volunteers are making concerted efforts in rescue and rehabilitation operations in the Mandalay earthquake-affected areas.

Lt-Gen Thet Pon from the Office of the Commander-in-Chief (Army) yesterday inspected the clearing of debris at damaged and collapsed buildings, including religious edifices, affected by the Mandalay earthquake in Sagaing and on Sagaing Hill.

He attended the ceremony to provide K21.365 million for rice and construction materials and for families of those who lost their lives and sustained injuries in the earthquake by the Department of Disaster Management, kitchen utensils by AHA Centre and personal goods by China at the 700th Anniversary Gymnasium in Sagaing. He also observed the sale of construction materials for the earthquake-affected people.

At Mandalay University, Lt-Gen Myo Moe Aung from the Office of the Commander-in-Chief (Army) inspected the removal of debris at damaged buildings and presented foodstuffs to teachers. He visited the place of Mingala Market at the corner of 73rd and 30th streets in Chanayethazan Township and inspected the sale

of construction materials at fair prices to the earthquake-affected people.

Lt-Gen Soe Tint Naing from the Office of the Commander-in-Chief (Army) looked into the clearing of debris at collapsed religious buildings and the systematic handover of relic objects to officials in Pyigyidagun Township. He viewed the removal of damaged parts at the No 2 Basic Education High School in Amarapura Township and met with students and teachers, preparing for the matriculation examination at the camp.

Lt-Gen Myo Thant Naing from the Office of the Command-er-in-Chief (Army) viewed the

repair of the tilted Kyaukthitta Pagoda and other religious buildings at Shwemuhtaw Pagoda in Kyaukse. He also oversaw the sale of construction materials for the quake-affected buildings in Singaing Township and the construction of modular houses for the relevant departments. — MNA/TTA

336 foreign telecom fraud suspects repatriated

A total of 336 foreign nationals involved in telecom fraud and related crimes were repatriated to their home countries through the Myanmar–Thailand Friendship Bridge II, according to official sources. The move was carried out as per international legal procedures, with consideration for humanitarian principles and bilateral friendship.

These individuals illegally entered Myanmar through border routes from neighbouring countries, including Thailand, and were operating illegal online gambling and scam activities in areas such as Myawady-Shwe Kokko, Maetawthalay (KK Park), and Kyaukkhat in Kayin State. The group included 35

Pakistani nationals, one South African, 211 Vietnamese nationals, and 89 Ethiopian nationals.

To ensure proper procedures and smooth coordination

for the repatriation process, Kayin State Minister for Social Affairs U Saw Tun Aung and relevant officials met with interdepartmental teams on the

morning of the repatriation. They inspected the repatriation process, ensuring accuracy and completeness of documentation and addressed any necessary follow-ups.

Following the inspection, a formal handover ceremony was held. Attendees included Minister U Saw Tun Aung and officials from Myanmar, as well as representatives from the embassies of the countries concerned. Myanmar officials formally handed over all related documentation for the repatriation to the respective embassy representatives.

From 30 January to 13 May 2025, Myanmar authorities apprehended a total of 9,059 foreign

nationals who had entered the country illegally. Of these, 8,132 individuals were repatriated to their home countries via Thailand, while the remaining 927 foreign nationals are currently being prepared for transfer and are under secure custody.

Myanmar authorities are actively working to identify, arrest and take strong legal action against foreign nationals involved in online scam operations, particularly those who are masterminds behind such schemes. Simultaneously, efforts are ongoing to promptly repatriate foreign nationals who were victimized or trafficked, in close cooperation with their respective governments. — MNA/KZL

Over 190,000 acres of summer paddy harvested

A total of 267,078 acres of summer paddy were cultivated in Yangon Region during the summer paddy season. As of the second week of May, over 190,000 acres have already been harvested, and the harvesting process is expected to be completed by the end of May, according to the regional Agriculture Department.

The region is estimated to plant 250,896 acres of summer paddy in 2025, and it has already cultivated 267,078 acres, and expanded 16,182 acres than the previous year. The harvesting processes are in progress in respective townships, and this year per-acre yield is 93.4 baskets.

"As we receive adequate water, we can grow more summer paddy than last year. The department also cooperates with the farmers to provide techniques, and so the production rate becomes higher. Although we used a manual system in the past, we now use machinery, and so the plantation fields and the incomes of the farmers are on the rise. The average production rate is over 90 baskets per acre, but some produce over 100 baskets. In May, we will harvest all the summer paddy. After the summer paddy, we will keep cultivating the monsoon paddy. The rice sufficiency rate has been increasing year by year,

ensuring food security, and we are grateful to the farmers for their continued efforts and cooperation in making this possible," said Daw Hla Kyi, assistant director of the department.

