SENIOR General Min Aung Hlaing highlighted that the general election will be held to form the relevant Hluttaws, providing ethnic groups and representatives of various social strata with the opportunity to participate.

Chairman of the State Administration Council Prime Minister Senior General Min Aung Hlaing said so at the coordination meeting of the Union government at the SAC Chairman Office in Nay Pyi Taw yesterday morning.

Speaking at the meeting, he noted that it is necessary to take measures to forge security, peace and stability for political parties to conduct canvassing. He stressed that the government must prepare to successfully hold the election under the law. Election must be conducted to constitute Pyithu Hluttaw, Amyotha Hluttaw and regional and state Hluttaws under the law.

The Senior General unveiled that the Myanmar Electronic Voting Machine (Myanmar EVM) process is being implemented to ensure that voters can cast their votes easily and transparently, guarantee accurate election results, eliminate invalid votes, prevent fraudulent activities, and maintain transparency to prevent electoral fraud.

With regard to criminal cases, he underscored that regional and state authorities, along with officials at all levels, must take strict and decisive action to uncover SEE PAGE 3



Residents Urged to Prioritize Public Safety Amid Armed Terrorist Threats

ARMED terrorists have been launching attacks by using residential homes and administrative buildings in towns and villages as cover, where they have forcibly settled. They aim to shield themselves from Tatmadaw counterattacks while also persuading temporarily displaced persons to return to their native areas and recruiting new members. That enables terrorists to use civilians as human shields. Tatmadaw is committed to safeguarding the sovereignty of the State and will respond to these threats based on intelligence and prevailing conditions. Therefore, residents in areas where terrorists have taken control must prioritize their safety and protect themselves from being exploited by these groups.

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and eliminate online gambling and scams, and other criminal activities within their respective areas.

Moreover, he continued that effective measures will be taken against those involved in drug-related cases and other crimes. If any responsible officials within these territories are found to be involved in these crimes, they will also face strict legal action. Therefore, it is essential for all concerned to adhere to and implement these directives seriously.

The Senior General disclosed that according to the Natural Disaster Management Law, losses of citizens due to violence and armed insurgency are also covered by natural disaster risk criteria. Therefore, the government will provide support to displaced persons, ensuring that they are listed in the register. The registration process must ensure that all displaced persons in the relevant regions are included, and no one is left out of the register. A systematic collection of land-based data must be conducted, and efforts should be made to provide efficient and effective support.

Moreover, the Senior General emphasized that as Myanmar has lesser productivity in the agriculture sector and GDP than ASEAN member states and other countries, it is necessary to

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Tabu Hla Dam boosts irrigation for 29,570 acres of summer paddy in Taikkyi

THE irrigation water is distributed from the two main canals of Tabu Hla dam to 29,570 acres of summer paddy, the reliable fields of farmers, in Taikkyi of Yangon Region, according to Taikkyi District Department of Irrigation and Water Utilization Management.

The left and right canals of Tabu Hla dam started distributing irrigation water for summer paddy on 1 January, and the operation will continue until the end of April.

"We distributed water of Tabu Hla dam to 29,570 acres of summer paddy in Taikkyi, Okkan

kkyi District. Our department's main duties are flood prevention and irrigation water supply. The summer paddy cultivation rate increases year by year, and we can also supply enough water. Therefore, the socioeconomic status of farmers develops and the GDP of the country also grows. We are happy for it, and we accelerate the dam water irrigation maintenance to expand the summer paddy cultivation this year under the guidance of the regional government," said U Tun Tun Oo, assistant director of the department.

A total of 201,000 acres of summer paddy have been targeted for Yangon Region. The region cultivated 250,896 acres of summer paddy last year, and it completed 207,287 acres until the first week of February this year. There were 29,174 acres of summer paddy in Taikkyi District last year, and the estimation is 29,570 acres this year.

Dams such as Tabu Hla, Paunglin, Lagunpyin, Mahuya, Ngamoeyeik, Kalihtaw, Taunglonemyaung, Bantbwaygon and Zarmaiinn irritate the summer paddy fields and supply water for Yangon Region.

Among the nine dams, Tabu Hla Dam boasts the highest water storage capacity at 197,600 acre-feet and provides the most irrigation water in the region.