The regional government provided 8,000 drum seeders in the townships, and it expanded to 85,726 acres in 2024 and 106,242 acres in 2025 under the seeder system. The summer paddy is grown in eight districts, and the Twantay district produced the highest amount of summer paddy.

The department provides the needed assistance to plant the monsoon paddy in the region, and the remaining harvesting processes for Sin Thukha, 90-day, Thee Htet Yin, GW-11, Vietnam, glutinous rice and other short-term paddy will be completed this month. — Nyein Thu (MNA)/KTZH

Wahywet Protected Public Forest aims to safeguard significant tree species, protect endangered wildlife and other fauna, and provide benefits such as increased forest cover, improved soil quality, groundwater conservation, and a more favourable climate. — MNA/MKKS



Kyaukka Shweguni Pagoda to host consecration, Pujania festival

THE consecration ceremony and Buddha Pujaniya festival of Kyaukka Shweguni Pagoda, located in Monywa Township, Sagaing Region, will be held on the 8th waning of Kason, 1387 ME, according to U Htun Aye, a member of the Kyaukka Shweguni Pagoda Board of Trustees.

The Buddha Pujaniya festival of Kyaukka Shweguni Pagoda was celebrated every year until 2019. However, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, from around 2021 onwards, the traditional festival procession has not been held. Instead, the festival is now marked annually with the consecration ceremony and offering of meals to monks at dawn.

U Htun Aye stated, "On the 8th waning of Kason, at dawn, twelve eminent monks will be invited, and meals will be offered to them. The consecration ceremony will also be held at the pagoda".

The Kyaukka Shweguni Pagoda and the sacred image are open for people to worship daily from 6 am to 11 am. On sabbath days and days of religious significance, the pagoda remains open from 6 am to 4 pm. Devotees can make merit by gilding the sacred image with gold foils, which are sold at K2,000 per leaf by the Board of Trustees.

"The fair will also feature affordable homes worth K5.9

The fair features 22 stalls selling cement, bricks, bamboo sheets, zinc roofing sheets, pipes, electrical accessories, and other building materials at affordable prices.

Similar fairs are planned in Nay Pyi Taw, Mandalay, and Sagaing to sell construction materials at affordable prices for the reconstruction of areas affected by the Mandalay earthquake. Additionally, a fair is being held from 12 to 27 May at the Nay Pyi Taw Tabaung Ground. — ASH/TH

Customs urges completion of pending MACCS trade documents

THE Customs Department notified importers and exporters, and customs declaration filers to complete the pending trade documentation under the Myanmar Automated Cargo Clearance System (MACCS).

Additionally, post-clearance audits with the Other Government Agencies (OGAs) are also required to be finalized.

Therefore, the Customs Department notified importers and exporters to cooperate in resolving pending status when contacted by Customs.

Export activities must be carried out only after obtaining licences through automatic licensing and non-automatic licensing systems on the Myanmar Tradenet 2.0 platform, according to the Department of Customs' Myanmar Automated Cargo Clearance System's notification 008/2025 dated 2 May. The Trade Department has already notified that, according to Bulletin 3/2025 of the

Trade Department. While filling in declarations under MACCS, additional information on the licence declaration and licence balancing must be carried out according to the previous procedures. The Trade Department notified on 1 April that export activities were allowed without seeking licences for the whole of April, following a post-earthquake network connecting errors in quake-stricken regions. — NN/

CBM sells US\$820K, THB1.5M on 12 May

THE Central Bank of Myanmar (CBM) sold over US\$820,000 and 1.5 million baht on 12 May.

CBM also injected over 3.6 million baht on 9 May again into the financial market after over 5.3 million baht and 723,000 yuan on 8 May, and \$710,000 on 7 May into the financial market.

CBM announced on 6 May that it would sell \$33 million and 200 million baht to those engaged in the fuel oil industry. CBM sold 397,843 yuan on that day.

CBM injected over \$42 million, over 20 million baht and 500,000 yuan in April, over \$126 million, 320 million baht and 3.6 million yuan in March, over \$88 million, 7.5 million

yuan and 161 million baht in February and over \$124 million. over 13.8 million baht and over 4.8 million yuan in January. CBM aims to curb the instability in the foreign exchange market and currency devaluation. According to CBM's notification on 15 March, it has been collaborating with law enforcement agencies to combat and prosecute those who attempt to manipulate the currency market under the existing laws. Out of 30,000 tonnes of diesel and 20,000 tonnes of petrol donated by China, 18,000 tonnes of diesel arrived at Thilawa Port in Yangon on 2 May and 17,000 tonnes of petrol on 7 May. The Ministry of Energy kept the donation systematically and used it in rehabilitation and rehabilitation processes.

Of 500 prefabricated offices donated by China, 340 arrived at Yangon Thilawa Port on 2 May, and 216 were distributed to Nay Pyi Taw on 6 May, while 80 were sent to Mandalay Region and 44 to Nay Pyi Taw on 12 May.

Moreover, out of 4,500 prefabricated houses donated by China, 1,576 arrived at Yangon Thilawa Port on 9 May, and 216 were distributed to Mandalay and Sagaing regions on 9 May, while 184 were sent to Nay Pyi Taw on 11 May by train.

The donated items received within one week are distributed to the quake survivors and staff in Nay Pyi Taw under the arrangement of Nay Pyi Taw Council and relevant ministries, and rele-

vant governments in Mandalay Region, Sagaing Region and Shan State.

To date, 57 vehicles loaded with relief materials have been distributed to Mandalay Region, while 29 to Sagaing Region and nine to Shan State (South).

The inventory of distribution of donated items by the international donors from 5 to 12 May is mentioned in the separate spreadsheets. The distribution processes will be released once a week. — MNA/KTZH

Efficiently utilize natural resources for the development of the country

HE development of electric power is a fundamental pillar of national growth and economic prosperity. Electricity is essential for economic advancement and improving the population's living standards in line with progress. Consequently, the average per capita electricity consumption in a country is a key indicator of both its economic development and the standard of living of its citizens.

Myanmar is rich in natural resources and has the potential to generate sufficient electricity. However, two main issues contribute to the current shortage: electricity production remains below demand, and the transmission and distribution systems are inadequate. Despite its capacity for power generation, challenges in these sectors continue to cause a lack of reliable electricity.

Several solar power plants have been constructed and are currently generating electricity in Thazi Township of Mandalay Region as a reliable source to generate electricity. Currently, as generating electricity in Myanmar has declined due to various factors, entire people, including relevant departmental personnel, have to make utmost efforts to repair and reconstruct power generation facilities, which have since been restored to 80 per cent of production capacity that is currently supplied to the national grid. Continued efforts are essential to further improve socioeconomic

conditions.

In Myanmar, the abundance of water resources means that most of the country's electricity comes from hydropower plants. Natural gas power plants are the second-largest source of electricity. Only a small number of facilities use coal or other sources for power generation. In developed countries, the annual per capita electricity production in kilowatts is high, while in developing countries like Myanmar, per capita electricity consumption remains low.

Countries around the world prioritize building hydroelectric power projects in regions with abundant water resources. This strategy helps conserve other natural energy sources, such as coal and oil, while also reducing carbon dioxide emissions and minimizing environmental damage from electricity generation. Developed nations, in particular, are increasingly turning to renewable energy sources like hydroelectric, wind, and solar

Myanmar, a country rich in natural resources, is actively renovating, upgrading, and constructing hydroelectric power plants. In addition, it is enhancing the development of natural energy projects and striving to expand the production of renewable solar energy. Solar energy initiatives have been implemented since earlier times and now play a significant role in electricity distribution. Samatha-bharvana aims at gaining concentration or one-pointedness of Mind, and Vippasana-bhavana enables the practitioner to purify their Minds and acquire an insight into the real nature of all phe-

Technically speaking, concentration is the basis of insight. It is developed by fixing one's mind on a chaser object, say, a Buddha image, candlelight, a circular disc pointed in a particular colour or on breathing. Buddhist commentaries elaborate on forty varieties of such meditation objects, but the list may be extended indefinitely.


Insight meditation, on the other hand, is practised through the application of one's mind to the nature of things to be constantly mindful of one's physical and mental activities, so one may be able to penetrate deeply into the real nature of existence and do away with own mental impurities. In short, insight meditation is the direct purification method to cleanse one's mind of evils.

Both concentration and insight meditation can be developed side by side, and the development of one helps in the cultivation of the other. But ultimately, it is only insight meditation that, when perfected, leads man to the highest wisdom and cleanses his mind of all impurities, once and for all

Both kinds of meditation can be practised and applied in our daily lives. Both are of immense benefit to traction. Of all the many aspects of the Buddhist religion, meditation occupies a very important place of interest, especially in the west countries. In several Asian nations, like Myanmar, Japan, Thailand and Sri Lanka, where Buddhism is still very much a living force, it enjoys a long and uninterrupted tradition, receiving in more recent years even wider recognition among the populace.

As science and technology become increasingly developed, people have more and more cause to realize the relevance and significance of Buddhist meditation to life.