In 17 townships of eight districts of the region, 90-day, Sin Thukha, Yadana Toe and glutinous rice are the most commonly grown varieties, whereas 15 types of summer paddy are cultivated. Meanwhile, the Tabu Hla Dam supplies water to 29,570 acres of summer paddy in the region. — Nyein Thu (MNA)/KTZH

'Thanlwin' hospital ship provides medical services in Hainggyikyun

THE Tatmadaw Hospital Ship Thanlwin, accompanied by mobile specialist medical teams comprising consultants, doctors, and nurses, has been providing healthcare services to residents along the Taninthayi coastal region, as well as to communities near Cocokyun Township in Yangon Region and Hainggyikyun in Ayeyawady Region.

The mobile medical team set up a temporary base at the Tatmadaw Hospital at Hainggyikyun to provide healthcare services to 619 residents from the town and nearby villages.

The treatments included general medical consultations for 125 patients, surgical care for 43 patients, obstetric and

gynaecological care for 27 patients, paediatric treatments for 48 children, orthopaedic care for 110 patients, ear, nose, and throat treatment for 50 patients, ophthalmology services for 138 patients, and dental care for 78 patients.

Moreover, five patients underwent general surgery, 35 received eye surgery, 50 had X-ray examinations, 47 were tested using ultrasound, 47 underwent ECG heart screenings, and 50 had laboratory tests. Furthermore, arrangements were made for 13 patients requiring further treatment to be referred to nearby Tatmadaw hospitals. — MNA/ KTZH

THE Buddha Pujaniya festival and alms rice offering ceremony will take place at Myathabeik Pagoda in Thaton Township, Mon State, according to U Soe Myint, Chairman of the Myathabeik Pagoda's Board of Trustees.

The annual Buddha Pujaniya festival is held on the full moon day of Tabodwe and features a traditional Myanmar Htamane-making competition, a township-wide rice offering ceremony, an oil light-offering ceremony, and a bustling market fair with numerous stalls within the pagoda's precincts.

"As in previous years, the Buddha Pujaniya festival will include the recitation of the Maha Pathana and an alms rice offering event for invited members of the Sangha. These activities will take place from the full moon day to the third waning day of Tabodwe," U Soe Myint added.

During the festival, the Buddha's sermons will be recited on the pagoda's platform. Additionally, at 5 am on the full moon day, monks will consecrate the pagoda at the mountain summit by offering flowers, candle lights, joss sticks, and 1,000 food offerings.

Moeyungyi Wetland Wildlife Sanctuary seeks ASEAN Heritage Park status

THE Bago Region Government has revealed that efforts are underway to designate the Moeyungyi Wetland Wildlife Sanctuary in Bago Township, Bago



Moeyungyi Wetland Wildlife Sanctuary is home to 120 mammal species, 28 species of amphibians and reptiles, 33 insect species, 77 resident bird species,

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Region, as an ASEAN Heritage Park.

In support of this designation, initiatives will be implemented to raise public awareness about the sustainable use of Moeyungyi Lake's wetland resources and ecosystem services. Additionally, community-based conservation efforts will be enhanced to ensure the long-term preservation of the natural ecosystem.

The Moeyungyi Lake, which spans 25,600 acres, has become

a seasonal refuge for various migratory bird species this year. Among them are the lesser whistling duck, gadwall, cotton pygmy goose, tufted duck, black-headed ibis, ruddy shelduck, northern pintail, Asian openbill, blackwinged stilt, river tern, and spotbilled pelican. Notably, rare bird species such as the glossy ibis have also been observed. According to records, the 44 species of fish, and 74 species of aquatic plants during the winter season.

As an inland wetland area, the Moeyungyi Lake serves as a critical habitat for migratory birds and endangered bird species. It is also an important site along the East Asia-Australasia Flyway network, offering a well-preserved natural ecosystem with rich biodiversity. Additionally, the sanctuary holds great potential for nature-based ecotourism. — ASH/KNN

CBM infuses over \$124M, THB13.8M, and CNY4.8M into financial markets in Jan 2025



THE Central Bank of Myanmar (CBM) pumped \$124 million, 13.8 million baht and 4.8 million yuan into financial markets in January 2025.

It announced on 31 January 2025 to sell 10 million yuan to importers and sold five million baht on that day.

CBM injected \$20 million into the fuel oil sector on 30 January, \$20 million on 24 January, 800,000 yuan on 21 January, 1.91 million baht on 20 January, \$150,000 and 1.14 million yuan on 17 January, one million baht on 16 January, over \$25.35 million and 369,000 yuan on 15 January and over \$1,600 and 556,000 baht on 14 January into the financial market.

US dollars and Thai baht banknotes displayed at the foreign exchange counter.