Meditation is a means of mental development. In Buddhism, the mind is the most important component of the entire

human entity. Meditation is the training of the mind, and because the mind is the most important factor that manipulates and controls our actions and speech, the practice of meditation can bring infinite benefits to us in life. Below are the best advantages of ated as:

- (1) Meditation helps to calm the mind and get it better organized.
- (2) Meditation strengthens our willpower and enables us to face all problems
- and difficulties with confidence.
- (3) Meditation makes us think positively. (4) It improves our efficiency at work by helping us to concentrate better and by sharpening our mental faculties.
- (5) It frees us from worries, restless
- (6) Meditation increases our mental health and therefore has a positive effect, to a large extent, on our physical health.
- (7) It cleanses our mind of defilements. (Kilesa = ကိုလေသာ)

Let me roughly describe the "Defile-

ment" as follows, according to the noble Theravada Buddhism

The "Defilement" means mind-defiling factor, impurity. There are ten kinds of mind-defiling factors have been enumer-

- (c) Bewildment (Moha = ഗോഗ = റോ (d) Conceit (Mona = မာန = ထောင်လွှား
- (e) Doubt (Vicikiecha = ဝိစိကိစ္ဆာ=ယုံမှား
- ခြင်း၊ မဆုံးဖြတ်ခြင်ခြင်း) (f) Mental Torpor = (Htina = &\$ =
- (g) Restlessness = (Uddhacc = ഉട്ടര്യ = မတည်ငြိမ်ခြင်း၊ ပုုံ့လွှင့်ခြင်း)
- (h) Shamelessness = (To do evil = အဟိရိက = Aheika= မကောင်းမပြုလုပ် ရမည်ကိုမရှက်ခြင်း)
- (i) Not fearing to evil = (Anottappa =မကောင်းမပြုရမည်ကိုမကြောက်မရွံ့ခြင်း) Because of attaching firmly, the "De-

filement" (Kilasa = තීගෙනා) men and women cannot escape from "suffering" (ຈຸက္ခ) or Sansayar (သံသရာ) or life=circle

(8) Meditation creates in us virtuous qualities like kindness, inner peace, humbleness (as opposed to arrogance), a realistic attitude toward life, and prevents us from being influenced by such elements as passion, selfishness, hatred, jealousy or greed.

(9) An untrained person is often dominated by delusion (Avijja) and his own preconceptions, which prevent him from having proper insight into reality. Meditation helps to remove such disadvantages. Meditation should, however, be borne in mind that the degree of benefits a man can derive from such practice depends entirely on the degree of achievement he makes and on how far he can apply meditation to real life. Several factors are important for the success of the practice, for example, a proper atmosphere.

Spiritual preparedness, proper frame of mind, self-confidence, frequency and regularity in practice, and so on.

Mind fullness according to the discourse, four objects may be taken for the practice namely "Body", "Sensation", "Mind" and "Mental Objects" (1. Body = Insight Meditation of Body = നാധായായ နာသတိပဌာန်) (2. Sensation = Insight Meditation of Venda = ဝေဒနာနုပဿနာသတိပဌာန်) (3. Mind = Insight Meditation of Citta = စိတ္တနုပဿနာသတိပဋ္ဌာန်) (4. Mental Objects = Insight Meditation of Dhamma = อยูวลุ ပဿနာသတိပဌာန်). Mindfulness is the key insight of meditation. When practising this type of meditation, one should endeavour to be mindful at all times of one's activities, mental and physical. Mindfulness should be developed to such an extent that it becomes natural and automatic. When that stage is reached, one can be said to dwell constantly in mindfulness. This is the way to spiritual purification.

Because of regularly practising insight meditation. I often get many good advantages for my life. For example, I fell seriously with a disease called prostate cancer and heart disease, near death, three years ago. However, I fortunately recovered (b) Hatred (Dosa = 3ෙන = නමුත්තුත් from chronic sickness on account of the good medical treatment and insight meditation. Now I serve daily as a member of the Eaindawya Pagoda trustee as a retired person. Besides with help of guidance from the famous experienced monks of insight meditation, I can explain a conversational demonstration in insight meditation, which is always held every Sunday evening at the Eaindawya Pagoda, Yangon. I Say What I See: Fake or Real -What's the Best Choice for Us?

NOT long ago, I purchased a Levi's belt online, thinking I had found the perfect addition to my wardrobe. However, what arrived was far from genuine - it was a counterfeit. In today's digital era, online shopping has become the preferred way to buy personal commodities, offering convenience and endless choices. Yet, amidst this vast marketplace, distinguishing authentic products from fraudulent ones has become increasingly difficult. With countless sellers and platforms, consumers often face uncertainty about the legitimacy of their purchases. To navigate this challenge, buyers must adopt a keen sense of awareness and wise decision-making. While the allure of purchasing from the comfort of one's home is undeniable, ensuring product authenticity is just as crucial as choosing what to buy.