CBM announced on 13 January to sell \$25 million to fuel oil importers soon after selling 600,000 yuan on that day. CBM injected \$3.9 million on 11 January, 714,000 yuan on 10 January, \$2.2 million on 9 January, \$256,000 on 8 January again after sales of over \$2.15 million on 7 January, \$25 million and 2.8 million baht on 6 January, 510,000 yuan on 3 January, \$25 million, over 670,000 yuan and 2.45 million baht on 2 January into the financial market.

CBM pumped \$144 million, 321 million baht and over 12 million yuan in December 2024, over \$59 million, over 280 million baht and 8.78 million yuan in November and over \$91 million, over 610 million baht and 9.8 million yuan in October into the financial market.

CBM aims to curb the instability in the foreign exchange market and the currency devaluation. According to CBM's notification on 15 March, it has been collaborating with law enforcement agencies to combat and prosecute those who attempt to manipulate the currency market under the existing laws. CBM allowed authorized dealers (private banks) to operate online foreign exchange trading freely as per the market rate depending on supply and demand, starting from 5 December 2023. — NN/KK

YGN palm oil wholesale rate continues to decline

THE wholesale reference rate of palm oil for the Yangon market declined further to K7,165 per viss this week from 3 to 9 February, according to the Supervisory Committee on Edible Oil Import and Distribution.

The prices decreased from K7,245 per viss for the previous week ending 2 February and K7,255 recorded for the previous week ending 26 January.

The Supervisory Committee on Edible Oil Import and Distribution under the Ministry of Commerce has been closely observing the FOB prices in Malaysia and Indonesia, adding transport costs, tariffs and banking services to decide the wholesale market reference rate for edible oil every week.

The complaints for overcharging can be lodged over hotline 1535 of the call centre of the Consumers Affairs Department or sent to the Facebook page of the department and the region and state departments concerned.

The domestic consumption of palm oil is estimated at one million tonnes per year. The local palm oil production is just about 400,000 tonnes. About 700,000 tonnes of palm oil are yearly imported through Malaysia and Indonesia to meet domestic demands. — NN/KK

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Study offers new hope against chronic pain for dialysis patients

A new study finds that pain coping skills training (PCST) significantly reduces chronic pain and improves quality of life for dialysis patients, offering a non-opioid alternative to traditional pain management methods.

EOPLE receiving haemodialysis for kidney failure frequently feel chronic pain associated with their disease, which can be difficult to manage with opioid medication and other traditional treatments.

A new study finds that offering these patients pain coping skills training (PCST) significantly reduced their suffering and improved their quality of life.

Twenty-two New Mexicans many of them Native American participated in UNM's arm of the study, said Mark Unruh, MD, Chair, UNM Department of Internal Medicine

"This is particularly important for these patients since the therapeutic choices for pain management are limited and the use of opioids has been shown to be associated with poor outcomes in this group."

The randomized controlled study enrolled 643 participants from 16 medical centres and 103 dialysis clinics in The HOPE Consortium, an ongoing multi-site study exploring new treatments for dialysis patients.

"New Mexico played a large


role in the trial," he said. "We served as the primary outcomes measurement core and New Mexico had a supplement to recruit from rural clinics with a focus on our underrepresented popula tions?

Multiple factors likely contribute to dialysis-related pain. Patients tend to be older and living with arthritis, diabetes, peripheral neuropathy and back pain, he said.

"Dialysis by itself may contribute, either directly or indirectly, like having uremic toxins in your bloodstream," Unruh said. "The process of going to dialysis and having a needle stuck in your arm may be challenging for some people to deal with."

Doctors face challenges in treating dialysis-related pain because patients have kidney failure. "We are kind of loathe to use nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory agents, and in general we avoid opioids," he said. "Certain opioids are better than others, but a lot of them are cleared in part from the kidneys. You kind of have your hands tied."

Electric cars take 96% of Norway market in January

ALMOST 96 per cent of new cars registered in Norway in January were electric, close to the Scandinavian country's goal of selling only zero-emission vehicles as of this year.

According to the Norwegian Public Roads Administration (OFV), electric vehicles accounted for 95.8 per cent of new cars registered last month.

Including rechargeable hybrid models, the share of electric cars rose to 96.8 per cent.

A total of 9,343 new cars were sold in January, of which 8,954 were all-electric.

"We've never seen this before... If the rest of the year continues like this, we will very soon be close to the 2025 goal," OFV director Oyvind Solberg Thorsen said in a statement.

"But if we want to cross the finish line with 100 per cent electric cars, it will be necessary to maintain the incentives that make it profitable to choose an electric car over other other models," he added.

Of the 50 most-sold models, only two were non-electric, the first of which came in 33^{rd} place.

In Norway, electric cars are exempt from many taxes, making them competitive against heavily taxed internal combustion cars.

They have also benefitted from toll exemptions, free parking in public car parks, and the use of public transport traffic lanes. — AFP

China's submersible and research vessels fine-tuned for future deep-sea missions



China's manned deep-sea submersible Jiaolong completes its 300th dive in the Western Pacific Ocean, on 18 August 2024. **PHOTO: XINHUA**

CHINA'S manned deep-sea submersible Jiaolong and research vessel Dayang Yihao (Ocean No 1) are set to complete major upgrades in preparation for deep-sea exploration missions this year, according to the country's oceanic affairs administration.

Jiaolong, named after a mythical sea dragon, is capable of diving to depths exceeding 7,000 metres. The China-made underwater ship has explored waters in the Pacific Ocean, Indian Ocean and Atlantic Ocean.

Its upgrades are currently in progress, and technicians have already completed major enhancements to its critical components, including the lithium battery system.

The sea dragon-inspired submersible is scheduled to undergo tank tests in February and sea trials in the South China Sea in March.

Major upgrades on Ocean

No 1 include the installation of remotely-operated underwater vehicles, which will enhance its capabilities and provide reliable support for future deep-sea resources survey and development, said the administration.

Ocean No 1 is China's first modern comprehensive ocean-going scientific research vessel. With over four decades of service, it has conducted 27 oceanographic scientific expeditions. — Xinhua

Former Diamond Princess passengers mark 5 yrs since COVID outbreak

FORMER passengers of the Diamond Princess liner laid flowers Monday at Yokohama port in remembrance of the 13 people who died following the mass COVID-19 outbreak onboard five years ago.

The outbreak of infections on the ship in February 2020 led to thousands being quarantined after it docked at the port near Tokyo. Japan stopped accepting foreign cruise ships the following month for the next three years.

The government was criticized for forcing passengers to remain on board for a long time despite the limited medical facilities. Authorities also faced difficulties finding medical facilities for patients as the number of infections swelled.

Passengers infected with the disease started disembarking on 14 February after the ship's 3 February arrival, with most others starting to leave 19 February and the process only completed on 1 March.

The ship's lack of strict quarantine measures such as confining passengers to their cabins immediately after the first case of the coronavirus was confirmed is also believed to have contributed to the spread of infections.

In the memorial event, a board inscribed with the words "Never let such a tragedy happen again" was displayed, with the dates of the deceased's hospitalizations and deaths read out.

Ryohei Nakata, who was among those infected onboard together with his wife, has attended the memorial every year. "Such a terrible disaster must never happen again. A proper investigation is necessary," the 78-year-old said.

A nationwide association of former passengers continues to urge the government to conduct a thorough investigation of the incident, including interviewing passengers and crew.

Tadashi Chida, an 81-yearold former passenger from Sapporo and joint head of the association, expressed concerns that the incident was fading from public memory.

"Five years have passed, and I fear it will be forgotten. We need to reconsider how we should reflect on this mass outbreak," he said. The Diamond Princess departed Yokohama on 20 January 2020, with a passenger who had disembarked in Hong Kong testing positive for COVID-19 on 1 February. Of the 3,711 passengers and crew on board, 712 became infected and 13 died, with an additional fatality occurring after a passenger returned home to Australia. — Kyodo

China's 2025 Spring Festival box office breaks records

CHINA'S film industry set a new milestone during the 2025 Spring Festival holiday, with box office revenue from 29 January to 1 February reaching a record 5.75 billion yuan (about US\$802 million), surpassing the previous high of 5.73 billion yuan set in 2021.

As of 2 February, box office revenue from the holiday had reached seven billion yuan. The reading for the first six days of the holiday, driven mainly by popular domestic productions, is already nearing the record box office of 8.02 billion yuan set during the 2024 Spring Festival holiday. Bringing the total box office revenue since the beginning of 2025 to nine billion yuan, the figure has solidified China's position as a global leader in box office revenue for 2025. domestic productions," said Rao Shuguang, president of the China Film Critics Association.

The Spring Festival, traditionally a peak and lucrative period for moviegoing, saw fierce competition among major releases. This year, the Spring Festival holiday was extended by one day to eight days, running from 28 January to 4 February.

Cambodia's tourism makes US\$3.63 bln revenue in 2024

CAMBODIA'S tourism earned gross revenue of US\$3.63 billion in 2024, up 17.8 per cent from \$3.08 billion in a year earlier, according to the Ministry of Tourism's report on Sunday.