During my time in Bangkok, Thailand, I had access to a wide variety of personal commodities - from shirts and polo shirts to long pants, jeans, slacks, and belts. As a low-income worker, I often sought out branded products at discounted prices, taking advantage of department store sales. These sales made quality brands more accessible to consumers like me. Among my favourites, Arrow stood out as my go-to for shirts - whether long-sleeved or short-sleeved - as well as slacks, belts, and wallets. When it came to jeans, Levi's was always my top choice, a brand I admired for its style and durability.

From a young age, I was taught the value of discipline and personal presentation by my late father. No matter the circumstances, I took meticulous care of my shirts and pants - washing and ironing them with precision, even though our home in Rangoon had maids to assist with household chores. This routine was more than just upkeep; it was a reflection of respect for my appearance and the items I owned. Over the years, I developed a deep appreciation for quality clothing, holding onto cherished brands like Levi's and Arrow for a decade or more. These weren't just garments; they were part of my identity, each piece carrying memories and personal value. But beyond brands, I believe that taking care of ourselves and the things we own - especially personal items like clothing - is a fundamental practice of self-respect and mindfulness. Whether branded or not, our belongings deserve proper care, reflecting the way we value ourselves in everyday life.

Let's get straight to business – my essay title – before drifting too far into my deep-rooted connection with branded clothing. Last year, while browsing social media, I stumbled upon an online shop and decided to buy a belt - my favourite brand, Levi Strauss. The idea of securing a good deal was tempting, especially since I had once purchased a Levi's belt in Bangkok for nearly THB1,200 in the 2000s. This time, however, I found one at just K30,000, a price far lower than what I had paid years ago. At the time, the exchange rate stood at approximately K50 per baht, making my purchase in Bangkok for THB1,200 equivalent to K60,000. By contrast, the belt I bought in Myanmar cost me only K30,000, a significantly lower price as the current rate is about K100 per baht.

Out of curiosity - and perhaps a bit of scepticism - I proceeded with the purchase, wondering if it would serve as proof of fraudulent products circulating in the online marketplace. Unsurprisingly, when the belt arrived, it was fake. Yet, it looked convincing enough to fool an untrained eye. We all know the difference between fake and real - sometimes obvious, sometimes subtle. And despite its questionable authenticity, I have continued using it. My disciplined care for my belongings has allowed this counterfeit piece to last longer than expected, reinforcing that how we handle our possessions often matters more than their authenticity.

In closing, I urge my dear readers to make thoughtful choices - whether selecting branded or non-branded products. Every purchase should be guided by careful consideration, ensuring that what we buy is truly worth its value. Wise decision-making is key to avoiding fraudulent commodities, and it is essential that stronger rules and regulations be enforced to protect vulnerable consumers from exploitation

At 62 years old, I have firsthand experience of how authenticity matters – not just in material goods but in life itself. Today, I rely on two dentures, replacing my upper and lower teeth. While they serve their purpose, they can never fully replicate the strength of real teeth. This simple truth applies to everything: a fake can never truly be real.

That is why I encourage my dear readers to exercise wisdom in your choices. Whether purchasing personal commodities or navigating life's decisions, let discernment and awareness guide you towards the best possible outcome.

70% of Chinese people want to lose weight: white paper

The white paper indicated that half of Chinese adults misjudge their body mass index (BMI), and 14 per centof those who believe they are healthy are actually classified as overweight based on BMI measurements.

CHINA has witnessed increasing public awareness of weight control, with 70 per cent of its people hoping to lose weight and more than 60 per cent willing to spend time and effort on achieving this goal.

This was revealed by a white paper on the health and weight control of Chinese adults, which was made public at an obesity prevention conference held in Foshan, south China's Guangdong Province, on Saturday.

The white paper showed

that half of Chinese adults have made self-assessments that do not match their actual body mass index (BMI), while 14 per cent who consider themselves to be in the healthy range are overweight in terms of the BMI measurement.

Such inaccuracy in self-assessment makes it tougher to prevent and control cardiovascular and cerebrovascular diseases, diabetes and other chronic diseases, indicating an insufficient understanding of obesity's risk to health,

according to Liang Xiaofeng, vice-chairman of the Chinese Preventive Medicine Association, the organization which authored the white paper.