The kingdom received 6.7 million international tourists last year, up 22.9 per cent from 5.45 million in the year before, the report said, adding that the top five market arrivals to the kingdom last year were Thailand, Vietnam, China, Laos and the United States.

The tourism sector contributed about 9.4 per cent to the country's gross domestic product (GDP) in 2024, up from 7.5 per cent in the year before, the report added.

Tourism is one of the four pillars supporting Cambodia's economy.

The country has four world heritage sites, namely the Angkor Archaeological

Park in northwest Siem Reap province, the Temple Zone of Sambor Prei Kuk in central Kampong Thom province, and the Temple of Preah Vihear and the Koh Ker archaeological site in northwest Preah Vihear province.

Besides, it has a pristine

coastline stretching in the length of about 450 kilometres in four southwest provinces of Sihanoukville, Kampot, Kep and Koh Kong.

Thourn Sinan, chairman of the Pacific Asia Travel Association Cambodia chapter, predicts a modest growth in tourist arrivals to Cambodia in 2025 due to the current geopolitical climate, political changes in the United States, and various crises impacting global travel.

"Without a concerted effort to restructure our tourism products and improve air connectivity, as well as an urgent need for effective destination marketing campaigns, I anticipate only modest growth for 2025," he told Xinhua.

"Cambodia has immense potential, but we must take proactive steps to attract visitors," he added. — Xinhua

Tourist arrivals in Nepal up in January

FOREIGN tourist arrivals in Nepal grew in January, the Nepal Tourism Board said on Sunday.

As many as 79,991 foreigners visited Nepal in the reporting month, up from 79,100 over the same period last year.

The tourism revival was 98 per cent compared with the number in 2019, when 81,273 tourists arrived in the first month of the year, Mani Raj Lamichhane, director of the board, told Xinhua. – Xinhua

Uzbekistan exports peppers worth US\$8.9 mln in 2024

UZBEKISTAN exported peppers worth US\$8.9 million in 2024, the country's Statistics Agency said on Monday.

Last year, Uzbekistan exported 6,400 tonnes of peppers worth \$8.9 million, according to a report posted on the agency's website. Among the countries importing Uzbek peppers, Kazakhstan ranked first with 2,300 tonnes, followed by Kyrgyzstan and Russia

Canada to file WTO claim against Trump tariffs

OTTAWA will file a World Trade Organization claim against US President Donald Trump's tariffs and also seek redress under a regional free trade deal, a Canadian official said Sunday.

"The Canadian government clearly considers these tariffs to be a violation of trade commitments that the United States has taken," the official, speaking on condition of anonymity, told a briefing.

After weeks of threats, Trump on Saturday signed off on 25 per cent tariffs on all Canadian imports except energy resources, which will be hit with Sunday a list of 1,256 American goods it plans to target in a first round of counter tariffs worth Can\$30 billion starting on Tuesday.

The list includes cosmetics, appliances, tires, tools, plastics, furniture, coffee, wines and spirits, dairy and fruits.

Officials said the Canadian tariffs do not target specifically Republican states, but aim to put pressure on lawmakers with influence over Trump, who are more likely to be Republicans. A second round of counter tariffs could be announced in the coming weeks, when total amount of the products targeted would rise to Can\$155 billion (US\$106 billion).

"Our hope is that the actions we have taken already will be sufficient to persuade the United States that it has gone down the wrong path and that they will reach out to work with us on how to get back to a more normal state," an official said. — AFP

M'bishi likely to say in mid-Feb. whether to join Honda-Nissan merger

THE chief of Mitsubishi Motors Corp said Monday that the Japanese automaker will make a final decision on whether to join a planned merger between Honda Motor Co and Nissan Motor Co in mid-February or later, pushing back the plan from the end of January.

The delay comes as Honda and Nissan, which is the largest shareholder of Mitsubishi Motors, said last week that they would release the details of their plan by the end of January but postponed it to mid-February. — Kyodo a 10 per cent levy.

"We will obviously pursue the legal recourse that we believe we have through the agreements that we share with the United States," the official said, citing the WTO and US-Mexico-Canada agreement (CUSMA) that Trump himself signed in 2018.

A review of the pact, which a Canadian official called a "gold standard agreement", was due to be held next year.

Vietnamese manufacturing sector's output falls for first time in four months

NEW orders of the Vietnamese manufacturing sector decreased for the first time in four months during January due to weakening customer demand, according to a report released by S&P Global Market Intelligence on Monday.