Currently, 34.3 per cent of Chinese adults are overweight and 16.4 per cent are obese, according to the National Health Commission. It warned that 70.5 per cent of Chinese adults would be overweight or obese by 2030 without steps to control the threat -- which would result in medical expenses amounting to US\$61 billion. — Xinhua

Rare bone-eroding disease ruining lives in Kenya's poorest county

IN the heart of Kenya's Turkana County, Joyce Lokonyi embodies the struggle against mycetoma, a devastating disease that has claimed her foot and left her marginalized. This fungal infection, often entering through minor wounds, leads to severe tissue erosion and, ultimately, amputation when it reaches the bone.

Joyce, now 28, recalls the isolation she faced after her amputation, as community members feared contamination. "They said I would leave traces



of the disease wherever I went,' she lamented.

Turkana, where 70 per cent of the population lives in poverty, lacks adequate healthcare, making mycetoma a silent epidemic. Recognized as a neglected disease by the World Health Organization only in 2016, it remains poorly understood, with many doctors unaware of its symptoms.

Local health facilities, like Lodwar Hospital, see cases regularly, yet treatment is costly and often inaccessible for subsistence farmers.

Lab technician John Ekai, who has treated over 100 mycetoma patients, expresses concern for those who vanish into the arid landscape, their conditions worsening without care.

Young mother Jennifer Ekal, living with the disease since age 11, fears for her future despite ongoing treatment. "I do not want to think about the worst," she confides, reflecting the uncertainty that haunts many in her community. — AFP

China concludes peak autumn grain purchase season

CHINA'S 2024 peak autumn grain purchase season has concluded, having reached a "relatively high level" compared to recent years, according to the National Food and Strategic Reserves Administration on Monday. This peak season in China typically begins in mid-to-late September and ends in late April of the following year. During the most recent season, purchases of autumn grain totalled 345 million tonnes nationwide, data from the administration has revealed.

Autumn grain purchases are vital to China's grain security, accounting

for nearly 75 per cent of the country's annual grain purchases. Major commodities include rice, corn and soyhears

Looking ahead to the

upcoming summer grain purchase season, the administration said it will fully unleash market vitality while increasing procurement efforts to maintain reasonable grain prices. China saw record grain production in 2024, when its annual output surpassed 700 million tonnes for the first time.

According to this year's "No 1 central document," the country will work to safeguard its grain security, with reform, opening-up, and scientific and technological innovation as the driving forces. Grain security has long been a central priority for the Chinese government. With under 10 per cent of the planet's arable land, China feeds one-fifth of the world's population. — Xinhua

Honda expects 70% drop in FY 2025 profit amid US tariff woes

HONDA Motor Co said Tuesday it expects its net profit for the current fiscal year starting April to plunge 70.1 per cent from a year earlier to 250 billion yen (\$1.7 billion), amid economic uncertainty caused by US President Donald Trump's higher tariffs.

Japan's second-largest carmaker by volume also said its sales are projected at 20.3 trillion yen, down 6.4 per cent from the previous year, with concern mounting that the tariffs could weigh on corporate performance and deal a heavy blow to the global economy.

Honda said the US levies could lower its operating profit by 650 billion yen in fiscal 2025, while possible volatility in the foreign exchange market -- especially involving the US dollar -- is likely to cut it by 452 billion yen.

Major Japanese automakers, including Honda, have been bracing for developments under Trump's protectionist "America First" policy, particularly the additional 25 per cent tariff imposed since April on all vehicles made outside the United States.

Gold investments booming in Japan as US tariffs stir economic fears

JAPAN is seeing a boom in gold investment amid heightening concerns over a global economic slowdown caused by US President Donald Trump's hefty tariffs, as investors seek a safe asset seen as

unlikely to plummet in the event of turbulence.

The benchmark price of gold set by Tokyo's Tanaka Precious Metal Technologies Co hit an all-time high in yen terms on 22 April, exceeding 17,000 yen (\$115) and surging around 15 per cent in the three months since Trump took office on 20 January.

Products linked to gold price movements have also become popular among investment trusts covered by Japan's tax exemption programme for private investors, known as NISA, while more people have started monthly investments in pure gold.

Among investment trusts, the inflows to the

Mitsubishi UFJ fine gold fund that reflects gold prices totalled some 19.2 billion yen in March, up by about 2.6-fold from last December.

The fund ranked fourth last December in

investment trusts under the NISA programme in terms of value handled by PayPay Securities Corp but topped the ranking in February and placed second in the following month, it said. — Kyodo

Survey shows Japanese vulnerable to misinformation online: govt

AROUND half of respondents to a survey believed at least one of 15 instances of false information on social media after seeing or hearing about it, the Japanese government's first-ever survey on public awareness of misinformation showed Tuesday.

With the spread of fake news, data and comments becoming a serious problem, the government is eager to accelerate efforts to improve media literacy, as people are often prone to believe unsourced information presented online. Among the respondents, 47.7 per cent were misled.

The survey, conducted by the Ministry of Internal Affairs and Communications, examined false claims such as the idea that the mass beaching of sardines or whales signals an impending earthquake or results from seismic activity.

One in four who came across such information went on to spread it further by telling family, friends or posting on social media, with 27.1 per cent saying they found the content "surprising" and over 20 per cent describing it as "interesting" or "helpful to others".

Internal affairs minister Seiichiro Murakami told reporters that the survey "has highlighted the importance of measures to enhance (media) literacy", with his ministry urging people to be sceptical and to check the veracity of information before spreading it.

The outcome of the latest survey showed 90 per cent of respondents said they recognized the necessity of media and information literacy, but many had not taken any steps to improve their understanding.

The survey was carried out online between March and April, targeting 2,820 people aged 15 or older across the country. — Kyodo

40 civilians, 11 soldiers killed in Indian strikes on Pakistan last week: military

THE Pakistani military said on Tuesday that at least 40 civilians, including 15 children and seven women, were killed and 121 others injured in Indian missile strikes across Pakistan last week.

According to a statement issued by the Inter-Services Public Relations (ISPR), the media wing of the Pakistani military, in response, the Pakistan Armed Forces launched a precise retaliatory campaign under Operation Bunyanun Marsoos (Concrete Structure).

While defending the homeland, 11 members of the Pakistan Armed Forces were killed and 78 others sustained injuries, the ISPR said.

The statement added that six of the dead belonged to the Pakistan Army, and five were from the Pakistan Air Force. — Xinhua

Man arrested over suspected arson attacks at British PM's home

A 21-year-old man was arrested early Tuesday in connection with a series of suspected arson attacks, including a fire at a property owned by British Prime Minister Keir Starmer. The Metropolitan Police confirmed that the suspect was detained on suspicion of arson with intent to endanger life. He remains in custody as the investigation continues.

Due to the involvement of a high-profile public figure, the Metropolitan Police's Counterterrorism Command is leading the investigation. The arrest follows three recent fire-related incidents in north London. Emergency services responded to reports of a fire at 1:35 am local time (0035 GMT) on Monday at the entrance of a residential property in Kentish Town. The property, believed to be owned by Starmer and rented out, suffered damage, but no injuries were reported. Starmer lived in the house before moving to 10 Downing Street following the Labour Party's general election victory last year. — Xinhua

Freed Israeli-American hostage Edan Alexander returns to Israel from Gaza

ISRAELI-AMERICAN hostage Edan Alexander arrived in Israel on Monday evening after being released from Gaza, where he was held in Hamas captivity for 19 months, Israel's Defence Ministry said in a statement.

Alexander arrived at southern Israel's Re'im military base adjacent to the Gaza Strip to reunite with his family, who landed only a few hours earlier from the United States.

A photo taken earlier in Gaza showed Alexander, wearing a black T-shirt and a baseball cap, being accompanied by armed Hamas militants and a woman from the Red Cross during a handover process.

Alexander was released

following direct talks between Washington and Hamas. US President Donald Trump welcomed the release, writing in a post on his Truth Social platform: "Edan Alexander, the last living American hostage, is being released. Congratulations to his wonderful parents, family, and friends!" — Xinhua

Departing Ancelotti has 'no problem' with Real Madrid

CARLO Ancelotti said on Tuesday he "has no problem" with Real Madrid ahead of his departure from the club at the end of the season to take over the Brazil national team.

The veteran Italian will become Selecao boss on 26 May, the day after Madrid's last La Liga match of the campaign.

The Spanish giants are yet to name a replacement, although Xabi Alonso is a strong favourite to take over after confirming he will leave Bayer Leverkusen.

The Brazilian football federation (CBF) announced Ancelotti's appointment on Monday, before any official confirmation from Madrid regarding Ancelotti's departure.

"The CBF issued that statement because I'll be the coach of Brazil from the 26th. Madrid will issue a statement whenever they want, there is no problem," Ancelotti told reporters on the eve of his team's match against Real Mallorca.

"I will be the coach of Brazil, which is a challenge, but until then, I'm the coach of Real Madrid and I want to finish in the best possible way.

"I'm focused on the final stretch of this spectacular adventure".

Ancelotti, who has won 15 trophies including three Champions League titles across two spells at the Santiago Bernabeu, has endured a difficult final season in charge.

Real's La Liga title defence has faltered with Barcelona on the cusp of the title, while they also lost the Copa del Rey final to their arch rivals and were humbled in the Champions League quarter-finals by Arsenal.

"Football, like life, is an adventure that begins and ends," added the 65-year-old, who also lifted the European Cup twice as AC Milan coach.