The S&P Global Vietnam Manufacturing Purchasing Managers' Index posted 48.9 in January, down from 49.8 in December and below the 50.0 no-change mark for the second successive month.

Business conditions in the sector deteriorated in the opening month of 2025 amid renewed falls in both output and new orders, said the report. — Xinhua

Egypt's processed food exports hit record US\$6.1 bln in 2024, up 21%

EGYPT'S processed food exports hit a record US\$6.1 billion in 2024, marking a 21-per-cent growth compared to 2023, the country's Food Export Council (FEC) said on Sunday.

"This is the highest export value in the history of the sector, reaffirming the competitiveness of Egyptian food products in global markets, supported by government efforts to enhance non-oil exports," said FEC Chairman Mahmoud Bazan in a statement.

Arab countries remained the top importers of Egyptian processed food, with purchases worth about US\$3.28 billion, accounting for 54 per cent of the total exports in 2024, up 20 per cent from 2023, according to the statement. — Xinhua

Stocks drop, dollar rallies as Year of the Snake starts with bite

STOCK markets in Asia and Europe sank and the dollar surged Monday after Donald Trump signed off huge tariffs on China, Canada and Mexico, and warned the European Union would be hit "pretty soon".

Less than two weeks after moving back into the White House, the US president on Saturday made good on warnings that he would resume his hardball tactics, sparking fears of trade wars that could hammer the global economy.

The move will see 25 per cent levies on imports from Canada and Mexico and 10 per cent duties on Chinese goods.

Analysts at Oxford Economics said the tariffs could see Mexican inflation surge to six per cent annually, from 4.2 per cent in December, while the peso sank seven per cent.

Chief EY economist Gregory Daco said Canada's economy could shrink 2.7 per cent this year and 4.3 per cent next

year.

White House Press Secretary Karoline Leavitt said tariffs were "promises made and promises kept by the president".

Canada said it would file a World Trade Organization claim against the United States, while Mexican President Claudia Sheinbaum announced that retaliatory tariffs would be imposed on US products.

China's trade ministry said Beijing would take "corresponding countermeasures".

While the decision had been well-flagged, equity markets took a hefty hit, with all three main indexes on Wall Street turning negative at the end of Friday trade. — AFP

SoftBank, OpenAI agree to set up joint venture for AI services

Joining Son at the event, Sam Altman, the head of OpenAI, expressed excitement about the new project, saying, "We have been talking about doing this for so long."

The two companies said last month that they will form a new company with Oracle Corp., which will invest at least \$500 billion in AI infrastructure in the United States under the Stargate Project. Calling SB OpenAI Japan the Japanese version of the Stargate Project, Son said Soft-Bank will become the venture's first customer and pay around \$3 billion annually to utilize the services across its group, which includes mobile payment service operator PayPay Corp. SoftBank will also dispatch about 1,000 employees to the new company to help launch the new service, while OpenAI will send some engineers, he said. — Kyodo

S Korea's industrial output grows 1.7% in 2024

SOUTH Korea's industrial output grew in 2024 due to a recovery in semiconductor production, statistical office data showed Monday.

The production index in all industries, which excludes the agriculture, livestock and fishery sector, gained 1.7 per cent in 2024 compared to the previous year after rising 1.0 per cent in 2023, according to Statistics Korea. put in electrical equipment and primary metal products.

Manufacturers posted an average capacity ratio of 72.9 per cent in 2024, up 1.0 percentage point from a year earlier.

Production in the service industry expanded 1.4 per cent in 2024 after climbing 3.2 per cent in the prior year.

Output in the transport and warehousing and the finance and insurance sectors gained ground, offsetting a decline of 2.2 per cent in the wholesale and retail sectors last year.

SOFTBANK Group CEO Masayoshi Son said Monday that his tech investment company and artificial intelligence giant OpenAI have agreed to establish a joint venture to promote AI services for corporations.

The new 50-50 venture, named SB OpenAI Japan, will utilize massive quantities of data stored in systems of client companies and offer optimal management solutions, Son said in a speech at an event in Tokyo.

"We will launch from Japan the world's first advanced AI services for large corporations," Son said, adding that they plan to expand AI use in the future to the government and other areas such as the medical and educational sectors. Saudi crown prince, Syria's interim president meet on ties, latest developments

SAUDI Crown Prince and Prime Minister Mohammed bin Salman Al Saud and Syria's interim President Ahmed al-Sharaa reviewed in Riyadh on Sunday bilateral relations and the latest developments in Syria.

The two sides discussed ways to enhance Syria's security and stability, as well as opportunities for cooperation across various sectors, and exchanged views on regional developments and ongoing efforts to address them, the Saudi Press Agency reported.

The Saudi crown prince congratulated al-Sharaa on assuming the presidency of Syria and wished him success in fulfilling the aspirations of the Syrian people.

For his part, al-Sharaa expressed his gratitude to the crown

Al-Sharaa arrived in the Saudi capital on Sunday for his first official visit abroad. He has led the Hayat Tahrir al-Sham group since 2017 and played a key role in the offensive that led to the overthrow of former Syrian President Bashar al-Assad in December 2024 and the establishment of the Syrian transitional government. He has been the country's de facto leader since Assad's ouster.

Syria's Military Operations Administration announced on 29 January the appointment of al-Sharaa as president during the transitional period, granting him authority to establish an interim legislative council until a permanent constitution is ratified. — Xinhua

Rising floodwaters force evacuations in eastern Australia

FAST-MOVING floodwaters rose Monday in northeastern Australia after forcing many to flee, blacking out homes, and sweeping away a chunk of a critical bridge.

Storms have already dumped more than a metre (39 inches) of rain in two days in parts of Queensland, engulfing homes, businesses and roads in muddy waters, authorities said.


Aerial footage showed rural communities surrounded by the floodwaters, cut off from nearby roads.

"We are going to see widespread rain and

storms spread across much of northern Queensland," the state's premier, David Crisafulli, warned in a news conference.

"We remain prepared for the ongoing prospect of more rain and the likelihood of more flooding, both flash flooding and riverine flooding," he said. Emergency services carried out 11 "swift water rescues" overnight, the premier said.

Areas of flood-hit Townsville, a popular coastal tourist destination that lies near the Great Barrier Reef, had been declared a "black zone", he said. — AFP



Lukashenko officially declared winner in Belarusian presidential elections

BELARUSIAN Central Election Commission on Monday officially declared Alexander Lukashenko's victory in the latest presidential elections with 86.82 per cent of the votes.

For other candidates, Sergei Syrankov received 3.21 per cent, followed by Oleg Gaidukevich (2.02 per cent), Anna Kanopatskaya (1.86 per cent) and Alexander Khizhnyak (1.74 per cent). Around 3.60 per cent of voters voted against all candidates.

The presidential elections were held in Belarus on 26 January. The turnout was 85.69 per cent. – Xinhua

Uganda sets up Ebola isolation units after outbreak in capital

UGANDA with support from the World Health Organization (WHO) has set up an 84-bed Ebola isolation and treatment facility in Kampala, the Ugandan capital, following the virus outbreak in the east African country, a health official said Monday.

"We have set up an Ebola isolation unit at Mulago and deployed a [pre-trained] national emergency medical team to manage the cases at the facility," Bosa said. "The development of this isolation facility, the training and deployment of the emergency team has been supported by WHO in collaboration with the World Bank."

Another isolation unit in Mbale should be up and in operation by the end of Monday, according to Bosa. — Xinhua

Late derby drama keeps Inter on Napoli's heels in tight Serie A title race

INTER Milan were given a let off on Sunday when they snatched a late 1-1 derby draw with AC Milan while league leaders Napoli were held by a late goal at Roma.

Reigning champions Inter remain three points behind Napoli who looked to be heading five clear as they led in Rome until Angelino volleyed in a stunning leveller in the first minute of added time to make the score 1-1.

Angelino's strike gave even more significance to Stefan de Vrij's last-gasp equaliser at the San Siro. The defender forced home Nicola Zalewski's knockdown just as it looked like Tijjani Reijnders' opener would be enough for Milan.

"I can only applaud my team for the way they played, unfortunately they weren't able to get that bit of luck," said Inter coach Simone Inzaghi, who believed his team should have had a penalty in the second half for a foul on Marcus Thuram.

"I can understand the referee not seeing it... but those who are sat down (in the VAR booth) can't not call the referee.

"It's the third or fourth time it's happened and it's starting to annoy me."

Inter dominated but Milan hung on to stay eighth, five points behind Juventus, who beat Empoli 4-1 in the day's early game.

For Milan, Netherlands midfielder Reijnders netted his 11th goal of the season on the rebound at the end of a lightning counter-attack after Yann Sommer palmed out Rafael Leao's low cross.

To lose to that goal would have been a sucker-punch for dominant Inter who had three goals chalked off while Yann Bisseck, Thuram and Denzel Dumfries all hit the post in the second half.