"I've always kept in mind that this would end. I've had a great time... but in everything in life there comes a time when it ends.

"My seriousness and professionalism demand that I finish well here... $\ \ \,$

Alcaraz battles into Italian Open quarterfinals

CARLOS Alcaraz reached the Italian Open quarterfinals on Tuesday after battling past Karen Khachanov 6-3, 3-6, 7-5 to continue his bid for a first Rome title.

Third seed Alcaraz had never lost a set in his previous four meetings with Russia's Khachanov but was forced to fight on the Foro Italico centre court.

Alcaraz needs to get to the Rome semis not just for a chance at his third title of the season but also to secure a top-two seeding at the French Open which begins later this month.

The Spaniard took his 12th clay-court win of the year to set up a clash in the last eight with fifth seed Jack Draper, a winner over

France's Corentin Moutet.

"It was tiring. You know the match was really tough. I had to run. I had to run a lot," said Alcaraz.

"I didn't play well. I just fought and I'm just really happy about it."

Alcaraz seemed set to cruise through when he rattled off six games in a row to win the first set and the first game of the second.

Khachanov's fate looked sealed when his serve was broken in game five of the second set, but the big hitter had other ideas and immediately broke back before claiming the set.

And the 28-year-old showed incredible spirit to win three games on the bounce to level the third set at 4-4, just as Alcaraz look certain to win.

But Alcaraz would not be denied and took an entertaining match at the second time of asking.

Later Jannik Sinner faces the first true test of his pre-Roland Garros form when he takes on Argentina's Francisco Cerundolo. — AFP

Murray and Djokovic end coaching partnership after six months

ANDY Murray and former rival Novak Djokovic have ended their coaching partnership after six months, the pair announced on Tuesday.

Djokovic stunned the tennis world in November when he hired the retired Murray, who had no track record as a coach.

But the two 37-year-olds have now parted company after a tough start to the season for the 24-time Grand Slam champion, with the French Open looming.

"Thank you, coach Andy, for all the hard work, fun

and support over last six months on and off the court, really enjoyed deepening our friendship together," said Djokovic.


Britain's Murray, born just a week before the Serb, thanked his former adversary for the chance to work with him.

Russia continues to prepare for talks scheduled for 15 May in Istanbul - Kremlin

RUSSIA continues to prepare for negotiations with Ukraine scheduled for 15 May in Istanbul, Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov said on Tuesday.

"The Russian side continues to prepare for the talks, which are scheduled to take place on Thursday," Peskov told reporters.

The Kremlin will announce who will represent Russia at the Istanbul talks as soon as Russian President Vladimir Putin deems it necessary to announce this, the official added.

Europe is entirely on Ukraine's side and cannot claim a balanced approach in the negotiation process, Peskov added.

Europe's approach to Ukraine is aimed at continuing the conflict and contrasts with the approach of Moscow and Washington, the official added. — SPUTNIK

Bomb scare on plane halts operations at Belgian airport

OPERATIONS at Belgium's second largest airport were briefly suspended on Tuesday due to a bomb alert on a Ryanair flight from Portugal, the company running the airport and the airline said.

Shortly before 11:00 am (0900 GMT) "a bomb threat was triggered" on board an aircraft that landed at Charleroi airport, said a spokeswoman for its operator. "A security perimeter was established around the aircraft," the spokeswoman said.

This required the runway to be closed as authorities took over, halting operations, she added. Air traffic eventually resumed at 1:45 pm. Charleroi, south of Brussels, is a major European hub for low-cost airline Ryanair, which said the threat concerned one of its planes.

"Ryanair was informed of a security threat on flight FR6313 from Faro to Brussels Charleroi," the company said.

"Passengers have been disembarked and the aircraft is being prepared for return to service. We sincerely apologize to any passengers affected." — AFP

Iran says it's open to temporary uranium enrichment limits

IRAN is open to accepting temporary limits on its uranium enrichment, its deputy foreign minister said Tuesday, while adding that talks with the United States have yet to address such specifics

Tehran and Washington on Sunday held their fourth round of nuclear talks, which kicked off last month, marking their highest-level contact since the United States in 2018 pulled out of the 2015 nuclear deal. "For a limited period of time, we can accept a series of restrictions on the level and volume of enrichment," said Deputy Foreign Minister Majid Takht-Ravanchi.

"We have not yet gone into details about the level and volume of enrichment," he said, quoted by Tasnim news agency.

Iran currently enriches uranium to 60 per cent purity -- far above the 3.67 per cent limit set in the 2015 deal but below the 90 per cent needed for weapons-grade material.

US Secretary of State Marco Rubio said Monday that Iran was the only country in the world without nuclear weapons that enriches uranium to that level. — AFP