But another Dutchman in De Vrij pounced at the death to silence a packed San Siro.

The stadium was dominated by Milan fans but missed some of its colour due to a police ban on pre-match fan displays as part of a crackdown on the hardcore ultra supporters of the two clubs. "I don't think we played very well in possession, we had to be more calm on the ball because there were some opportunities," said Reijnders to DAZN. "If we stay more cool in these kinds of situations we can control the game more, unfortunately that didn't happen tonight." Napoli were on course for an eighth straight win after Roma old boy Leonardo Spinazzola looped home his first goal of the season in the 29th minute in Rome. — AFP

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EU leaders vow to hit back if Trump triggers trade war

EU leaders meeting in Brussels Monday warned there would be no winners in a trade war with the United States, insisting they would hit back if President Donald Trump imposes tariffs.

French President Emmanuel Macron said the European Union must show its muscle if US President Donald Trump makes good on his threat to target the bloc with a volley of tariffs.

"If we are attacked in terms of trade, Europe — as a true power will have to stand up for itself," Macron said.

The leaders of the EU's 27 nations were huddling in the Belgian capital with Britain's prime minister and the head of NATO to discuss efforts to boost Europe's defences faced with an aggressive Russia — as Trump's demands that American allies spend much more.

But the discussions were overshadowed by the US leader's decision to slap tariffs on Canada, Mexico and China — with Trump threatening to target EU next.

Poland's Prime Minister Donald Tusk, whose country currently holds the EU presidency, said everything must be done to avoid a "totally unnecessary and stupid" trade war.

Trump has not hidden his enmity for the EU, accusing it of treating the United States "very, very unfairly" on trade.

After slapping levies on his North American neighbours and China, Trump doubled down on Sunday by saying he "definitely" planned to target the EU in future.

German Chancellor Olaf Scholz said a trade dispute would be "bad for the US, bad for Europe", with transatlantic "cooperation" preferable for both sides.

"We can also react," he added, veering from Germany's traditionally cautious approach to transatlantic trade relations. "We need America, and America needs us as well," echoed the EU's top diplomat, Kaja Kallas, adding there were "no winners in trade wars".

On Sunday, the European Commission said it would retaliate "firmly" if Trump hit it and decried his sweeping measures against Canada, Mexico and China. — AFP

Israeli prime minister in Washington for Gaza ceasefire talks

ISRAELI Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu is set to begin talks Monday on a second phase of the ceasefire with Hamas as he visits the new Trump administration in Washington.

Before departing, Netanyahu told reporters he would discuss "victory over Hamas", countering Iran and freeing all hostages when he meets President Donald Trump on Tuesday.

It will be Trump's first meeting with a foreign leader since returning to the White House in January, a prioritization Netanyahu described as "telling".

"I think it's a testimony to the strength of the Israeli-American alliance," he said before boarding his flight.

With fragile ceasefires holding in both Gaza and Lebanon — where an Israeli campaign badly weakened Iran-backed Hezbollah — Israel has recently turned its focus to the occupied West Bank, where an operation it says is aimed at rooting out extremism has killed dozens.

Netanyahu said Israel's wartime decisions had reshaped the Middle East and that, with Trump's support, this could go even further.

"I believe that working closely with President Trump, we can redraw it (the Middle East's map) even further and for the better."

Trump, who has claimed credit for sealing the ceasefire deal after 15 months of war, said Sunday that negotiations with Israel and other countries in the Middle East were "progressing".

"Bibi Netanyahu's coming on Tuesday, and I think we have some very big meetings scheduled," Trump said. — AFP

Hamas promised to release Russian citizen Trufanov from captivity in near future

PALESTINIAN movement Hamas will release Russian citizen Alexander Trufanov from captivity in the near future as part of agreements with Israel, Hamas political office deputy head Musa Abu Marzouk told Sputnik.

"One of them, Trufanov, will definitely

be released in the near future. He will be released despite the fact that he is a serviceperson, but it was decided to release him at the first stage of the deal. This is our response to Russia's position on the Palestinian issue," the deputy head said. The fate of Donbass native Maxim Kharkin will be decided at the second stage of the deal with Israel, he said, adding that Hamas is ready to return him as priority.

Israel and Hamas, with the mediation of Qatar, Egypt and the United States, agreed on 15 January to a 42-day ceasefire and declared their intention to finally end the hostilities that have claimed the lives of over 47,000 Palestinians and about 1,500 Israelis over 15 months, spreading to Lebanon and Yemen and provoking an exchange of missile strikes between Israel and Iran. — SPUTNIK
